Ultimate Test

IN THE FALL OF 1983, Bob Kowalke of Anchorage Cycle Sales called a meeting and a group of racers gathered in his office. Anchorage Cycle was the Alaska Yamaha distributor and the word had come from Yamaha Motor Corp. that they wanted to promote a long-distance race in Alaska. Yamaha had been organizing the I-500 from Winnipeg, Canada, to St. Paul, Minn., but they were looking for a new, tougher challenge to prove their product. Instead of a 500-mile race in highway ditches, they wanted to race at least 1,000 miles across the most rugged terrain on earth: Alaska.

Maps were spread across Kowalke's floor, various plans were floated and discarded. Solo racers or teams? Would racers travel independently, packing their own fuel and supplies or would checkpoints be established? Where would it start and finish? Bethel? Barrow? Nome? Could a route be found that was even feasible?

Eventually, the plan evolved: twoman teams racing over 1,000 miles from Wasilla to Nome with required fuel stops every 100 miles and mandatory rest. Over the years, there have been many changes. In order to avoid conflicts with the Iditarod, the first race didn't start until late March, which proved to be too late in the spring. The next year, the date was moved to mid-February. The route has also changed a number of times. In 1993, the race ran round trip from Wasilla to Nome, and the length was doubled. In 1998, the finish line was moved to Fairbanks for the first time. One thing has stayed the same all those years: The Iron Dog is the ultimate test of man and machine.

This year will mark our 32nd event, and for the first time, we will start in downtown Anchorage. More than 100 racers will head for Nome and thousands of spectators and fans will be right there with them. They'll travel over two mountain ranges, battle extreme cold and the harshest conditions an Alaskan winter can dish out. The Iron Dog is the longest, toughest snowmobile race in the world.

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IRON DOG OFFICIAL GUIDE

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A SPECIAL THANK YOU TO OUR CONTINGENCY PRIZE SPONSORS AND TO EVERY ONE OF OUR GREAT IRON DOG COMMUNITIES, CHECKERS, VOLUNTEERS AND MEMBERS.

EVEN 30 YEARS AGO, having challenged teams to ride from McGrath (due to poor weather) to Nome, Iron Dog wasn't just asking racers to cover a long distance. It was pitting them against Mother Nature's worst mood swings, an unforgiving terrain, and the kind of remoteness one might feel on the open sea—if the sea was passing by at 80 mph. And now, with the inclusion of Downtown Anchorage as a ceremonial starting location, combined with the previous checkpoint additions of Fairbanks in 1998 and North Pole in 2011, Iron Dog's total course length is 2,050 miles. For anyone impressed — and you should be — or looking for a reason to get out and cheer, Pro Class teams begin their quest on Saturday, Feb. 21, in Anchorage with a restart scheduled for Sunday, Feb. 22. in Big Lake. Trail Class riders begin their journey earlier on Friday, Feb. 20, also in Big Lake.

While Trail Class teams cover much of the same terrain, getting checkpoints warmed up for the action and breaking a bit of trail, their journey will end in Nome with no hard pressure to get there. Pro teams will cover the extra ground from Anchorage to Eagle River for the ceremonial start.

They'll restart in Big Lake the following day then continue as in previous years to Nome for an initial 1,000 miles. From there, teams are released in the order they arrived to make a mad dash for Fairbanks over some of the fastest terrain — if snow and ice conditions cooperate. This extra leg from Nome to Fairbanks, by way of frozen rivers, open tundra, and a southeasterly swing into North Pole before turning back north for the Fairbanks finish on Chena River gives us the total 2,050 miles.

WHAT'S THAT MEAN for man and machine? It means more than 2,000 miles worth of jaw-jarring, frigid, Alaska terrain. Over seven days of exposure to the elements with limited sleep. Variations in snow cover from plush yet fuel-robbing powder to dry gravel and even open water crossings exist along the entire route.

Having experienced poor snow conditions last year, racers are hoping for an improvement.


"Last year's race conditions were tough," said Todd Minnick, last year's champion with Nick Olstad as Team 16, riding Polaris. "We had our machines out there with very minimal snow conditions — and ice conditions actually, up on the coast — so we're hoping for better snow and better ice this year but it's not looking so good to start with"

Lack of snow and ice affects engine temperatures and increases the abuse on both the machine suspension and the racer. Ice, in particular, keeps racers from having to skip open water and allows them to travel the rivers safely. However, a new rule for 2015 states that racers are not permitted to utilize coastal ice in one particular section of the race

Minnick said, "That's from Unalakleet to Shaktoolik, only."

