# The world's longest, toughest snowmobile race

N THE FALL OF 1983, some interested snowmobile racers gathered in the offices of Anchorage Cycle Sales, the Alaska Yamaha distributor. Bob Kowalke, Anchorage Cycle's General Manager, had called the meeting and told everyone that Yamaha was interested in promoting a long race in Alaska. Maps were spread across the floor, various plans were floated and discarded. Solo racers or teams? Would racers travel independently, packing their own fuel and supplies or would checkpoints be established? The I-500 was 500 miles, how long should this race be? Where would it start and finish?

Eventually, the plan evolved: two man teams racing over 1,000 miles from Wasilla to Nome.

Over the years, the route has changed; in 1993, the race ran round trip from Wasilla to Nome and back and in 1998, the finish line was moved to Fairbanks. One thing has stayed the same; the Iron Dog is the ultimate test of man and machine.

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
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# Welcome to the 30th anniversary

LASKA'S MOST HIGHLY ANTICIPATED snowmachine race, the Iron Dog, is a test of man and machine unlike any other in the world. The race commences with a ceremonial Pro Class start on February 17 on Big Lake. Teams of two individuals will set out on the 2,031-mile course in the dead of the Alaska winter in the spirit of competition with high hopes of success.

IRON DOG'S HISTORIC 30th anniversary promises a record-sized field of competitors from all across Alaska, the Lower 48 and outside the U.S.

Many think they have what it takes to be an Iron Dog racer, yet after seven days of brutal and sometimes bloody snowmachine racing only a few have climbed to the top of the winner's podium in Fairbanks.

For Trail Class teams the action begins two days prior to the main event on Friday, February 15. This race allows riders to experience the intensity of the course before leaping into the Pro Class. Their journey ends in Nome, a course roughly half as long as that of the pros but no walk in the park.

Two days after the Trail Class riders leave for Nome, Big Lake will burst into excitement for the Pro Class start.

"There's so much activity," says Kevin Kastner, executive director for the Iron Dog. "The lake just comes to life with so much happening, almost too much to take in for many people."

He's certain spectators will be impressed with National Guard flying over, chase planes buzzing off after the racers, all the people on the lake, cars, snowmachines, and more.

"It's pretty insane," says Kastner. "In a good way, and a lot of fun."

One team after the other will zoom through the start chute bordered by thousands of roaring fans as they head into the frozen wilderness. Along their route they'll pass through varying extremes in terrain including rugged woodland





trails, fast-paced river runs, deep mountain passes, over tundra and tussocks, tracts of dirt and even open water. Through it all, weather, both good and bad, will influence the racer's progress. Fortunately long, sleepless rides are broken up by checkpoint stops, fueling stations and required layovers.

The first team to Nome will win the Donlin Gold – Gold Rush Challenge with a payout of \$10,000. At the Fairbanks finish, winners will walk away with a well-deserved \$50,000 in prize money.

Iron Dog's 30th anniversary, setting a new record. Kastner said the staff and board have long been working to increase participation from racers throughout Alaska and throughout North America and their efforts are starting to pay off.

"We've gotten more reach, more exposure from a media standpoint, and I think the word is spreading, a positive word is spreading, that there's some stability and that the race is on good footing," Kastner says. "People are saying, 'Hey, Iron Dog is doing pretty good and this would be a great time to go get involved."

Rural racers from Bethel, Kiana, Kotzebue, Noorvik and Tanana, as well as Alaska's urban areas, are signed up. Minnesota, Maine and even Arizona are sending their best riders. Teams from outside the U.S. hail from the Canadian provinces of Newfoundland and Quebec.





# **Start to finish**

NHANCED MEDIA COVERAGE and online race tracking make it a lot easier for armchair riders to follow the Iron Dog, but nothing beats the high-octane experience of seeing and hearing racers crossing the start and finish lines. Do you want to be stuck listening to everyone else's stories or experience the action firsthand? The race starts at 11 a.m., Sunday, February 17 on Big Lake, but arrive early to get in on the action. "There'll be a lot of activities," says Iron Dog executive director Kevin Kastner. "We're working with Big Lake Chamber again on the Winter Fest, so there will be activities starting the Saturday leading up to the race, between the Trail and Pro class start."

