FALL ELECTIONS WRAP UP

The final results of the 2018 Fall Elections for Representative-At-Large were tabulated on November 1st. There were seven candidates running with five open seats on CUSG's Legislative Council. The Elevate ticket won all five seats, the vote count is as follows.

- Madison Gile (Elevate): 1,197 votes, 19.45 percent
- Chloe Sonne (Elevate): 1,079 votes, 17.53 percent
- Kate Sullivan (Elevate): 1,045 votes, 16.98 percent
- Michael "Sharky" Martin (Elevate): 1,031 votes, 16.75 percent
- Nicholas Kennedy (Elevate): 967 votes, 15.71 percent
- Ibrahim Karoussa (Rise): 447 votes, 7.26 percent
- Antony Congram (Rise): 386 votes, 6.27 percent

CUSG's Election Commissioner would like to thank all of CUSG, the Rise and Elevate tickets and a special thanks to the Residence Hall Association and Engineering Council, as well as all CU students for a fair and fun Fall Election Week that saw the highest fall turnout since 2013, with 5.56 percent of the student body voting.

Last Thursday, I passed a bill that would implement the phasing out of single-use plastic bottles at student fee funded events and facilities. CU has always been an environmental trendsetter and is home to many sustainability "firsts" for American Universities, including the first zero-waste collegiate football stadium and student-run recycling center.

Plastic waste is the largest form of pollution in our planets ocean, with 80-90% of plastic bottles ending there. The consequences of this pollution is drastic and disheartening. Our new plastic bottle phase-out is the first of its kind, aims to cut CU's amount of plastic waste produced, and reduce our greenhouse gas emissions.

It is our legacy to set precedent, to be bold, and our fundamental duty to remain strong leaders so that other universities can follow our example.

This effort would not have been possible without the support of the CU Sustainability Think Tank, CU administrators, and members of Legislative Council.

In other sustainability news, the university has teamed up with the city of Boulder and Community Cycles for the Lighten Up Boulder safety campaign. Several times within the next month, representatives will be handing out free bike and pedestrian lights at different locations, including on campus.