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
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He emphasizes how valuable that crossing has been in the past for strategizing during competition. In fact it helped Team 16 get back into the leading pack last year, to eventually win the race, despite an early crash and serious illness. The same couldn't be said for Team 8, Tyler Aklstad and Tyson Johnson, riding Ski-Doo. When crossing the same area of ice Akslstad broke through near the shore, taking a dive in the water. The resulting sled recovery effort, towing and repairs, as well as drying out gear in Shaktoolik, robbed them of any chance of winning the race. The incident, along with past coastal incidents near Unalakleet, sparked the Iron Dog board of directors to establish the new rule to mitigate the risk.

To racers like Minnick, who had multiple successful experiences crossing that ice, the opportunity will be missed, but all racers recognize the Iron Dog possesses many more challenges.

"That's kind of the whole point of that race; it's just one big risk," Minnick said.

Team 16 is ready to take on those risks once again, and Minnick and Olstad know full well that the race doesn't belong to the champions. They'll have to work as hard as ever to keep their title.

"There's ten teams now that could win this race," Minnick said. "There used to be two or three or four, and maybe a wild card."

He attributes the competitive field partially to the number of riders who switched to riding Polaris, a brand with more Iron Dog wins than any other.

"With Marc McKenna coming over [to Polaris]

and Todd Palin coming over, there's two winning teams right there added to the already strong mix of Polaris teams," Minnick said. "And if you look at the historical data the last few years, the Polaris teams are in the Top 5 heavily."

McKenna won the previous two years of Iron Dog with Dusty VanMeter riding Ski-Doo. This year McKenna teams up with rookie Allen Hill, Team 17, riding Polaris.

Fans won't see VanMeter in the race, but he'll be watching as a spectator and expects that the Anchorage start and continued publicity will help make Iron Dog a household name and help people around the world to realize what Iron Dog racers endure.

"You watch some of this other stuff on TV and think man, if people could just see what we do and what we've got to go through, all the ingenuity to keep things going out there, and everybody's got their heartache somewhere along the way that you overcome and keep going, things like that, you know, it's a big deal," VanMeter said. "And every step they make that brings it [Iron Dog] more into the limelight is good for the race."

SEVENTY-FOUR RACERS will participate this year, riding in 37 teams on all popular make of snowmachine. Most teams consist of veteran Iron Dog racers, including a handful of previous champs. Twenty-eight riders are rookies, most riding in all-rookie teams (including an all-female team) and it goes without saying they'll probably need to learn the ropes before securing a win. Knowledge and experience is key to knowing how to pace your race, when to relax and when to open the throttle wide, and how to stay healthy and focused.

returning to run Pro Class in 2015

The 2015 race continues to attract racers from outside Alaska, and Idaho racer Randy Gravatt attests the benefits of being a veteran racer.

"I wish I had done the trail class first and then the real deal," says Randy Gravatt from Idaho of Team 22, riding Arctic Cat. "You really get an understanding of the trail at a slower pace and looking around and learning."

Gravatt ran the Pro Iron Dog in 2012, crashing 60 miles into the race, severely injuring his shoulder and chest and breaking a rib. He pushed on with his teammate but ended up hitting stumps near Rohn, breaking suspension components and losing more time. They left Tanana in 11th place but broke more suspension and finished in 16th place.

"I ended up doing what all the top riders like Marc McKenna told me not to do which was to not crash on the first day," says Gravatt. "I was black and blue like no tomorrow."

Gravatt returned for a Trail Class run in 2014 with a seven-man team that reached Nome with all members, and through a great deal of community support from his home town of Island Park, Idaho he'll be in the Pro Class once again with Deiter Strobel of Minnesota.

It's easy to see why Iron Dog is regarded as the longest, toughest snowmachine race in the world. Thrill-seeking racers from around North America, weather conditions, terrain and both man and machine's abilities and shortcomings culminate to create an unquestionably exiting event. That event, the 2015 Iron Dog, can now be enjoyed by fans more easily than ever before.

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THE WORLD'S LONGEST, TOUGHEST, snowma-

chine race is always exciting, and the 2014 match was no exception. But last year, when news was shared about a possible first-time-ever, downtown Anchorage start, it was a little hard to focus on the race in motion while daydreaming about the year ahead. After three decades of racing, an Anchorage start is one of the biggest developments Iron Dog has ever known, up there with the 1998 addition of Fairbanks as the race finish.

Now, after much planning and community support, Iron Dog has made good on their plans, adding another of Alaska's largest communities to the course. 

