Erika Lawson received a Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music where she studied baroque violin with Dana Maben, and participated in early music concerts under the direction of Paul O'dette. In 2007 she played a fringe concert on baroque violin and viola at the Boston Early Music Festival. Erika studied viola da gamba with Mary Springfels and has performed with several consorts, such as Los Grillos and Les Touches. In addition, Erika plays viola with the Houston Grand Opera Orchestra, Houston Ballet Orchestra, and Ars Lyrica.

Stephanie Raby, a founding member of Les Touches, studied baroque violin with Cynthia Roberts and viola da gamba with Patricia Nordstrom and Allen Whear while at the University of North Texas. She went on to complete a masters degree at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. There she studied with Stanley Ritchie (violin) and Wendy Gillespie (viol) among others. Currently Ms. Raby performs with such groups as Mountainside Baroque, La Follia, and Queen City Musicians.

Pedro Funes received his Master's Degree in Early Music at Indiana University, where he studied viola da gamba and vielle with Wendy Gillespie. Previous teachers include Mary Springfels and Carter Crawford, Dennis Whittaker and Eric Larson. He has participated in the Texas Music Festival, VdGSA Conclave, and Tafelmusik Baroque Institute and performed with Ars Lyrica, Texas Early Music Project and, as a founding member, with Les Touches. He is currently the Assistant Orchestra Director at Oak Ridge HS in Conroe ISD and President of Viols of Houston.

Adam has studied privately with Dr. Lee Lattimore and Terri Sundberg, as well as with Dr. Lisa Bost and Martin Godoy.

A native of Croatia, **Fran Leboš** began studying cello at the age of six under in his hometown of Križevci. His hard work and dedication to the art of cello playing eventually granted him acceptance in the studio of Dobrila Berković - Magdalenić, a renowned Croatian cello pedagogue. Throughout the years, Mr. Leboš has attended a wide variety of seminars, studying with highly esteemed cellists such as David Grigorian, Gustavo Tavares, Monika Leskovar and Giovanni Sollima. In addition, he has competed in numerous domestic and international cello competitions, most notably the junior "Antonio Janigro", where he was awarded 3rd prize in 2006. Currently, Mr. Leboš is pursuing a degree in cello performance at UNT, under the tutelage of prof. Nikola Ružević. His future plan is to specialize in the field of early music as a baroque cellist.

After graduating with a bachelor's degree in modern piano, **Kyle Collins** began his studies in harpsichord performance at the University of North Texas. He studies harpsichord and fortepiano with Petra Somlai, basso continuo with Dr. Brad Bennight, and also performs continuo for the UNT Baroque Orchestra. This past summer, Kyle attended the American Bach Soloists Academy, where he performed organ continuo for the ABS Academy's annual performance of J.S. Bach's Mass in B Minor. While here, he performed in masterclasses and coachings by ABS musicians such as Corey Jamason, Sandra Miller, and John Thiessen.
