Louisiana Ag in the Classroom is offering mini-grants of up to \$500 for parish Farm Bureaus. The purpose of the grants is to increase Agriculture in the Classroom involvement at the parish level by funding projects that will enhance agricultural literacy. The Mini-Grant can provide funds to purchase non-consumable materials and supplies to develop and implement agricultural lessons or projects that foster ag literacy. The Mini-Grant program can assist parish Farm Bureaus in creating a planned AITC program in their parish. Examples of grant projects include commodity educational supplies, school gardening tools, cork boards or display materials used for producer presentations, agricultural expo experiences or classroom use. ## **Convention Time!**

Plans are now in the works for the 2013 Louisiana Farm Bureau Federation's Annual Convention in New Orleans. The dates are June 27<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup>. There are a couple of things you need to be working on now, so they don't sneak up on you.

They were sent out from the state office a couple of weeks ago, so go ahead and start getting the delegate forms filled out and signed at your next board meeting.

#### Food Check-Out Week

Ronald McDonald House Charities in Monroe and New Orleans will receive food and cash donations from the Louisiana Farm Bureau Federation in honor of National Food Checkout Week.

Food Checkout Week commemorates the time when the average American consumer has earned enough money to pay the entire year's food bill. Food Checkout Week 2013 was celebrated Sunday, Feb. 17 through Feb. 22. The theme of this year's events was stretching your food dollar with healthy, nutritious food. Donations will take place March 18 in Monroe and March 20 in New Orleans.

The Farm Bureau's Women's Leadership Committee organized this year's event by collecting Louisiana foodstuffs such as sweet potatoes, milk, Creole gumbo mixes and sugarcane products, as well as washcloths, towels and other household items such as linens and paper products from the state's cotton and timber industries. This is the 17th year the organization has donated food to the Ronald McDonald House Charities.

### **Capitol Watch**

The main issue for Agriculture is to protect the dozens of tax programs that are currently on the books. There are tax exemptions, tax rebate programs, and tax incentive programs on the books that benefit Agriculture and the people Ag serves. The Governor intends to remove many tax programs across many industries and professions. He is calling it a "tax swap" initiative since he intends to increase the sales tax after he

also repeals corporate and personal income taxes as well as adjusting some severence and ad valorem taxes.

With 60 to 80 percent of a farmer's expenses going towards inputs, an abolishment of personal income taxes would be a non-starter for farmers. A farmer must first have an income to tax, and there are no guarantees that will happen each harvest season. Farm Bureau members should make sure they have signed up for VoterVoice on the state FB website seen <a href="here">here</a>. It's going to be more important than ever for FB members to participate in the legislative process to make sure Louisiana Agriculture remains competitive in the world market. After you sign up for VoterVoice, you have but to scroll down a call to action email sent to you and hit the submit button. The pre-written message targets just your legislators so you are not spamming a Senator or Representative that is not yours.

In regard to funding of the LSU Ag Center, our goal is to remain as whole as possible by fighting against more cuts to the budget. Remember, we just suffered another mid-year cut of \$1.2 million and cannot afford to cut much more without losing substantial services and personnel. Please stand at the ready so when we call on you to participate in the legislative process, it will be like pulling a trigger when you hit that submit button. Then we will be doing what Bud Mapes always recommended, i.e., taking rifle shots and not shotgun blasts.