"There's been quite a few months of buildup to this, of course, so once we got the full approval from not only the municipality but JBER, the (Alaska) Railroad and the Port of Anchorage, yeah, we were really excited from both the perspective of the board and staff, and to a degree the racers have been real supportive," Kastner says. "They recognize that it brings additional attention not only to the race but to them and their supporters."

A benefit to the new start location is improved accessibility. Fans from all around the Anchorage Bowl, and those flying in from outside Alaska, can finally get a firsthand sense of the action and meet the race teams without braving the long drive to Big Lake. As for the racers, a ceremonial start means a bit of fun for them, too.

Spectators will find the Iron Dog teams more available and approachable. As Kastner puts it, they'll be in a "non-race mode" compared to the Big Lake start when teams are keenly focused on race preparations and visualizing what they'll encounter down the trail. Kastner also emphasizes just how much of an improvement the downtown Anchorage start will be for sponsors and volunteers.

"Everyone will be able to duck into a local business to get warm, grab a hot bite to eat, have a coffee or beer, and relax and have a great time," he said.

IRON DOG ORGANIZERS expect a lot more participation on all fronts. But if accessibility, firsthand experience and comfort amenities aren't enough to entice a bigger crowd, then perhaps the additional festivities are. Iron Dog has a lot more to offer than a parade of snowmachines.

"Maybe some people aren't interested in cross-country snowmachine racing but they're interested in vintage races, the kids' Iron Pup 120 race, or the freestyle show with X-Games riders showing another snowmachine extreme," Kastner says. "From a spectator standpoint, it's more exciting and will appeal to a broader audience."

Best viewing areas for the ceremonial start in Anchorage

A MAJORITY OF THE ACTION in downtown Anchorage will take place on **Fourth Avenue** for two to three blocks from **D Street to G Street**. Iron Dog teams will first head east on Fourth Avenue between G and E streets, then turn north on E Street, and finally along Second Avenue heading downhill past First Avenue and across Ship Creek before vanishing through Port of Anchorage property on their way onto JBER property.

Spectators will be able fill the sidewalks along this route, or even stand in **Barrow Park** or the hill on either side of Second Avenue. From the Iron Dog starting line to First Avenue is also the same route that will be used for an initial parade of teams. There's plenty of room for all to watch the action.

Vintage and Iron Pup exhibitions will take place on Fourth Avenue from the starting line all the way to D Street and back

As for the **Flying Iron Freestyle Show**, fans can watch the aerobatics at the EasyPark lot on Third Avenue, between C and E streets. The lot will be sectioned off with a specific spectator area and hospitality tent adjacent to the snowmachine ramp and landing area.

Don't let parking get you down

PARKING ISN'T A PROBLEM. Arrive early and take your time finding a good spot. Iron Dog is cooperating with EasyPark and other facilities to ensure spectators have improved signage and even parking promotions to save a couple bucks. There are multiple parking garages within a couple blocks of all the events. Iron Dog's preferred location is the **EasyPark** Fifth Avenue and B Street Garage. Other options are the garage connected to the bus station at G Street and Sixth Avenue. the garage at Fifth Avenue and K Street, or seeking out one of many paid and free parking lots nearby. Another alternative is to park along the Delaney Park on 10th Avenue. It's a bit farther to walk, but always a sure bet.

According to Iron Dog, fans also can expect plenty of hospitality from sponsors and vendors, food, T-shirt giveaways, and other fun.

As for any drawbacks to hosting in Downtown, there aren't many. Of course people will need to navigate to the best parking options (watch for parking promotions from EasyPark and additional signage), and there are additional concerns with snowmachines or other moving vehicles involved with the race, and road closures and how that might affect certain businesses has been taken into consideration.

Fortunately, downtown Anchorage, including the Mayor's Office, businesses and

nearby residents are no strangers to hosting enormous events. Anchorage will now have a Triple Crown of knockout events to spark spring tourism and the economy. Iron Dog, followed closely behind by Fur Rondy and then the Iditarod, should make for some exciting, fun-filled weeks. Combined with Anchorage Centennial celebration activities, Anchorage, at 100 years old, looks to be ushering in a new era of tourism and prosperity. Visit Anchorage president and CEO Julie Saupe had already reported an increase in tourism and visitations to Anchorage in late-2014 even prior to new events and expos, and the prospects for continued growth through these events is promising. •

This might include something as simple as vis-

iting the Anchorage Museum or Native Heritage Center, or perhaps taking a flightseeing excursion or going for a ski at a nearby resort. There's fine dining, trails to explore, coastal views, sports events and so much more.

Visitors should pick up one of the many community travel guides and tour maps at the downtown Visitor Information Center at Fourth Avenue and F Street, and utilize the Visit Anchorage website, www.anchorage.net. Alaska.org is another site with useful trip-planning information, and below you'll find some brief advice on enjoying the area.