The Big Lake Winter Fest offers fun activities for families as well as more extreme activities like helicopter rides and a freestyle snowmachine show. Vendors and snowmachine manufacturer booths will add to the festive atmosphere that surrounds the lake leading up to and after the Iron Dog start.

Don't get too caught up in the surroundings, though. The Iron Dog start is the main event.

"Attending the start gives spectators a much more personal experience and they get to witness all the excitement," says Kastner.

Kastner says fans can expect a ceremonial run prior to the start and this year improved signage will help direct newcomers around. Listen to racer interviews and pick up a 30th anniversary Iron Dog T-shirt while absorbing the energy that only 3,000-plus fans can generate.

After you've had your fill of vendor foods and warm drinks, watch the teams tear away, waving at the crowd andleaving a trail of sparkling snow dust as they disappear

off the lake and into the wilds of Alaska. After the big show, spectators can stick around for a series of Iron Pup races and ice racing.

A WEEK LATER, the finish line in Fairbanks comes to life as well. It's not as big and crowded as the start, but makes for a whole different experience.

"The finish is more intimate and cool in a way because you can get a lot closer to the action there," says Kastner.

The finish will be similar to previous years with the exception of more improved signage and a new podium position so fans on the sidelines and bridge overhead can have a better view of the celebrations.

"With the rearrangement, I think the racers will be more accessible and easier to see," says Kastner.

The race is scheduled to finish at 1 p.m. on Saturday, February 23. Find the finish line on the river, in downtown Fairbanks near the intersection of First Avenue and Cushman Street.

"We'll be coordinated with Tired Iron again, which is fun, and between racers coming in there will be other things going on," Kastner says.

No matter what, being there is far better than watching from home.

"The number one thing is being able to see the racers in person and experience the personal side of the race that's hard to encompass by simply knowing someone crossed the finish line," says Kastner. "You can hear the stories, listen to the racers tell stories about their survival, and hear those interviews live right there at the finish."



# You're invited to the Donlin Gold Iron Dog Safety Expo

THE ANNUAL DONLIN GOLD IRON DOG SAFETY EXPO is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, February 9 at the Menard Sports Center in Wasilla. The Safety Expo is both a mandatory rally for the racers to ensure they adhere to race guidelines and a safety expo for all interested in riding safely.

"For guests, there will be quite a few safety vendors and sponsors there so there's going to be a lot of cool stuff to see," says Kevin Kastner, Iron Dog executive director. "Obviously you get to meet the racers and check out all their sleds first-hand."

The Safety Expo will include training seminars featuring safety equipment giveaways and special offers for discounted helmets.

"We're going to try and have a lot more swag," Kastner says.

He also mentioned that Iron Dog is dedicated to safe riding, including training and proper protective equipment.

From a racer perspective, the expo is all about the safety inspection to make sure they have the correct gear, properly tuned machines and get signed off and approved for the race. Each racer, along with their machines and gear, will be there for inspection both by officials and the public. If a racer or team fails to pass official inspection, they have a week to correct the issue.

Menard Sports Center is located on South Mack Drive, just off the Parks Highway, about 2.5 miles from downtown Wasilla. The Safety Expo is free and open to the public.

# How to follow 109 racers through the wilds of Alaska

RON DOG ACTION is only a click away whether you're watching on your television, listening on the radio or tracking the race on the Iron Dog website.

See it and hear it as the action and drama unfolds. Live coverage of the race at various stages from start to finish will be broadcast on KTUU Channel 2 television. Sound bites from those broadcasts will also be broadcast via radio on KFQD AM 750.

For those who prefer web-based information and near real-time GPS tracking, the best place to start is the Iron Dog website, www.irondog.org. Once on the page browse the section labeled "For Race Fans." There you'll find event scheduling, maps and frequently asked questions to help understand some of the more complicated aspects of the race, such as layovers and timing.

Click on Race Tracking to find past results, checkpoints and the most useful tool of all, GPS tracking.

Each racer has a GPS unit affixed to their machine, which updates the live tracking map. The information is updated every minute and displayed on an online map, which allows race fans to know where racers are located, how quickly they're moving, and how long it takes to reach each checkpoint.



