Eshinni Sama is the wife of Shinran Shonin, founder of Jodo Shin Buddhism. Shinran Shonin was the first monk in Buddhist tradition to publicly take a wife. Eshinni Sama's name appears among historical sources, only in Kudensho by her grandson Kakunyo. There is only the ten letters she wrote to her youngest daughter Kakushinni, living in Kyoto with Shinran. The ten letters reveal the process by which Shinran entered into the life of true entrusting, as well as the wavering of his trust in the Other Power. Eshinni Sama clearly understood the distinction between willful self-power and absolute Other Power, which is the core of entrusting.

**HEART OF HIGAN AND DANA**

We in Hawaii more than the mainland continent or Asia often take for granted that we live in the tropics. If it suddenly snowed in winter, we locals would all *MA-KE!* On the mainland as is in most of Japan, the change of seasons are very real. These weather changes are so crucial, they will mean the difference of life and death for animals as well as for human beings.

When the axis of the rotating earth tilts in a the way that sunlight strikes the two hemispheres evenly above and below the equator, the equinox season is becomes evident. During these times the weather is moderate wherein it's neither too hot nor too cold. This balance occurs twice annually in the spring and in autumn. For Buddhists the equinox symbolizes not only the obvious balance of nature outside our windows, but also our inner desire to balance our minds and hearts in daily living. The Japanese Buddhist term for this is "*Higan*," often interpreted as: A) to traverse to the 'other-shore' of enlightenment verses 'this-shore's' state of transiency, uncertainty and self-attachments; and B) the practice of the six *paramitas* of 1. selfless giving; 2. observance of precepts; 3. forbearance; 4. exertion; 5. concentration; and ; 6. wisdom.

Even *Shin* Buddhists are reminded of the importance of engaging the *bodhisattva* practices of the *paramitas*. It's the first, "selfless giving" or *dana* that lay commonly apply. This comes in the forms of goods, volunteerism and money to the *sangha* and community. As we step back however, most of us are sure to check the monthly newsletter to see if our donations have been acknowledged; if not, the office is also notified of this oversight. In other words, despite the true spirit of selfless giving to mean, "non-attachment to who the giver is, the receiver and what was given," *Shin*'s incapable of "*bodhisattva* practices", selfless giving being one.

However, the essential, even radical aspect that characterizes the *Shin* Buddhist pathway acknowledges the impossibility of abandoning self-attachments in favor of *bodhisattva* practices. As *Shinran Shonin*, reveals, we are with all our passions and attachments, taken into the light of *Amida*'s great compassion. To realize this truth of ourselves as we are, even up to the moment of death is according to our spiritual masters, the indestructible action of *Amida*'s great compassion-vow.

Yet, at that very moment when death occurs, all attachments, i.e., worries, hopes, etc., are transformed naturally to become the highest virtues that is *Amida Buddha*. As *Shin* Buddhists, even our spiritual "awakenings" up to that moment of death is completely transformed into inconceivable wisdom given freely to passionate beings, that is great compassion.

Great compassion consummated in passionate and imperfect beings such as ourselves connotes the very nature of *A-MI-DA* -- light and life with no limit. Great compassion and this self together -- inseparable are at the dynamic core of authentic religion, especially today. So, it's certainly fine to inquire about the "good" we do, in the newsletter or otherwise. Self-attached as we are, this essential balance *Higan* is to be ever accompanied by the true-entrusting nembutsu of great compassion lived daily and completely with '*arigatou, arigatou, arigatou...*' *Namo Amida Butsu...* Happy *Higan*!
