#### SOS FINSTOCK POST OFFICE

The shop was told some time ago that the only way we can keep our precious Post Office in Finstock is if we take over the management of it. The directors have agreed to this, and we will be employing Karen Williams to run it. Unfortunately, at a meeting last week, we were informed of the amount the Post Office will pay by way of salary for Karen, and it turned out that it is a great deal less than they were paying Joyce. In fact it is too little for Karen to agree to accept and does in fact amount to less than the minimum wage. The directors are taking this up with the Post Office, but we fear there may not be much room for manoeuvre.

In this situation the directors have agreed that we will try to keep our Post Office going for a year to see whether it is viable, and we will top up Karen's salary to an acceptable figure from our other takings.

We exist to serve the three villages of Ramsden, Wilcote and Finstock, and we will do our best to keep the Post Office, which we know is much valued. In these times of austerity the Shop profit column has been affected, therefore we rely on people to buy in the shop and use the Post Office as much as possible so that we can afford this additional expense. Please help us to do this by buying locally at our Village Shop!

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#### NEWS FROM THE CORNBURY PARK TEAM

Cornbury Estate has been asked by the Editor to include more estate management news in updates from

There has been some concern about the new fencing along the Leafield Road. This fencing was put in place to help prevent accidents caused by deer running across the road. The Estate also had the roadside scrub cleared back and the verges regressed. It will be putting in suitable shrub trees once the grass is fully established - a similar roadside exercise was carried out on the forest road near Ranger's Lodge. This initiative was fully supported by the local authorities. Unfortunately, the fencing contractor misaligned the new fence, so all parties met in July to agree the correct alignment.

As a further safety initiative, the Estate has installed a new gate at Patch Riding. This was put in place in response to local concerns about dangerous driving in the forest. So the new gate prevents vehicle access into the forest, whilst still allowing pedestrian access.

Cornbury Estate has always been very enthusiastic about green energy initiatives, with strong support from the local communities in Charlbury and Finstock over the past five years, as they have investigated how to use the Estate to harness sustainable energy. Following a year-long study, during which a 100ft tall turbine was used

The Estate did however go forward on planning for solar panels which would have been placed discreetly on land within the forest. It was estimated that the panels would have generated 30% of electricity used locally. To the Estate's great disappointment and to the dismay of local sustainable energy groups, the application was turned down by the District Council because of a report by Natural England which suggested that the local Lacewing population might be adversely affected by such panels. Natural England felt that the Lacewings might become confused and could lay their eggs on the panels, possibly mistaking them for water. This convinced one councillor that the scheme should not go ahead, so the application was rejected.

Gardeners will be interested to hear that several of the allotments on Wards Lane have become available. The Estate has offered one of these to Finstock Primary School, but there are still some available. Anyone interested should contact Tony Crowther on 868834.

Finstock Primary will once again be joining forces with Charlbury Primary to run a tea and cake tent at Wilderness Festival August 10th-12th. This proved to be a huge fundraiser for both schools last year. Discounted Wilderness tickets for locals are available from

NB Dog fouling notes from the WODC website: Dog faeces carry many germs that can cause illness and in extreme cases could result in blindness. It is both offensive to smell and to look at, and is extremely unpleasant to step in. Dog fouling is when a person permits a dog in their charge to foul in a public place and fails to clean it away immediately after. A public place means land to which the public has access within built-up areas of the District, which includes roads, gutters, footpaths, verges, pedestrian areas, parks, school playing fields, sports grounds and cemeteries etc. Ideally, dogs should be trained from an early age to go at home in their own garden before or after a walk, rather than during. #### **CAKES AND ALE**

The talk in the pub was of house prices. 'The agent said you pay for the postcode round here', said a regular, his Yorkshire vowels resonating oddly around the West Oxfordshire inn.

This made me think: how best to buy wine for celebrations in times of austerity? As Sir Toby Belch says in Twelfth Night "Dost thou think, because thou art virtuous, there shall be no more cakes and ale?"

Somehow I think there will always be cakes and ale.