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# A once-in-30-years experience

Cooperation by all involved—including Mother Nature—resulted in a supreme 2012 race | By Justin Matley



WITH A RECORD FINISH and more than 85 percent of teams crossing the finish line in Fairbanks, last year's Iron Dog could be a case study in successful overland racing. Dedicated prerace planning, volunteer and community support, and outstanding spectator turnout set the tone for 2012's action. Fair weather and supreme riding conditions set the stage. And when the flag dropped it boiled down to team tenacity, rider skill and improved snowmachine technology, all combined to carry riders to glory. It was probably the closest to perfection Iron Dog has yet come. As a number of race aficionados have described last year's event, it was a "once-in-30-years experience."

"I have to give a lot of credit to really great weather," said Kevin Kastner, Iron Dog executive director. "That was a big part of making it relatively smooth for everyone. Everyone's experience as riders and maybe even as volunteers was probably one of the best."

Last year's winners would see it the same way.

Team 17, Dusty VanMeter and Mark McKenna, riding Ski-Doo, covered the course at an average speed of 60 miles per hour over 2,031 miles, crossing the finish line at 35:39:56, an astounding time that destroyed the previous record by nearly two hours.

According to VanMeter, he and McKenna's win was a tremendous accomplishment even with conditions on their side.

"Last year's weather was sure nice as far as the sun was out and this and that, but it also made for one of the roughest trails we've ever had because it was the most snow we've ever had," said VanMeter. "The more snow, the bigger the holes. It was probably one of the roughest Iron Dogs I've ever been on."

Team 17 also reached Nome first to secure the Donlin Gold – Gold Rush Challenge with a payout of \$10,000, a hefty addition to the \$50,000 that followed by winning Iron Dog overall. The VanMeter-McKenna win meant that Ski-Doo replaced Polaris on the podium for only the second time.

"It was good for Ski-Doo, and you know, in 2011 we were



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


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1,500-some miles into the race but that construction company was mining gravel out of the river, and we were in the lead breaking trail when my partner fell through a manmade hole in the river some 20 feet deep," McKenna said. "It cost us the race, so it felt even better to get the win last year."

As usual race excitement heated up as the teams approached Nome. Plagued by poor fuel economy and speed restraints, Team 17 discovered a computer update issue. They quickly overcame it with a fuel additive that improved their power and allowed them to command the lead. The only real threat to their domination was from Team 16, Minnick and Olstad, riding Polaris, which held the lead leaving Unalakleet.

According to VanMeter, the two teams jockeyed for the lead all the way from Unalakleet to Nome. First, Team 16 fell behind due to starting trouble after refills. Then Team 16 took the lead when McKenna and VanMeter ran out of fuel additive.

In the end VanMeter and McKenna took the lead and held it to claim the first-to-Nome title.

While there, McKenna and VanMeter accrued a meager three minutes and 58 seconds of maintenance time to update their Ski-Doo computers and change clutch belts. Minnick and Olstad worked for 12 minutes 47 seconds. All told, Team 17 left Nome with a 19-minute lead on Team 16. Third out of Nome was Team 10, Morgan and Olds, with 30 minutes of maintenance time and a deficit of 29 minutes behind the leaders.


On the rough trail to Fairbanks, teams 16 and 10 fell further behind due to mechanical issues. Team 17 covered the same terrain with few difficulties and with that solidified their win.

"When we left Nome we had a good lead so when we got into some abusive trail we slowed down and took it easy, but they were trying to catch up and bashing through it and they paid the price for it," VanMeter said.

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Trailing by 44 minutes was Team 6, Tyler Huntington and new partner Tre West, who drove their Polaris machines to a second-place finish. Though they placed second, they beat the previous record and continued a tradition of Polaris success in "the world's longest, toughest, snowmobile race."

Third place was secured by Team 2, Ryan Sottosanti and Andrew Zwink, riding Polaris, with a time of 37:33:54. And Team 10, the previous year's winner Chris Olds with new teammate Mike Morgan, riding Polaris, took fourth at 38:06:28.

Minnick and Olstad eventually crossed the line in 11th place.

Make no mistake, the Iron Dog is in a class all its own, no race compares to it whether by mileage, unforgiving terrain or the extreme weather conditions routinely endured by teams and their machines. While 10 teams scratched in 2012, more than 20 teams were able to push beyond Nome and into Fairbanks to complete the race; more finishers than ever before.

