GREETINGS, O FAVORED ONE!

PRIMARY SCRIPTURE:

Luke 1:26-38

RELATED SCRIPTURES:

Matthew 1:18-25; Luke 8:19-21, John 19:25-27, Hebrews 11

PERSONAL STUDY:


Read Luke 1:26-28. If you were visited by an angel and told that God's favor and blessing were upon you, what would you think that might mean for your life moving forward?

Read Luke 2:33-35, 8:19-21, John 19:25-27. What would Mary have experienced during these painful events? Why does God's favor and blessing not always equate to a pain-free, easy existence with positive circumstances?

Read Hebrews 11:32-38. This list of faithful servants of God includes people who saw incredible miracles and people who suffered incredible pain. Where in your life has faithfulness led to unexpected success and joy? Where has faithfulness led to pain or struggle?

Read Luke 1:29-38. In what ways does Mary's response to Gabriel match how you would expect a normal human being to react to meeting an angel? How does Gabriel respond to her skepticisms? When has obedience to God's direction in your life required humility and faith?

WEEK 18:

THE KING'S LOWLY ENTOURAGE

PRIMARY SCRIPTURE:

Luke 2:1-21

RELATED SCRIPTURES:

Isaiah 9:1-7, Micah 5:2, Philippians 2:1-11, Galatians 4:4-5, Revelation 21:1-5

PERSONAL STUDY:

Read Micah 5:2, Isaiah 9:1-7 and Luke 2:1-7. Consider the prophecies from Isaiah 9:1-7 and Micah 5:2. How do you see these fulfilled in Jesus' birth?

When have you seen God fulfill promises in your life? When are you most tempted to believe that your proficiency or performance are required for you to earn God's faithfulness?

Imagine the reality of giving birth in a manger and laying a newborn in an animal's feeding through. What kind of real life problems did Mary and Joseph face as a young couple?

Read Luke 2:8-20. What kind of people are shepherds? What do you know of farming lifestyle? Would shepherds have been likely guests for a king's birth? Why or why not?

Read Philippians 2:1-11. Jesus descended from the highest glory of heaven to the low of taking human form complete with a birth in a barn and an entourage of farmers to celebrate. How does God's humility reveal His glory? How do our insecurities prevent us from being willing to humble ourselves?

SERMON NOTES:

LIFEGROUP DISCUSSION:

What kind of people do you gravitate toward? Why? What characteristics make you respect and want to spend time with someone? What characteristics repel you from someone?

Read Luke 2:8-14. What is the significance of God inviting small-time, blue collar, lowly shepherds to be the celebrating crowd at one of the greatest, most important and glorious events in the history of the world? What things make me feel significant?

Read Isaiah 7:14 and Revelation 21:1-5. How do we seek to define our identity from the people around us? How do God's promises in the gospel free us up to associate with anyone, regardless of what they offer to our social standing?

Read Luke 2:19. What kind of things do you ponder or think deeply about? What do you find yourself daydreaming about?

How can we practically encourage each other to think deeply on Jesus' humility in his birth, life and death throughout the busyness of the Christmas season?

WEEK 19:

THE HOLY FIRST BORN

PRIMARY SCRIPTURE:

Luke 2:22-40

RELATED SCRIPTURES:

Isaiah 49:6 + 66:1-3, John 4:21-24, Romans 5:12-21 + 9:4-5, Colossians 1:13-18

PERSONAL STUDY:

Have you witnessed a young couple (yourself or friends or family members) giving birth to a child? What kind of thoughts, fears and events do new parents in the first few months of a baby's life?

Read Luke 2:22-24 and Leviticus 12. The offering of two turtledoves or pigeons was a provision in the law for those who could not afford a more expensive customary lamb. What difficulties in travel did this poor young couple likely experience? What do we learn about Mary and Joseph's devotion to God?

Read Luke 2:33-35. Simeon's prophecy can be paraphrased as: "This boy will expose the hearts of those who pretend to be holy and those who fear they'll never be holy enough. He will show us all our need for salvation. He himself will be that salvation, and you, mother, will suffer because he will suffer. It will be like a sword piercing your own soul." After all Mary and Joseph have experienced in the first weeks of Jesus' life, how would that prophecy sit with them?

Read Luke 2:25-32 and 36-38. Simeon and Anna have been praying and waiting their entire lives for the coming Messiah. Has anyone in your life been praying for you for years? What prayers do you hope will mark your life over the years? What are things you currently pray about on a regular basis?

SERMON NOTES:

LIFEGROUP DISCUSSION:

Read Exodus 13:1-2, Luke 2:22-24, Colossians 1:13-20 and Romans 8:29. What is the significance of the firstborn male in a Jewish family? What are the implications of Jesus being the new patriarch for a new humanity?

Read 2 Corinthians 5:16-17. What kind of sinful traits and family patterns did you inherit with your first human nature? How have you seen Jesus redeem you as a new creation and part of his new humanity?

Read Luke 2:25-32 and Romans 8:18-25. Simeon's patient longing culminates in seeing God's salvation come in the form of a baby whose name means salvation. What forms of brokenness (personal, communal and global) wear you out as you wait for Jesus' promised second coming to restore all things and put a final end to sin and death?

Read Luke 2:25-38 and Revelation 21:1-8. How as a Lifegroup do we need to focus our hearts on responding to Jesus in worship and anticipation of His return? What are specific ways we commit to seeing Jesus and His salvation in the busyness of the next few weeks?