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The Pearl, 110 Lower End, Leafield, Witney, Oxon OX29 9QQ Telephone: 01993-878496 www.thepearlinleafield.co.uk When seeking to reduce spending I think it is better to look for a genuine alternative rather than trying to buy the same product more cheaply, which almost never ends well. I think we all know that the cheaper Champagnes can be awful, but beware also Cava. One example on special offer at Tesco recently was described by a respected wine writer as 'revolting'. Unless you know what you are getting it is very risky. Cava has an alarmingly short shelf life.

This brings me to Prosecco. Prosecco is the name of both the grape and the wine. Unlike Champagne, it will not improve with age and should be drunk in its first flush of youth while its light florality is at its best. It is crisp and refreshing with an aroma of pears, peaches and hazelnut. It typically has a lively mousse with bubbles that dissolve in the mouth with impression of peach, apple and almond. The really good thing is that it is inexpensive and it is difficult to find a bad one. Look for wine from Veneto – that is where the best comes from.

It might be just the thing to cheer up the (I hope) long hot days of August without feeling that you are 'paying for the postcode'. *Osiris* 

### Saving electricity in the office!

By making sure you switch off computers and other office equipment you can save your business or school hundreds of pounds per year and also reduce your carbon footprint!

Make sure computers and monitors are switched off at the wall when not in use. Switch off the monitor when it is not being used for 10 minutes – screen savers don't save energy!

**Fact**: Each computer (with flat screen monitor) that is left on standby overnight and at weekends wastes £20 a year. That's £200 and 860kg of CO<sub>2</sub> – for every 10 Computers left switched on!

**Photocopiers**: If you leave your photocopier is on at night and at weekends, this is costing you £42 per year and emits around 184kg of CO<sub>2</sub> (per photocopier).

**Printers**: Only print when really necessary to save energy as well as paper; switching off a laser printer overnight and at weekends instead of leaving it on standby will save you £21 a year and cut CO<sub>2</sub> emissions by approximately 91kg.

Thermal imaging surveys are a free scheme available to help residents find out where heat is escaping from their home, get advice on how to make improvements and save money on energy bills. Using a thermal imaging camera, a trained volunteer can survey your home and capture images to show where energy is being wasted. Surveys will be carried out between October and March, when you are using your heating. You will receive a report with recommendations advising on cost-effective ways to prevent or reduce heat loss, such as draught-proofing and insulation. ### Grants to keep homes warm this winter

WODC is offering a grant for residents who struggle to keep their homes warm through the winter. The grant is specifically for households that are claiming benefits, people who are over 60 or those with a disability, that are finding it financially difficult to carry out essential repairs to keep their homes warm.

The work is carried out by the Council's Home Improvement Agency Small Repair Service, who can also help you with a range of property repairs. The Council can also offer Flexible Home Improvement Loans

#### A new app to help combat the spread of three problem plants

Japanese Knotweed, Himalayan Balsam and Floating Pennywort are three particularly problematic Invasive, Non-Native Species that are spreading quickly across the Midlands region.

Using a smartphone app called PlantTracker we would like anyone who is out and about to record where these plants are so that we can more accurately assess the situation. These invasive plants cost the British economy a minimum of £1.7 billion per annum. The PlantTracker app is available free from the iTunes App Store and Google Play Store by searching for planttracker (one word), or from the website planttracker.naturelocator.org/ shows how to identify each species and enables users to easily submit geolocated photos whenever they find one. WODC is providing new bright pink WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) banks, which allow people to recycle small electrical items including anything with electrical or electronic parts from hair straighteners to shavers, and toys to toasters. The closest WEEE Banks are at: Edington Square, Witney; Sainsbury's, Witney; Woodford Way, Witney; and Hensington Rd, Woodstock. Larger items that do not fit in the chute of the banks should be taken to a household waste and recycling centre (tip). **CPRE reports that from field to fork** the value of England's local food webs shows that local food is a recipe for economic success. We found that: across England local food outlets serve an estimated 16.3 million customers a week; local food sales through independent outlets are worth £2.7 billion a year to the economy; these food outlets support over 100,000 jobs (full time and part time).

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#### WOODPECKER PRE-SCHOOL

Last term we were pleased to welcome two more children into our group, **Ethan** and **Jimmy**. We now have 17 children on our register!



