AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM UPDATE

Australian Curriculum R-10 is in the final stages of implementation. Victor Harbor High School has Phase 1 subjects embedded and will report against the Achievement Standard in years 8-10 in 2014. Other subjects are developing the curriculum and will be reporting against the Achievement Standards in 2015.

What does this look like? The Australian Curriculum compulsory subjects include English, Science, Mathematics, History, Health & Physical Education from years 8-10. Other subjects are compulsory in year 8. The curriculum allows for local context e.g. Individual Personal Project is a compulsory subject at Victor Harbor High School but is not a 'subject' in the curriculum – however the IPP helps students achieve the "General Capabilities" of the Australian Curriculum.

The transition for Victor Harbor High School has been quite smooth. The Cross Curriculum Perspectives: Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islanders, Asia and Sustainability have always been valued in our curriculum.

What's good about Australian Curriculum?

It is the world's first on-line curriculum, which can be updated regularly and teachers are not working to old print versions. It can be viewed by all: parents; students; teachers; researchers; etc. Links to additional information and resources make using the curriculum very easy. For example, work samples to help teachers moderate student work consistently. There is continuity across Australia which is important when students move schools and it has a strong emphasis on "pedagogy", which is how teachers teach, as well as what is taught.

Assessment is against an Achievement Standard which clearly states what students are expected to be able to do and know. This assessment is across the whole year during which time students can develop skills and improve grade.

Reporting 2014

English, History, Science and Mathematics will be reported against the Achievement Standard 8-10, (2013 was year 8 & 9 only). This means that the grade on the term 1, 2 & 3 report for Science, English and Mathematics is a progress grade against the Achievement Standard. Term 4 is the final achievement. (Note: History is a semester subject so the final grade is at the end of Term 2). Assessment tasks for students will reflect the Achievement Standards and a key focus for staff is developing the recording student progress, this is particularly important when students change teacher at the change of semester.

MATHS: EXCITING TIMES IN MATHLETICS 2014

This year has seen the introduction of a multiplicative thinking intervention program and we have tested all Year 8 and 9 students and now have some excellent data indicating student capabilities. This is fantastic as it allows our teachers to know where our students are at and develop challenging tasks that cater for their learning needs. On the student free day we had Jude Ocean from RMIT running a training day for all of our Maths staff on multiplicative thinking and proportional reasoning. It is vital that students develop their multiplicative skills so that they are able to do topics like Algebra and Fractions.



We want to develop powerful learners of Mathematics. A Powerful Learner actively participates in their learning, makes decisions based on sound evidence, skilfully solve problems and deal proactively with new situations. They also communicate effectively in a variety of forms and collaborate with others. More importantly a Powerful

Learner has a growth mindset and a belief that they are capable of learning and achieving with effort. It is vital as parents that we encourage our students to have a positive attitude towards mathematics and be proactive in seeking support from their teachers and peers. Maths Online, Khan Academy and Youtube are all excellent places for student to watch videos that explain a wide range of mathematical concepts.

PERFORMING ARTS

How do young people benefit from studying the Performing Arts?

Young people become active citizens and gain confidence by participating in the Performing Arts. They learn about themselves, their world, their culture and history. Young people gain an appreciation of other cultures. They also refine their communications skills.

How can young people become involved in the Performing Arts at Victor Harbor High School?

All young people at Victor Harbor High School have the opportunity to experience the Performing Arts in Year 8. Every year 8 student will have one semester of Drama & Music lessons. For all students in years 9 – 12, Drama and Music becomes a choice subject. If students choose to study Music or Drama in their senior school years they will be placed in an Arts Pathway mentor group with an arts-focused teacher to guide them and affirm their interests. Those students who have been placed in the Speciality Music Class in years 8 & 9 will have a music teacher as their mentor teacher. The year 8 class will have a full year of music. Music students in year 10 & 11 have four classes a week and attend small group instrumental music lessons. The course also requires them to be part of a school ensemble such as Concert Band or Vocal Ensemble.

At SACE 2 level music students choose two from a range of eight different music subjects, depending on their skill levels and interests. They have five music lessons each week. The school bands ensembles and soloists perform publicly throughout the year including at a number of venues and occasions. This includes: the whole school assemblies; community events, inter-school competitions, an informal concert at the Victor Harbor Gospel Centre and a formal concert at the Goolwa Centenary Hall. Both Music and Drama students will attend a number of excursions during the year. Drama students will experience professional theatre performances. Music students will have the chance to listen to professional musicians such the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra and other schools' bands.