Will the 2013 race stack up to 2012? There's a lot of winter between now and the race start so it's hard to predict conditions with any confidence. But, regardless of weather and snowpack, the race will challenge these hard-riding champions; that is certain. Just how is unknown and that's what makes it interesting to those who stand on the sidelines.

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# Record registrations and team diversity

Iron Dog is experiencing a never before seen influx of top competitors from all over

THE 2013 RACE ROSTER is nothing short of spectacular. Organizers say it reflects the diversity of the people of the state and illustrates the cultural-bridging nature of snowmachine racing. For 2013, 40 Pro Class teams with 80 racers have registered to challenge the 2,031 miles from Big Lake to Fairbanks. These racers are mostly Alaskans, but the roster has been bolstered with more rural Alaska involvement and involvement from teams in the Lower 48 or outside the U.S.


"I think it's cool we have such a diversity of riders so that Iron Dog appeals to everyone," says Kevin Kastner, Iron Dog's executive director.

Alaska Native Arthur "Gux" Laraux of Bethel is back for a second run with teammate Steven Boney, also of Bethel, riding Yamaha. Laraux needed little convincing to give Iron Dog a second go. "I had a wonderful experience last year and had so much fun," Laraux said. "It was just a real adventure to experience and there's such wonderful people out there that just made it a lot more fun to come back and give it another year, everyone out there from the volunteers to the fans."

Laraux and Boney placed 14 as rookies with a successfully completed race, and, as Boney is a Yamaha dealer in Bethel, did so riding their Yamaha four-strokes. For 2013 they'll be sticking with their brand.

"I just adapted to the Yamaha really easily," Laraux said, "and while everyone else was trying to save fuel we didn't have to worry about fuel or add any oil with the four-stroke."

Six members of Team Maine Racing will be rolling into town for Iron Dog this year. Among them is the 2011 Cain's Quest champ, Robert Gardner, who rides Ski-Doo. Having











had a great first experience in Iron Dog last year, he too will be tackling Alaska's backcountry for a second time.

"After we won Cain's Quest in 2011 it seemed liked a natural progression to go race Iron Dog," said Gardner.

He and teammate David Hammond completed a successful race in 2012 and Gardner knew he'd be back.

"With Cain's Quest off for 2013 I probably would have been back to Iron Dog no matter what, but it certainly made it a lot easier to have had the experience of

meeting the people along the way that were unbelievably helpful and nice and just couldn't go out of their way enough for us," said Gardner. "We felt like frickin rock stars."


Now riding with Chad Jones, Gardner is aware Iron Dog experienced unusually fair weather last year. Having been in terrible conditions during Cain's Quest, he says he's ready if things take a turn toward the worse but plans "to ride as hard as he can no matter what."

"Two of our three teams will have that same competitive mindset where we'll just ride hard and if we crash we crash, if we break we break; we're not really going to care," he said. "We're not going to play that conservative, gotta make it through to the end kind of mindset. We'd rather crash and be out then just to say we finished."

Team Maine will be racing cross-country in New York and the I-500 in Minnnesota on their way to Alaska for Iron Dog. The journey will incorporate trucking a caravan of family members and a couple of plane flights to pull off all that racing.

Other racers come from Maine, Minnesota, and two from Canadian provinces. According to Kastner, the astounding team turnout and diversity is the direct result of enhanced media coverage and positive race experiences over the past couple of years. Rural teams, seven in all, are also gaining more support from Native corporations.

And, it didn't hurt the numbers that so many racers finished last year, many are coming back for another run.







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

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

# The long run

Teams battle elements, 2,000 miles of Alaska's backcountry

THE IRON DOG race start will once again be held at Southport Marina on Big Lake where spectators will find ample parking on and off the ice and easy access to the festivities. The most noticeable change comes in the form of a larger, longer race chute to accommodate the growing number of spectators who turn out annually to cheer the racers off on their quest.

The start experience includes music, interviews with racers, food, and team preparations before the racers tear through the corridor of cheering fans and across the lake.

Watching the start from home will be made possible by KTUU Channel 2, which will provide live race coverage at the start, on the trail and at the finish.

