From the Rector:

October 2013

October is a time of apples, leaves, pumpkins, donuts, leaves, chrysanthemums, costumes, masks and trick-or-treat, and... leaves. Brilliant oranges, reds and yellows give way to browns and grays as days grow shorter and night grows longer. For some it will be homecoming games and tailgating, or parents' weekends. For others it will be tightening up the house, stowing away lawn furniture and the other remnants of summer.

At St Thomas it will be a time of focus: on our fall program with children, youth, and choir; on the various projects being done around the church; on our thanks and farewell to Bishop Cuncell, as we prepare to welcome Canon Stokes as our Bishop; and on our stewardship of St Thomas as building, as community, as God's mission in this time and place.

"Flourish in Faith" is the theme for this year's six week program. Through weekly bulletin inserts, sermons and the witness of a variety of parishioners, we will be invited and challenged to explore the ways in which our lives are flourishing and fruitful, and then to move more deeply into our commitment to God's mission through St Thomas Church. Each of the inserts, sermons and talks will focus on the gospel for that Sunday. The stories are rich and this looks to be a rewarding time and experience for young and old alike.

From the Introduction to "Flourish in Faith":

Scripture tells us that God first placed human beings in a garden to practice stewardship: cultivating, tending, toiling and caring for God's garden (Genesis 2:15). From the opening verses of Genesis, God blesses and calls all of creation to be fruitful and flourish. As God's stewards, it is our highest privilege to use the gifts that have been entrusted to us — relationships and resources — to ensure that the entire created order reaches its potential of life abundant.

My grandmother recently celebrated her 105th birthday. She currently lives in Florida with my aunt, and though her body is not as willing as it once was, her mind is sharp and her memories are vivid. We lived in the same town as I grew up, and I have many memories of my grandparents – family picnics, Christmas and Thanksgiving dinners, outings, events, and church suppers. Her coleslaw recipe is amazing, and her ability to share wisdom in a gentle and easy way has made an enormous difference to me and to many who have known her over the years. This is, I believe, what it is to truly 'flourish in faith.' Chances are you have people, communities or events that helped to shape you – how can you now take what you have received and not only flourish and be fruitful, but pass it on?

May this October be rich and full, and a time a time of renewal for all. May we rediscover the abundance of God's creation and our part in sharing that abundance in ways we may have not even imagined.

WORDS FROM THE WARDENS

Money has been in the news lately. The five-year anniversary of the collapse of Lehmann Brothers, which signaled the financial crisis of 2008 and the recession that followed, was last week. Also last week, the Pope made headlines by criticizing the global economic system, saying it is based on a “god called money.” Then of course there was last Sunday’s gospel from Luke 16 about the unjust steward, who was fired for cheating his master and then took his firing as an opportunity to cheat the master again for his own future gain. The take-home message was “You cannot serve God and wealth.” However, looking a little deeper into that gospel, we see that the master praised the steward for being *shrewd*, at least in a worldly way. Luke draws a contrast between being *shrewd* and being *faithful* in that the former is typical of “their own generation” while the latter is characteristic of “the children of light.” We are told that it is through being faithful that we will be entrusted with “the true riches.”

Forgive this ham-handed segue into our fall stewardship campaign, but I see the gospel from Luke as being about choices. How can we be shrewd with what we have been given in this life? The unjust steward was shrewd in a worldly way, but I think we are called to be shrewd with our resources in ways that are true to our faith. We receive a reminder of the fleeting nature of wealth when Luke says, “make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that *when it is gone*, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.” While it is indeed true that “you can’t take it with you,” we have to be faithful to our own interests in order to survive in this world. On the other hand our faith calls us to give priority to God’s interests. I have tried to point out in recent articles the good that St Thomas has done and can continue to do with your generous support. As we enter into this year’s stewardship campaign, I urge us to remember that all we have has come from God and that perhaps making the choice to give some back to our church is the shrewd thing to do.

The vestry affirms their support for St Thomas in a letter found later in this newsletter. They have also committed to leading our fall campaign by being the first to pledge. I urge all of us to express our appreciation, by our joyous and generous giving, for all that St Thomas is and all that it can do.

Blessing of the Animals on Sunday, October 6

October 4 is the feast day of St Francis of Assisi. It is in Francis' memory and honor that many churches and animal shelters offer Blessing of the Animals for pets, service animals, and the creatures that share our lives. St Thomas Church will continue its tradition of blessing animals on Sunday, October 6, at the end of each of our worship services. All pets are welcome, appropriately restrained. Francis of Assisi was much more than simply an animal lover. Every aspect of his life testified to his dedication to Christ, and his belief in truly living the gospel in humility and generosity. He was not afraid to speak truth to power, or to give all that he had for the benefit of the poor and to encourage others to do likewise. His love and respect for all of creation can be found in his poetry and his prayers, many of which have survived to this day.

One of the prayers attributed to St Francis is found in The Book of Common Prayer on page 833:

"Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen"

IS IT TIME FOR A REBOOT ?

I think we have all shared the experience of at least one of our electronic age instruments (computer, tablet, cell phone, cable or satellite, etc.) malfunctioning. He is waiting for you. When you reboot yourself you just might see the situation on a new screen with a new perspective.

Good Queen Anne, her silver and her lace...



One of the United Kingdom's minor monarchs was 'Good' Queen Anne (1665-1714, reigned 1702-1714). The daughter of the Roman Catholic James II (deposed in the Glorious Revolution of 1688), she was brought up an enthusiastic member of the Church of England, and she was probably the most religiously-engaged of all the monarchs since the Restoration of 1660. Anne was particularly interested in the *Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts*, which had been founded by her brother-in-law William III (a Dutchman also known as William of Orange) in June 1701 as "an organisation able to send priests and schoolteachers to America to help provide the Church's ministry to the colonists".

The first missionaries started work in the Colonies in 1702, and by the Revolution there had probably been more than 300 of them. The Rev. John Talbot, who founded our Parish in 1723, was one.

Alas our founding was after Queen Anne's death, and so we missed out on her generous gifts of silver Communion-ware to Colonial parishes. Replicas of the communion vessels used in her coronation, many were given directly to parishes – perhaps a few dozen; St. Peter's, Perth Amboy, NJ, the oldest parish in the state, was given one in 1706, as was St. Mary's Burlington, NJ, in 1709, and Christ Church, Philadelphia, PA, in 1708.

Seven were sent in 1712 to gain the religious and political allegiance of the Indian Nations in the English colonies, and the photograph is of a set sent to the Mohawks (who left for Canada at the Revolution – the set is now at Christ Church, Her Majesty's Chapel Royal of the Mohawk, near Deseronto, Ontario). Another set, sent for the Onondagas, is at St. Peter's, Albany, NY.



Few use them often; they are both exceptionally valuable and rather poorly designed – they are so deep that the contents are hard to see, and spills are apparently common. Fortunately they are often loaned for display.



Queen Anne has another eponymous role worth remembering – Queen Anne's Lace, or wild carrot (*Daucus carota*). Most 'flowers' have a charming single deep red floret in their white umbel, as seen in the pictures. Not all sources identify the flower's Queen Anne with the one we are talking about here, but it makes a nice story – a pinprick while making lace fabric.