The senior Drama students work with their teacher to produce a major drama production each year. This is performed to the primary schools, the high school and the general community. These highly polished presentations are a cultural event in the district and are part of the year 12 SACE assessment. The year 12 production this year is a double header by Australian Playwright Louis Nowra. The 2 plays are "Summer of the Aliens" and "Cosi", edited into approximately 2 hours. They are scheduled for performance Term 2, Week 6.

I am pleased to inform you that Victor Harbor High School will be one of 36 schools participating in the Leading Numeracy and Literacy Improvement (LNLI) project in 2014. This project is managed through the DECD Numeracy and Literacy Unit.

Mathematics teachers and Numeracy coaches, will work together to implement teaching ideas that increase students' achievement and enjoyment of their learning in mathematics.

As part of the LNLI numeracy project, teachers will monitor students' achievements in the online mathematics assessment known as PAT Maths Plus, (developed by the Australian Council for Educational Research), and students will also complete a Student Numeracy Attitude Survey.

Information from these assessments and other teacher observations and assessments will be used by teachers and numeracy coaches to guide teaching in mathematics that meets students' learning needs. The results will also be used by the LNLI project team to determine the impact of the work of numeracy coaches in all 36 project schools.

IMMUNISATION

The 2014 SA School Based Immunisation Program will be offered at Victor Harbor High School by City of Onkaparinga. The program consists of three school visits and provides vaccination for Hepatitis B, Varicella (Chicken Pox) and Cervical Cancer (girls Only). At this time, the School visit dates have been scheduled for May 6 (Years 8 & 9); June 24 (Years 8 & 9) and October 28 (Year 8). A two dose course of Hepatitis B vaccine with an interval of 4-6 months between 1st and 2nd doses is recommended for year 8 students.

Varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, (one injection) is required for students under 14 years. This will be given at the second school visit to year 8 students who have not had chicken pox disease. Cervical Cancer vaccine (Gardasil) will be offered to girls in year 8 and consists of three doses to protect against the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). One booster does of Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (dTpa) Boostrix vaccine will be provided to year 9 students.

Immunisation consent forms will be sent home with students. Parents/legal guardians are asked to complete and sign the form and return to school regardless of whether your student needs to be immunised. Return of consent forms is critical in determining the overall immunisation rates for the school program in the State. If you do not receive an immunisation consent from your child, please ask at Student Services for a spare one. If your child is not vaccinated at school, they can go to a Council immunisation clinic (free vaccine & service) or the doctor (you may have to pay for the consultation). PARENT / GUARDIAN GUIDE TO RAISING A COMPLAINT OR CONCERN

What to do if you have a complaint?

So that we can all work together to get the best outcome for your child, there are some simple steps to keep in mind if you have a complaint about public education and care. Keep in mind that you are welcome to contact the Department for Education and Child Development's Parent Complaint Unit hotline on 1800 677 435 at any time for discussion or advice.

Stage 1—Talk to the School

The school should always be your first point of contact. Find an appropriate time to talk to your child's Mentor Teacher or other relevant staff member (Counsellor, Sub-School Co-ordinator) to discuss your concern or complaint. The school front office may be able to arrange a time for you to meet with the teacher or have a discussion over the phone.

If your concern is about a teacher then you may prefer to talk to the Principal. If your complaint involves the Principal then contact the Department for Education and Child Development.

The Teacher will look into your concerns and get back to you. However, if you are still not satisfied, you may choose to follow up your complaint with the principal. They will work with you and the staff member to resolve the issue. To do this, you may choose to write to the principal (who will then acknowledge receipt of your complaint with a written response as soon as possible), or telephone the school to make a time to meet with the Principal or Director.

The school will aim to resolve your concern or complaint ideally within 15 working days.

Stage 2—Contact your regional office

If you are not satisfied that your complaint has been resolved by the school—or if the Principal is the subject of your complaint, you may choose to contact your regional office for help.

The regional office will review your complaint. The regional office will aim to resolve your concern or complaint within 20 working days.

Stage 3—Parent Complaint Unit

This unit has a dual function, firstly to provide advice and support to parents about their concern or complaint; and secondly to objectively review complaints that have not been resolved at the school or regional level.

Advice and Support

You can contact the unit's hotline (1800 677 435) at any time to discuss your concern or complaint or to seek advice about solving school problems. Staff will follow up with you at a later stage to check about progress.

Impartial Review

If the complaint has not been able to be resolved by the school and regional office, the unit will assess your complaint and decide what action is needed. Staff will discuss what has been done with your complaint, and when you can expect to hear about the outcome. The Department\s Head of Schools or the Head of Early Childhood

Development and the Chief Executive's office will be advised by the Parent Complaint Unit of the outcome of the review. One of these senior leaders will make a decision about your complaint. You can expect that you will hear of a decision within 35 working days in most cases.
