From the Rector:

All Saints 2015

November is a time of remembering and giving thanks. It is said that in early November the veil between heaven and earth, here and there is very thin, and so we remember those who have gone before. We celebrate and give thanks for the Saints and the saints on November 1 and 2 – All Saints Day and All Souls Day. They are the ones in every generation who make a difference, whether large or small. The famous ones like Mark or Mary or our own Thomas; the ones whose biographies can be read and marveled or wondered about. The saints of our own lives who taught us to tie our shoes or to drive a car or do long division. The ones who taught us how to love or be good citizens or speak a foreign language or do our laundry. We celebrate them all, and we remember.

On November 11 we remember the veterans of our country and other countries: the ones who serve for the greater good; the ones who gave their lives; the ones who continue to give their lives through their lifelong suffering of war wounds; the ones who love and care for them. We remember. And we give thanks. On Thanksgiving Day we gather around tables, large and small, to eat feasts, large or small, and give thanks for all the people and things that have somehow touched our lives this year. The births, graduations, situations, revelations, conversations and relationships that have changed us somehow, or allowed us to be agents of change. We remember. And we give thanks.

We remember that in all things, in all times, in all relationships, God is there. We may struggle and sometimes wonder, or be absolutely certain that God is nowhere to be found. We may only see God's presence afterward, by looking back in the miracle of hindsight. We remember God's promises and know they are true, even in the most challenging of times, just as we see them so clearly in the times of joy.

And we give thanks: for those we love; for food and fellowship; for delights and joys; for the challenges that help us discover more fully who and whose we are. We give thanks for God's abiding love, made known to us in Jesus and in the faces of so many friends and strangers.

We remember, and we give thanks. May this be a blessed time for you and those you love. May your remembering be gentle and your thanksgiving joyous.

Commemoration of all Faithful Departed (also known as All Souls Day, November 2*)

"In the New Testament, the word 'saints' is used to describe the entire membership of the Christian community, and in the Collect for All Saints' Day the word 'elect' is used in a similar sense. From very early times, however, the word 'saint' came to be applied primarily to persons of heroic sanctity, whose deeds were recalled with gratitude by later generations.

"Beginning in the 10th century, it became customary to set aside another day -- as a sort of extension of All Saints -- on which the Church remembered that vast body of the faithful who, though no less members of the company of the redeemed, are unknown in the wider fellowship of the Church. It was also a day for particular remembrance of family members and friends.

"Though the observance of the day was abolished at the Reformation because of abuses connected with Masses for the dead, a renewed understanding of its meaning has led to a widespread acceptance of this commemoration among Anglicans, and to its inclusion as an optional observance on the calendar of the Episcopal Church." -- from *Lesser feasts and Fasts*

*** This year, the names of those to be remembered will be read on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 5, during a special Eucharist at 12:15 pm.** Please submit in writing the names of those you would like to have remembered on that day to the church office by Wednesday, November 4. Gifts to the Memorial Fund or the Building Fund in memory of loved ones are also appropriate, and welcomed at this or any time.

The Story and Legacy of Jimmy 'Steward'

The story of Jimmy 'Steward' began in 1723 with a congregation of people willing to put forth an effort to begin the challenge of building their own house of worship in the beautiful hills and forests of western NJ. They used their God-given resources and abilities to build a log building which they used to further their spiritual advancement and learning.

The congregation grew and the log structure didn't; they decided to again use the resources they had available to them and relationships which they had to build a more permanent and beautiful house of worship made of stone. This structure serves us today and we are all well aware of the beauty and strength which surrounds us in our worship today.

There is no doubt that the people who began what is today the congregation of St Thomas Episcopal Church had their own difficult lives to deal with. But they found a way to discover and share the resources they needed to continue the growth of their congregation and provide for the future enjoyment of congregants to come. Think of those wonderful outdoor services under our splendid maple tree. Every last person who has shared in worship and Communion on our hallowed ground has also shared in the Stewardship of our Church. Using what God had given them, they built upon the foundations of faith and worship which began in the early 18th century. Every last person who has lived this history of St Thomas and has shared their resources, abilities and relationships is a part of this legacy of Jimmy 'Steward'.

This spread of Stewardship within our Church and into our surrounding Communities, as well as the world, continues with us today; such a large 'footprint' for such a small congregation. We are all the present day Jimmy 'Stewards' and we need to continue this Outreach.

We should ask ourselves what gifts and abilities God has given us that can be shared with one another and our Church to continue this Stewardship of St Thomas. Please keep this legacy in mind when you see an opportunity to participate or a sign-up sheet for a need at St Thomas. Also, keep this history and legacy in mind when you fill out your pledge form for 2016. We are all a part of this footprint we make and the legacy that is continuing here at St Thomas.

