## **Source Water Awareness and Agriculture Best Management Practices in the North Fork Salt River Watershed, September 2015 – May 2016**

- Grant to the CCWWC from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources
- Project Components include: Funding for cover crop seed for landowners in watershed, educational fliers about watershed, a part time educator until May 31, 2016, a mobile display
- Project Partners include: CCWWC, MDNR, MU Greenley Research Center at Novelty, MDC, MRWA, Local Farmers/Landowners, Other Local Groups