From Big Lake the course travels through remote checkpoints at Skwentna, Nikolai, Poorman, Unalakleet and Nome. Pro Class racers leave Nome to visit Tanana, Manley Hotsprings and North Pole on their way to Fairbanks. Mandatory layovers are required at these and other checkpoints. However, this year teams have been given greater freedom for where and when they take those layovers. This ensures they all get adequate rest, yet gives teams more room to strategize. The flexibility is also meant to keep teams from being forced to push on to specific layover locations. Weather, daylight or mechanical issues can now be managed the way teams want.

Of course, as always, teams are released from the start in sequence. This means that even though a team may appear on GPS tracking to be ahead on the trail, they may in fact be behind other racers who covered the same ground faster. This is another factor taken into account when teams choose to take a layover or push on.

They don't call Iron Dog the longest, toughest snowmobile race for nothing. The toughness comes from enduring deep snow, whiteouts, frozen rivers, trenches, open water, sometimes bare ground, and every racer's nightmare, the kidney jarring tussocks. The length is unmatched.

Since 2011 the course has stretched over 2,000 miles. The additional mileage was the result of routing the course around Fairbanks on the Tanana River, through Fort Wainwright Recreation Area, through North Pole, to the Corps of Engineers flood project. They eventually enter the frozen Chena River from the opposite direction as in previous years.

Now in 2013 the same route will continue, having provided for a better finish in downtown Fairbanks. The Corps of Engineers flood project also proved to be a great place for spectators to watch racers cruise toward the finish line.

At the end of the day when all racers are accounted for, Iron Dog hosts the awards ceremony at Pike's Waterfront Lodge. Again, TV and other media will be there to cover the action and keep fans posted on the final results of this magnificent test of rider skill, endurance and snowmachine engineering.

#### **NORTHBOUND LAYOVER LOCATIONS AND TIMES**

Up to four layovers will be required during Northbound racing. Three layovers will be fixed at eight hours each and a flexible layover at six hours for a Northbound total of thirty hours. The flexible layover may be used on its own or in combination with one of the fixed eight hour locations listed by or before Kaltag. Layovers must be taken in any one of the listed locations and regions as follows:

- Northbound Layover #1: Skwentna or Puntilla or Rohn or McGrath
- Northbound Layover #2: Ruby or Galena or Kaltag
- Northbound Layover #3: Unalakleet or Koyuk or White Mountain
- Six hour flexible Layover: Skwentna or Puntilla or Rohn or McGrath or Ruby or Galena or Kaltag

#### SOUTHBOUND LAYOVER LOCATIONS AND TIMES

Two layovers will be required during southbound racing. Both layovers will be fixed at ten hours for a southbound total of twenty hours. Layovers must be taken in any one of the listed locations and regions as follows:

- Southbound Layover #1: Koyuk or Unalakleet or Kaltaa
- Southbound Layover #2: Galena or Ruby
- Tanana Hold: A hold in Tanana will ensure racers finish on the same day.

#### NOME ARRIVAL AND RELEASE PROCEDURES


All participating Pro Class teams must arrive in Nome by 11:59 p.m. on the fourth day of the race, Wednesday. The Nome restart is scheduled for the morning of the fifth day, Thursday. Any Pro Class team that does not arrive into Nome within the required time limit is automatically scratched.

#### **RACE RESTART**

The halfway release will begin at 8 a.m., Thursday morning.

- Teams 1-5 will be released on their actual trail split times not to exceed 45 minutes apart. After the release of the fifth team there will then be a 30 minute break.
- Teams 6-10 will then be released on their actual trail split times not to exceed 30 minutes. After the release of the tenth team there will be a 15 minute break.
- Teams 11-15 will then be released on their actual trail split times not to exceed 15 minutes. After the release of the fifteenth team there will be a 10 minute break

The remainder of the teams will then be released on their actual trail split times or every 10 minutes whichever comes first. Course Times will reflect any Nome work times and time adjustments.

# Iron Dog leads in philanthropy

Bringing people together and supporting good causes across Alaska

A LONG WITH the fast moving men and machines, the Iron Dog has become a leader in promoting charitable giving and raising cultural awareness throughout the great state of Alaska.

