HOTEL AS CANVAS

The idea of an artist-in-residence at a hotel isn't new—you could say Monet started it in 1901 at London's **Savoy** (fairmont.com; \$\$\$). The concept has evolved since then: the **Revere Hotel Boston Common** (reverehotel.com; \$\$\$) recently partnered with two Brazilian street artists, and at the **James Chicago** (jameshotels.com; \$\$), five artists competed to have their work displayed while being filmed for a short documentary. But the latest iteration? Mexico's **El Ganzo** (elganzo.com; \$\$), which owner Pablo Sánchez-Navarro—the 29-year-old scion of a wealthy Mexican family—has branded an “art and music lover’s utopia.” At the 72-room property in San José del Cabo, you can find artists such as Jose Dávila painting a canvas in the restaurant while singer Joshua Radin performs in the lobby. And those tracks being played by the rooftop pool? They were recorded in a basement studio. —ANDY ISAACSON
