






She believes that all women can fulfill their potential by listening to their emotions and intuition, sharing and understanding the experiences of other women and applying patience and creativity to all situations. SOMEBODY'S SOMEONE: A MEMOIR, by Regina Louise Warner Books, \$23.95

This memoir, initially set in rural Texas in the 1970s, brings us into a world in which harsh blows—sometimes physical, sometimes emotional—are delivered faster than tumbleweed grows. Louise endures abuse from the very beginnings of her life at the hands of her biological family and some of her foster families, as well. Louise's artistic nature unfolds as she recounts her brave adventure after she runs away from more than 30 foster homes by the age of 13. Crisscrossing the country from North Carolina, she eventually meets "somebody who wanted me for their own someone." Louise, now a top hair stylist and co-owner of a salon, delivers a triumphant story that anyone who has experienced a painful childhood can relate to.—Deborah Gregory






PUT ON A HAPPY FACE, by Cooper Edens and Richard Kehl Chronicle Books, \$12.95

Clever and compact, *Put on a Happy Face*—which pairs whimsical illustrations with inspirational quotes and song lyrics—is the perfect desk accessory.—EF





FEAR ITSELF: A FEARLESS JONES NOVEL, by Walter Mosley Little Brown, \$24.95

Once again, acclaimed mystery writer Walter Mosley captures the uneasy atmosphere of 1950s Los Angeles with his new unofficial detective duo, Paris Minton and Fearless Jones, in the series' second installment. It finds Minton tumbling into the most complex, terrifying situation he's ever encountered—when he answers the late-night knock on his door from his buddy, Jones. Jones is a man with a missing finger that was shot off in a gunfight that nearly got both men killed. His greeting is a sure sign that more trouble—including a mysterious woman, smoky bars filled with the sound of the blues and wealthy people willing to pay any price to hide their sins—is on the way. This page-turner is proof positive that Mosley has "dunnit" once again.—DG