"The Iron Dog, especially in the last few years, has become much more than a race because there's the Urban Rural Student Exchange program to add some cultural balance to this and also what we're doing with our charitable partners to use this as an avenue to do some charitable giving in the community," says Iron Dog executive director Kevin Kastner.

The exchange program is unique to the racing community, giving young students the opportunity to not only be involved with the race but to travel around the state and share their community and culture with one another.

Young people often serve as volunteers in villages through which the race passes. Their hands-on involvement includes just about any task that requires their assistance including working with the timers, maintaining signage and setting up fencing, They also have fun learning about race logistics and the value of volunteerism.

"We put them in roles of responsibility and especially over the last couple years we've seen that it really helps with their self-esteem," says Kastner. "We had one student that was checking badges and he got so excited about it that his comment after the race was that he might want to be a police officer. He got a little taste of authority, and he thought that was fun. It gave him some ambition."

Another benefit to the program is the travel. Students are given the opportunity to visit remote villages or come to the city.

"They're learning about resource development, subsistence lifestyle, learning about the cost of living and energy costs," Kastner says, "so there's a lot of practical learning about hunting and trapping and a cultural exchange."

The hope is that this experience will help students understand the wide cultural gap that exists between urban and rural Alaska and help them become well-rounded, critically thinking Alaskans. Iron Dog plans to expand the program to include more schools in the future.


Iron Dog also supports Armed Services YMCA. "We're benefitting in several ways, through advertisements to get our name out there and proceeds from raffle tickets we're selling," says Mari Jo Imig, executive director for Armed Services YMCA.

# 30 years and stronger than ever

THREE DECADES OF RACING has proven that Iron Dog has the long-term support of the adventurous men and women in the snowmachine community. Competitors come for many reasons: adventure, tradition, to seek the prize money, or simply to test their abilities. No matter the reason, since the very beginning Iron Dog, much like Alaska itself, has been best suited for the strong at heart.

Just ask John Faeo, Iron Dog's first champion of the inaugural race in 1984 with teammate Rod Frank. Their race route was 1,049 miles long with a finish time of 23:50. Covering the course in less than a day was challenging to say the least.

"You've got to be tough, that's for sure," says Faeo. "You've got to be willing to go out there and take some chances."

He cautions rookie racers that "it's a no man's land out there," solid white, often with nothing for perspective.

For years Iron Dog racers relied on a compass and sectional charts to help them find their way. Today, preprogrammed GPS units help racers stay on course so they can focus on riding harder and faster while staying safe.

Today's clothing has added a new level of safety, too. Faeo won in Levis, wool pants and a nylon bib. You didn't want to get too sweaty in that, but there was little hope of staying dry. Early racers worked hard to break trail. Machines of

the day allowed just four to five inches of suspension travel and only limited traction by today's standards. Faeo's 1984 Indy Trail 440 carried him to victory but the machine's limitations made deep snow a dreaded challenge and hindered race progress.

"We were constantly leap-frogging and taking turns breaking trail because no one guy could break away," Faeo says. "There was no feasible way. It took a series of bodies out there to plug along and punch the trial open because even the villagers back then couldn't commute as far and easy and that's what we rely on today, the local village traffic routes."


Today's machines perform better and have made travel easier across bush Alaska. Faeo would rather ride 2,000 miles on a new snowmachine than 1,000 on the old one.

Though the new machines have made the ride less challenging, the longer course has brought the current race on par with the old one.

For almost ten years the course was just over 1,000 miles long, but in 1993 length was doubled to 2,000 miles. In 1998 the course was rerouted to Alaska's second largest city, Fairbanks, altering the mileage to 1,971 miles.

The most impressive course change since then was in 2011 when race organizers routed teams through North Pole and then into Fairbanks from the east. This not only pushed the mileage





There's no doubt that despite the improvements of today's snowmachines with comfortable riding positions, powerful motors and improved suspension, Iron Dog will still put man and machine through the paces. Racing over 2,031 miles of bone shaking, pride swallowing, extreme terrain – in the middle of winter no less – is enough to make any rider cash in their chips at the nearest checkpoint.

And no matter what happens, we'll be able to see it in real time through media coverage and online tracking. Observation of the world's, longest, toughest snowmachine race has increased by 300 to 400 percent over the last few years according Iron Dog staff.

