

DESNA, UKRAINE 2nd Quarter 2015 Report

April

We have had several evangelistic projects this month, which I would like to tell you about.

It is a part of our culture to dye or decorate eggs for Easter holidays, and this tradition is rooted very deeply in the minds of our people. We decided to use this tradition to tell the Gospel to the children. We made an announcement in Desna that on Sunday morning at 10 a.m. we were going to have an egg hunt in the area around our church. We had 35 children come; many had their parents with them. After the egg hunt we shared the Gospel news with the children and their parents. We gave presents to the children and invited them to our Sunday school -- and their parents to our services.

Also, together with Lyosha Savchuk we decided to organize on the territory of our church a picnic and a game day for young people from Chernihiv. This way we could get to know them better and share our faith with them. We spent a lot of time with them playing, eating, and talking about different subjects. We also shared our testimonies with them. But what really encouraged me was what happened when we were about to see the Chernihiv group off. The guys had hired a bus to get them from Chernihiv to Desna. The bus driver was watching us during the whole time of our fellowship. It even seemed to me, at times, that he was not quite happy that he had brought them here. But, when we were about to say our farewells the driver walked up to me and said, "This is a great work that you are doing. These guys really need this." Then he told me a sad story about his own son who got lost in this sinful world. He also said that he was glad that he had gotten to spend time with us and was very impressed with what he saw, and how we should continue our work. Our conversation with him might have lasted for a long while, but then the boys came and he got shy and changed the subject. I understood that there is no such thing as a chance (accident) for God, but it is always about His plan. Brother Lyosha brought many guys with him that have never been to a church before, and from my conversation with them I saw that they did not know what to expect. They stayed reserved for a long while, but by the end of our time with them all of them were freely participating in the fellowship.

We had many conversations with him about God, faith, his life, and that the true salvation can be found in God only.



There were many other soldiers who came to our church during this time. What's really interesting – they were from different denominations. Just recently we had a guy who had been attending a Catholic church while at home. We are happy to welcome everybody who comes to our church and try to serve them with our words and our deeds



We served them by arranging meals for them to share the love of the Lord with them and to leave warm memories of our church in their hearts. I noticed that these guys are a lot more open to hearing about the Lord than some of the others in our community that we have been ministering to. It is, surely, a great opportunity for us to share Christ with them.

I see how God is knocking at their family, and now, when we see each other in town we always talk, and she says, «I want to come; well, everything as it comes out.» After camp, Ilyusha and I have remained friends and we always say hello on the street.
