

Last Fall, when we first came before the SC to talk about this project, Mickie and I hoped it would be a positive event for Lowell. We have to admit to being overwhelmed by the support from so many in the community. We were truly stunned by the response and within an hour of opening the doors to educators, support staff, community groups and families on November 19th, we went from “never again” to “how can we do this again”.

The FirstBook/AFT program, *Books on Wheels*, is targeted to communities serving students in need as defined by several means - Title I participation being one of these. In Lowell, we met FirstBook’s free truck requirements through a hybrid program requiring 1,000 new email signups from UTL members for FirstBook’s Marketplace (discounted materials) and a minimum contribution of \$4,500.

With the Superintendent’s cooperation, the UTL successfully solicited email addresses from interested staff throughout the Fall. We also met with and received support from community groups like CMAA’s AfterSchool program, Community Teamwork, Coalition for a Better Acre , Pollard Library, and Boys and Girls Club of Greater Lowell - all of whom support our children here in Lowell in a variety of programming.

The impact of FirstBook and the UTL’s collaboration is found in some of the preliminary data we’ve collected:

- **Over 1,000 LPS staff emails** collected to meet the requirements for a free book truck.
- **\$6,000 raised** through GoFundMe - we exceeded our original goal of \$5,000. With the funds raised, we were able to supplement the free truckload of books with culturally diverse titles suggested by teachers throughout the LPS
- **over 40,000** new books delivered, sorted and stacked within a 12-hour period
- On sorting day, **nearly 200 volunteers** working together from retired and active United Teachers of Lowell members, to community volunteers, student service groups, parents, administrators from Central Office.... on distribution day we lost count, but more than 50 had signed up on our volunteering website
- About **450 LPS staff** members picked up **40 books** for use in classrooms and with their students. We had participation from every Lowell Public School
- Nearly **2,000 students** - probably more since we did not ask High School students to bring a coupon - picked up 5 books of their choice.
- Our event donated more than **500 books to help Lawrence’s Bruce school** recover from a recent fire

- Our community supporters - Washington Savings (especially Vee Kong), JDCU, Central MV Labor Council, Winn Residential, AFT-MA, and the more than 65 donors small and large to our GoFundMe effort
- Our UTL retirees, along with retirees from other sectors within the community, who unpacked and sorted books on Friday morning and worked throughout the day on Saturday
- Active UTL members - many of whom came to volunteer on Friday afternoon and into the evening after a full day and week of school
- Service groups in the schools came to help us both days. Thanks to Mr. Chase's class from the Wang School who walked to the Elks to help sort on Friday, to Mr. Neagle and Ms. Herbert's service group from the Pyne Arts who came to assist on Saturday, and to members of LHS National Honor Society. Thank you to UTEC's Americorp team and to Andrea Wallace and her team from Winn Residential for helping us sort on Friday. Thanks also goes to Dr. Pat Fontaine from UML College of Ed. and her pre-service students who volunteered on Saturday.
- To the Lowell ELKS who couldn't have been a better host for this event - especially to the Elks Club manager, Paul Palladino. Whatever we needed, the Elks were there to help us.
- To Gunther Wellenstein (SWR) who helped us keep this a "mostly" green event. Everything but the plastic shrink wrap on the cartons was repurposed or recycled.