"I think Iron Dog developed out of a group of people with the idea for this challenge, a challenge among friends," said Kastner. "That remains fairly the same today. It's stayed the same in the sense that that's still a big reason for people to come, the challenge. Sort of like, why do people climb Mount McKinley? Well, because it's there."

Kastner added that though many aspects of the race have changed over the years, its essence remains the same, calling on riders to use their physical abilities, navigation skills and mechanical acuity to cross one of the most unforgiving landscapes on the planet.



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

THE FIRST IRON DOG was known as the Iditarod Iron Dog Classic, ended in Nome, and was won by John Faeo and Rod Frank riding Polaris with a time of 23:50.

Iron Dog is a **FAMILY TRADITION**. After thirty years, Iron Dog's first champion, John Faeo, will be flying cover for his two sons, John Jr. and Scott, riding Polaris, during their rookie race this year.

Today's **RECORD TIME** is 35:39:56 set by Marc McKenna and Dusty VanMeter just last year on their Ski-Doos.

McKenna and VanMeter's record time was set on the new **2,031-MILE COURSE**, but their time also topped leading times for the previous 1,971-mile and 2,000-mile courses.

Compared to the first Iron Dog at 1,049 miles and a winning time of 23:50, McKenna and VanMeter's 2012 race was nearly double the length, yet only took 1.5 times longer to complete. They averaged **60 MILES PER HOUR** for the duration!

## **Bringing it home**

GPS tracking puts fans in the driver's seat

WEBSITE, BLOG, FORUM and Facebook updates are great, news broadcasts too, but one could argue that it was the invention of GPS tracking that helped Iron Dog fans rediscover their passion for this monumental snowmachine race. In the past, racer's positions where not officially known until they reached a checkpoint. Even then the information would have to be called or radioed in. By the time the information reached fans, it was old news, unless, of course, all the racers were held up at checkpoints or trying to weather a storm. It's almost hard to imagine why anyone would take much interest in a race they couldn't even watch. Luckily, the times have changed.

Each team member, and that includes Trail Class riders, now carries a GPS transponder. Their nearly exact location is continuously analyzed by satellites, and then passed to the system engineers at Ion Earth. All with the magic of computers and software, the racer locations are saved to a database that feeds information to the tracking website, www.irondog.org.

A brief look at Ion Earth's map and the list of racers puts the entire 2,000-plus miles of racing into perspective. All racers are listed and can be sorted by name or team number. Their current speed is available as well as the time since their last location was made available. The data is neat, but the true beauty of GPS tracking is the fact that each racer's location is marked on a map.

For the past few years fans have finally been able to keep an eye on their favorite team, their family member

or friend, as the entire string of racers wind their way across the map, which in the real world equates to a lot of unforgiving Alaska backcountry.

The one thing that must be kept in mind is that the GPS tracking location does not correspond to a racer's standing in the race. Each team is turned loose in succession, not at the same time. Their place is based on the time it takes them to get from point A to point B, not who is physically in the lead. That said, if you see one team pass another that had been turned loose earlier in the lineup, unless the passing was caused by a choice in layover location, you've got some excitement on your hands. Likewise, a team sitting still for a length of time might be in trouble or suffering from a mechanical problem.

So, use GPS tracking wisely as it was intended, a tool to help fans stay connected with the action. As for the actual results of that action, keeping tabs on Iron Dog's regular website and Facebook posts is the only way to go.

## Community support keeps Iron Dog on track

THE DIVERSE COMMUNITIES along the Iron Dog's circuitous exploration Alaska are as much a part of the race as the challenging trail. Last year's newcomer and past Cain's Quest champion, Robert Gardner, praised the overwhelming generosity and involvement by the people who live along course, which made his team feel like rock stars. Locals like Arthur Laraux and Steven Boney of Bethel say the interacting with volunteers is one of their favorite aspects of the race.

Without the support of these communities the race could not be successful so here's a round up of the communities, small and large, that rally to support the race and racers every year.

#### **WASILLA**

Wasilla is central to the race organization, hosting the Iron Dog Safety Expo. The expo includes a tech inspection, banquet, side events, and a chance for the public to meet and greet with racers and the Iron Dog staff prior to race day. The event will be held at the Menard Sports Center.