Welcome...

To Donna Kapples, Lynn Logg and Michele Thomas, our newly trained and licensed Eucharistic Ministers; and to Marjorie Mikuta, our newest Acolyte.

All Acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers will be commissioned for their ministry on Sunday, December 6, St Nicholas' Day.

Armistice Day – Remembrance Day – Veterans Day – Wednesday, November 11

Armistice Day (which overlaps with Remembrance Day) is on 11 November and commemorates the armistice signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany at Compiègne, France, for the cessation of hostilities on the Western Front of World War I, which took effect at eleven o'clock in the morning -- the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918. The date was declared a national holiday in many allied nations, to commemorate those members of the armed forces who were killed during war.

After World War II, the name of the holiday was changed to Veterans Day in the United States and to Remembrance Day in the countries of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Armistice Day remains an official holiday in France and Belgium.

St Thomas Church will mark the day at the mid-week service on Wednesday, November 11 at 12:15 pm. If you have relatives or friends you would like to have remembered at the service, please get the names to the church office by Monday, November 9. Please include any "wounded warriors" and their families.

Benjamin Franklin's *Lord's Prayer*

Benjamin Franklin's success as a printer and publisher in Philadelphia obviously grew from a deep love of language. He was also a knowledgeable Christian, and took the language of the Church's worship seriously. Thus it is no surprise that he took his editorial pencil to the Lord's Prayer, probably in 1768 when he was 62 and living in England as an agent for Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Georgia and New Jersey.

"Heavenly Father, may all revere thee, and become thy dutiful children and faithful subjects; may thy laws be obeyed on earth as perfectly as they are in heaven: Provide for us this day as thou hast hitherto daily done: Forgive us our trespasses, and enable us likewise to forgive those that offend us. Keep us out of temptation, and deliver us from evil."

He explained his changes, although sometimes perhaps 'tongue in cheek'...

Old Version: *Our Father which art in Heaven.*

New: *Heavenly Father* is more concise, equally expressive, and better modern English.

Old: *Hallowed be thy Name.* This seems to relate to an observance among the Jews not to pronounce the proper or peculiar Name of God... The word hallowed is almost obsolete: people now have but an imperfect conception of the meaning of the petition. It is therefore proposed to change the expression into: *May all revere thee.*

Old: *Thy Kingdom come.* This petition seems suited to the then condition of the Jewish Nation... (who) had reason to wish and pray for a return of the Theocracy, or Government of God. Christians in these times have other ideas when they speak of the Kingdom of God, such as are perhaps more adequately express'd by: *And become thy dutiful children and faithful subjects.*


Old: *Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.* More explicitly: *May thy laws be obeyed on earth as perfectly as they are in heaven.*

Old: *Give us this day our daily bread.* Give us what is ours seems to put in a claim of right, and to contain too little of the grateful acknowledgment and sense of dependence that becomes creatures who live on the daily bounty of their Creator. Therefore it is changed to: *Provide for us this day, as thou hast hitherto daily done.*

Old: Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors (Matthew); Forgive us our sins, for we also forgive every one that is indebted to us (Luke)... Our liturgy uses neither the debtors of Matthew, nor the indebted of Luke, but instead speaks of those that trespass against us. Perhaps considering it as a Christian Duty to forgive debtors, was by the Compilers thought an inconvenient idea in a trading nation. There seems however something presumptuous in this mode of expression, which has the air of proposing ourselves as an example of goodness fit for God to imitate... it may be better to say humbly and modestly: *Forgive us our Trespasses, and enable us likewise to forgive those that offend us.* This, instead of assuming that we have already in and of ourselves the grace of forgiveness, acknowledges our dependence on God, the Fountain of Mercy, for any share we may have of it, praying that he would communicate of it to us.

Old: *And lead us not into temptation.* The Jews had a notion that God sometimes tempted, or directed or permitted the tempting of people. Thus it was said he tempted Pharaoh; directed Satan to tempt Job; and a false Prophet to tempt Ahab, &c. Under this persuasion it was natural for them to pray that he would not put them to such severe trials. We now suppose that temptation, so far as it is supernatural, comes from the Devil only; and this petition conveys a suspicion which in our present conceptions seems unworthy of God. Therefore it might be altered to: *Keep us out of temptation.*

No false modesty in Mr. Franklin! But when he came to revise the whole Prayer book in 1773 with Sir Francis Dashwood, they chose to keep the traditional words. But that's a story for another time...
