I recently joined six other clergy from the Watchung Convocation in a meeting with one of our congressmen at his district offices in Flemington (picture below). We went with a list of topics of concern: things that we hear from people in our parishes and communities. We also went with some questions about how we can help. What was supposed to be a half hour meeting went on for over an hour. The exchange was respectful, and touched on areas of health care, immigration, budgeting processes -- all the usual and expected topics. Underneath the conversation, no matter the topic, was a concern for the lack of respect and willingness to engage in thoughtful, honest dialogue that seems to have become the norm rather than the exception in our government, and, indeed, throughout our country. At the end of our meeting, we pledged that we would pray for him, and for all of Congress, as they do their work in these challenging times.

I am grateful to have been part of this conversation. My prayers are for all who govern, that they may do so with wisdom and care. I also pray for the safety of all who are in leadership roles, and for their families. I pray that, in the act of governing, the faces of all people may be ever before them, and that Grace may guide the decisions they make. I invite you to join me in these prayers. We are, after all, as God's people, both recipients and sharers of that Grace.

As we go into this summer, may we find refreshment and rest, and renewal of our spirits.

DOING RIGHT BY DOING GOOD ...one family at a time

On this hot and humid Father's Day, Roman and I left the comfort of a restaurant table full of our children and grandchildren and headed out to Elizabeth, NJ. The back of our SUV was crammed with an AC and lots of new and gently used household items for a family we had not only never met, but who weren't even living on American soil yet.

The Episcopal Church recently celebrated World Refugee Day, a theme which has become an important part of our personal experience. I do believe that life unfolds as it should and that things are brought into our paths for a reason. A few months ago, our daughter Nina had some household items she wanted to donate and sought out an organization that helps refugee families resettle in NJ. Fast forward and now she is a volunteer, web designer, VP and Treasurer of an organization called [One World, One Love \(1W1L\)](#), a grassroots organization with pending 501(c)(3) status. 1W1L is a group of volunteers who act as a rapid response team and intermediary between the refugee families and organizations such as International Rescue Committee and Church World Services. It often takes a few weeks for families to be enrolled in assistance programs, and 1W1L aims to fill in the gap by helping clean and set up apartments and by providing essential furniture and household items, clothing, shoes, books and toys to the families. (The organization continues to work with the families after the initial set-ups because there are many gaps along the way, and many families are given only 90 days of support to become established.)

Nina described the experience: "I was picturing the family throughout the process of setting up their home. I knew they had children and I imagined them walking in after their long journey and seeing the carefully made up beds, laid out toys and art supplies... we wanted it to be perfect and we put so much love into setting up the apartment."

Roman and I began our involvement by purchasing and collecting items from a wish list posted according to each family's needs; then heeded the call for hands-on volunteers. To add another ripple to the pebble in the pond, this week our niece is coming with us to set up an apartment. We were also asked to bring some staple foods for the family, so she is currently researching Congolese food and drawing up our shopping list.

Our daughter is not a church going person, but I remind her that her altruistic spirit and involvement is the epitome of faith in action. It is giving without expectation, and doing right by doing good. We planted the seeds when we raised our children to "be ever mindful of the needs of others", and are delighted to see this core value is an important part of who they are. – Elisabeth Chiminec

Psalm 35 and the First Continental Congress...

Fight those who fight me, O LORD; attack those who are attacking me.

Take up shield and armor, and rise up to help me.

Draw the sword and bar the way against those who pursue me; say to my soul, "I am your salvation."...

The First Continental Congress of fifty-six delegates met in the brand new Carpenter's Hall in Philadelphia from September 5 to October 26, 1774. A letter from John Adams, shortly to be our second President, to his wife Abigail (sent 16 Sept 1774) captures a fascinating vignette. He was 39 at the time; she 30.

Having a Leisure Moment, while the Congress is assembling, I gladly embrace it to write you a line.

When the Congress first met, Mr. Cushing made a motion that it should be opened with Prayer. It was opposed by Mr. Jay of N. York and Mr. Rutledge of South Carolina, because we were so divided in religious sentiments, some Episcopalians, some Quakers, some Anabaptists, some Presbyterians and some Congregationalists, so that we could not join in the same Act of Worship. Mr. S. Adams arose and said he was no bigot, and could hear a Prayer from a gentleman of piety and virtue, who was at the same time a friend to his Country. He was a stranger in Phyladelphia, but had heard that Mr. Duché (Dushay they pronounce it) deserved that character, and therefore he moved that Mr. Duché, an Episcopal clergyman, might be desired to read prayers to the Congress

tomorrow morning. ... Accordingly next morning he appeared with his clerk and in his Pontificallibus, and read several prayers, in the established form; and then read the Collect for the seventh day of September, which was the Thirty fifth Psalm. You must remember this was the next morning after we heard the horrible rumour of the cannonade of Boston. I never saw a greater effect upon an audience. It seemed as if Heaven had ordained that Psalm to be read on that morning...


I must beg you to read that Psalm. If there was any faith in ... the sortes biblicae, it would be thought providential....

I long to see my dear Family. God bless, preserve and prosper it.

There are so many lovely things in the letter – the affectionate opening sentence, Sam Adams' plea for ecumenism, the charming spelling of Philadelphia, and Adams Congregationalist tongue-in-cheek description of Rev. Duché's apparently ostentatious robes. It also captures the rumor, fortunately untrue, of bloodshed in Boston when British troops confiscated a large store of gunpowder – the Powder Alarm of Sept. 1, 1774. Finally there is the allusion to the ancient superstition, *the sortes biblicae*, that readings from the Bible foretold the future.