Wasilla is a growing community and commercial district along the Parks Highway, just prior to the Big Lake turnoff where the race start is held. The population has surpassed 10,000, while the land size is a mere 12.4 square miles.

#### **BIG LAKE**

For years Big Lake has hosted the start of the race with direct access to the Iditarod Trail and as the perfect setting for spectators to watch race teams speed off on their long expedition. Annual ice roads are plowed on the ice allowing for vehicle access to all areas of the lake, and the starting line, also positioned on the ice, provides a flat field for teams to gather and prepare before taking off.

The community of Big Lake is home to 3,000 people spread over an area of 131.9 square miles. Big Lake is a longtime vacation and recreation area, though more and more permanent residents are moving into the area.

#### NOME

Until 1994, Nome was officially the race finish, tying Iron Dog to the Gold Rush history of Alaska, hence the earlier race name, Gold Rush Classic. In 1994 the race finish was moved to Fairbanks. Nome remains heavily involved in the race as a halfway point, perhaps more involved now than before.

Instead of hosting the ending of the long journey, Nome now facilitates the Trail Class finish, numerous support efforts and crews, lodging and banquets for Trail Class and Pro Racers, and a race restart.

Nome is located in western Alaska on the coast of the Bering Sea, and the surrounding area is some of the most challenging on the course due to ice shelves and open water conditions.

#### **FAIRBANKS**

Since 1994 Fairbanks has been the official finish of the race. Fairbanks facilitates the final rallying of Pro Class racers who completed the entire 2,000-mile journey. Fairbanks is home to the final banquet and awards ceremony.

Since 2011, the racers finish near downtown after traveling along the Chena River from the east through North Pole.

Fairbanks is Alaska's second largest city and home to more 50,000. It is known as the home of University of Alaska Fairbanks, the popular Chena Hot Springs Resort, and the World Ice Art Championships.

SMALLER CHECKPOINTS, fueling stations and layover locations include:

**SKWENTNA**, population 111, is located on mostly flat land in Southcentral Alaska on the Skwentna River. It is 89 miles from the start.

**PUNTILLA**, population two, is located on Puntilla Lake near a breathtaking mountain pass. Punilla is 161 miles from the start.

**ROHN**, population zero, is located at a small roadhouse where two rivers join, is 236 miles from the start.

**NIKOLAI**, population 93, is 310 miles from the start on the south fork of the Kuskokwim River.

**MCGRATH**, population 379, located on the Innoko River, is 362 miles from the start.

**OPHIR**, population zero, is 425 miles from the start located on the Innoko River.

**POORMAN**, population zero, located in a flatland region and marks the last checkpoint before the Yukon River, is 524 miles from the start.

**RUBY,** population 178, is on the Yukon River and marks the turning point to Nome. Pro racers pass through Ruby twice, first 596 miles from the start on the way to Nome and again at mile 1.620 on the return route to Fairbanks.

**GALENA**, population 641, is an Athabascan village in the Interior, located 648 miles from the start on the way to Nome and 1,568 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**KALTAG**, population 218, marks the turn north off the Yukon River and toward the coast, and is 746 miles from the start on the way to Nome and 1,470 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**UNALAKLEET**, population 752, located also on the coast of Norton Sound north of the Unalakleet River, is 841 miles from the start on the way to Nome and is 1,375 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**SHAKTOOLIK**, population 230, located on a point jutting into Norton Sound, is 882 miles from the start and 1,334 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**KOYUK**, population 299, located on the coast, is 939 miles from the start on the way to Nome and is 1,277 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**WHITE MOUNTAIN**, population 209, located on the Fish River, is 1,033 miles from the start on the way to Nome and is 1,183 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

**TANANA**, population 290, located on the Yukon River is 1,740 miles from the start.

**MANLEY HOT SPRINGS**, population 72, is 1,812 miles from the start.

**NENANA**, population 371, located on Mile 305 of the George Parks Highway, is 1,917 miles from the start.

**NORTH POLE**, population 2,183, located on the Richardson Highway, just south of Fairbanks. North Pole was added to the race course in 2011 to facilitate a new finish location in Fairbanks, and increases the course distance to over 2031 miles.


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
