2015 GROWING REPORT

Putting food on a plate is not enough to end hunger. We must overcome the root causes of hunger: lack of access to healthy food and lack of income to purchase healthy food. That's why, in addition to recovering and distributing food to those in need, IFFS programs teach culinary job skills, how to shop and cook healthy on budget, and how to grow food. Below is a snapshot of how donors, volunteers, and partners helped IFFS staff FEED, TEACH and GROW a healthy and hunger-free NC in 2015.

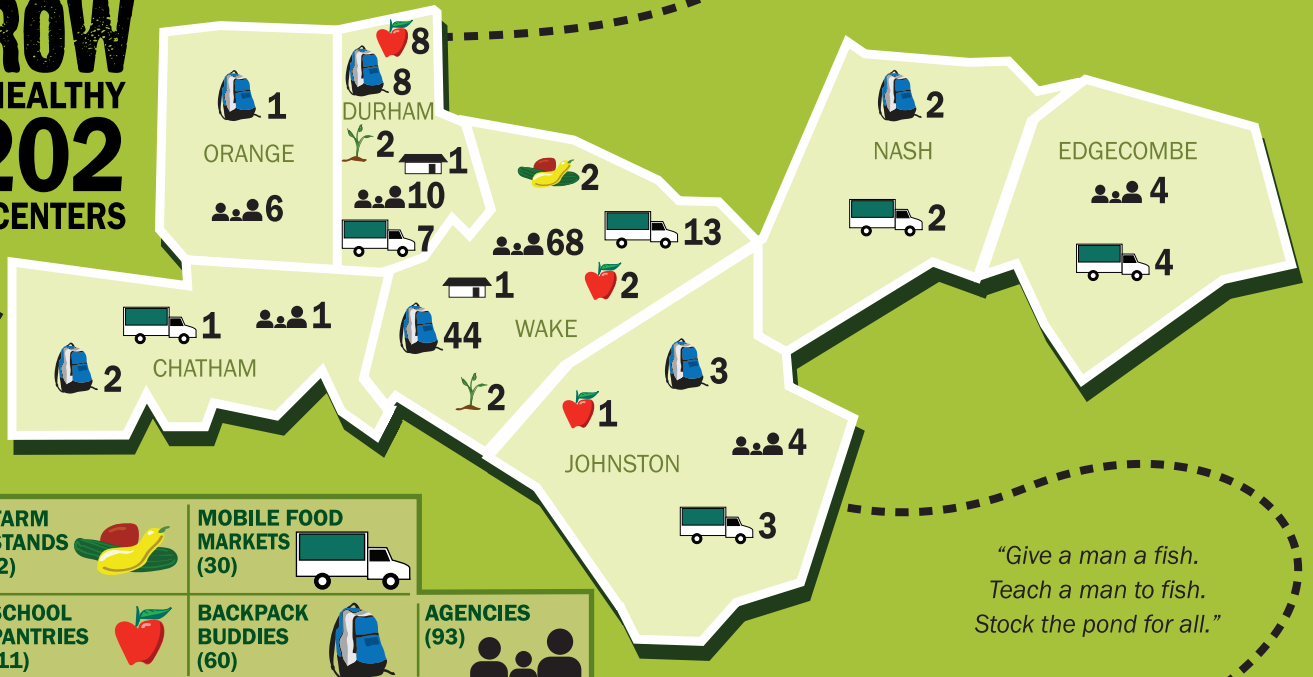