During the last term we have used lots of strategies to support the transition of our older children into Oak Class where they will be in the afternoon from September. These strategies comprise weekly class visits and joining the older children for lunch in the school hall. The move from pre-school to BIG school for our children is a gentle transition that builds up over the first two terms of each school year. For a more detailed description please read Finstock C of E School's website for their admissions policy (www.finstock.oxon.sch.uk/policies.php).

We have also enjoyed our Sports Day, which all children participated in with great enthusiasm, both for racing and for cheering their peers on. I was very proud of them. We have also had our trip out to Cogges Farm Museum which was a lovely day out for the children and for

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the accompanying adults, too.

We are continuing to investigate extending our hours. If you think that you might be interested in this please

complete our online survey found at <a href="www.surveymonkey.com/s/ZQGS8HB">www.surveymonkey.com/s/ZQGS8HB</a>. However, we have agreed to extend our provision to award places to 'Rising 3s'. This means that children can join us from the beginning of the term before their third birthday. We have had

to restrict this to only having four 'Rising 3s' a term and for two sessions only per week. We already have a 'Rising 3' child, with two more starting in September, which is already proving that there is a need for this provision. 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#### AN AGELESS GARDENER WRITES...

Most years about this time (late June), keeping the garden at Wilcote at least under control, and ideally quite tidy, seems an overwhelming task. This year, with about ten inches of rain in the last couple of months, I definitely feel the garden is winning. The grass - slow to get going after a very dry March – is now growing luxuriantly and really needs mowing more than once a week. I try to cut the larger areas often enough so that the grass doesn't have to be picked up: partly because it's quicker and partly to allow the mowings to go back into the lawns, helping to maintain their fertility.

One very noticeable feature this summer has been a big increase in the amount of trefoil in the lawns: this is a creeping yellow flowered plant with very small leaves arranged in threes and commonly known as Lady's Slipper, Bacon and Eggs and about seventy other names! With a lot of white flowered clover and plenty of purple self-heal, the lawns have been nearly as colourful as the borders. I usually spray the lawns with a general broad leaf weed killer about this time of year but the weather needs to be dry for 24 hours for this to be effective!

This summer has been as weedy as I can remember (have I written that before?!) and, while I am quite happy to hand weed the borders, where willow herb seems to have been particularly rampant, and among the vegetables,

spraying the areas of gravel is really the only option. Round-up works well (better in warm, dry weather) but unfortunately does not actually get rid of the dead weeds so that a certain amount of hand weeding is still necessary.

The edges also need to be trimmed more often and with the long grass in the orchard cut for the first time I can start to tidy and strim around the trees there. So, much as I might like to be dead-heading and tying in the roses, cutting back the early flowering shrubs and filling those annoying gaps in the borders with colourful tender perennials – dahlias, salvias, cosmos, etc., there just isn't the time. But by the time you read this, things will have eased off a bit and the football season will nearly be upon us!

Yesterday we visited Kiftsgate Court near Chipping Campden. In spite of the very heavy rain the whole garden looked wonderful, possibly at its best. There are semiformal areas of mixed borders with wonderful old roses around the house and, at the bottom of a very steep slope, a wilder area around a lovely sunken semi-circular pool with "immense" views of the Vale of Evesham. In total contrast to its Arts and Crafts origins, the old tennis court was converted fairly recently

into a modernist pool with stepping

stones, an island and a very unusual water feature, all enclosed in tall, tiered yew hedges. All that with just two



gardeners... although they don't have much grass to cut! Lots of interesting plants to buy but, if you have to have tea-towels and lavender bags, Hidcote is just across the road.

### Types of plastics collected in Black Box include:

- Bottles (e.g. milk, drinks, shampoo and washing up bottles, shower gel, bleach and cleaning products)
- Food trays (e.g. ready meals, fruit and take away trays, biscuit trays)
- Tubs (e.g. margarine and ice cream tubs)
- Pots (e.g. yoghurt and plant pots)
- Flyaway plastics (e.g. carrier bags, polythene, small clear food packaging, cling film, bubblewrap and compost bags – NB put these in a plastic bag inside your black box).

All the plastic bottles collected from households are taken to a sorting plant where they are recycled to make everyday items such as garden furniture, fleece clothing and more plastic bottles. 15 million plastic bottles are used in the UK every day. ALL plastic bottles can be recycled but most people only recycle about 50%.