One of the best ways to see the city is by foot. The heart of downtown Anchorage is just a few blocks up the hill from its tent city roots on Ship Creek in 1915. Between A and L streets and Second to Eighth avenues, find historic buildings dating back to as early as 1915.



COFFEE

With the chilly weather you might want grab an espresso or top off your thermos with a hot chocolate. Numerous coffee shops are located along the walking route, providing several opportunities to rest weary feet.

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
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




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Iron Dog Facts

THE MOST IMPORTANT and often misunderstood rule Iron Dog teams must abide by is that racers are not allowed to accept parts or assistance from bystanders outside of checkpoints. Racers are not allowed to have anyone touch their snowmachines, except when in Nome, where under the watchful eye of race marshals, they are allowed to have two others assist during work time in the Nome City garage. The reason for this rule and many rules like it is to level the competitive field for teams that cannot afford to have their own chase aircraft or similar advantages dictated by a larger budget. In fact, for 2015 the Board of Directors clarified a fueling rule that makes it explicitly clear that racers must use fuel provided by Iron Dog, dispensed directly into their race snowmachine. Some teams were interpreting express checkpoints and other locations as places they could setup their own fueling stations to avoid having to stop in the official checkpoints in an effort to shave time off their stops. Nearly every "unique" rule is attempting to address two key factors: No. 1, safety; and No. 2, leveling the field for competition.

THE MOST COMMON SLED MODIFICATION is

focused on suspension. Iron Dog is a long race and conditions can be brutal. Add to the fact that racers are required to take certain gear, the additional weight only adds to the abuse on the suspension. Second to suspension, is the need for extra fuel, so nearly every Pro Class snowmachine will have some kind of auxiliary fuel tank system to compensate for speed, distance and conditions that impact fuel consumption. As Chris Olds is known for saying, "a slow ride beats a fast walk every time."

IRON DOG HAS NOT EXPERIENCED A

FATALITY directly related to the Iron Dog race. There have been several close calls and traumatic injuries over the years, but so far everyone has survived and recovered. Most recently, in 2013 Tyler Huntington was on a training run and hit some driftwood along the coast while doing more than 75 mph. He fractured his pelvis. In the last couple of years, there've been a few wrecks with lacerated spleens, punctured livers, broken wrists and ankles... and the most common injury of severe frostbite. It's a tough race, and the competition is fierce, so bumps and bruises come with the 2,050-mile territory.

GIVING BACK

Iron Dog spreads its influence throughout race trail communities

AS A STATEWIDE, HIGH-PROFILE EVENT, Iron Dog continues to address its responsibility to improve communities and give back. Sponsors, too, know that when they give to Iron Dog, their monetary support trickles not only into the local economy through the services Iron Dog pays for, but directly to charitable organizations, beneficiaries of Iron Dog fundraising efforts and donations.

One might think Iron Dog's raffle tickets strictly benefit the race, but truth be told, up to 50 percent of the proceeds in 2015 will be donated to Armed Services YMCA of Alaska (ASYMCA). Raffle tickets are sold to win prizes such as a Toyota Tundra pickup compliments of Kendall Toyota, a GFMOTO Z6 side-by-side from Alaska Powersports, and an Aluma Tilt trailer from White Spruce Trailer Sales & Super Clamps, among many other prizes.

ASYMCA of Alaska was chosen as the 2015 beneficiary via an online voting process by which the Iron Dog community and fans were able to dictate who should get the funds.

IRON DOG CONTINUES TO IMPROVE The Lives and Education of Children

Since 2001 Iron Dog, along with community and school leadership, has managed the

Urban-Rural Exchange Program and their efforts to connect urban school students with those in rural villages is paying off and getting attention.

"It has been very well received," says Iron Dog's executive director, Kevin Kastner. "The word is beginning to spread and schools are now reaching out to us, asking to be included."

According to Iron Dog, giving kids from villages and checkpoints the chance to be a part of something much bigger is paying dividends for Iron Dog and for the communities.

"I see it as a long-term investment in building rapport with the communities along the trail and the rest of Alaska who may not be able to engage in Iron Dog otherwise," Kastner says. "In a way, it's another mechanism of giving back to those who support us."

The program, now in its fifth year, is seeing success. Iron Dog reports stories of students making lasting friendships, including two girls who met during the exchange, one from Anchorage, the other from Galena, who are now roommates at UAA. News has filtered in of rural students who were struggling with rough situations at home who found hope and new direction for their own lives, turning away from depression and believing there is a

future for them. And for the urban students, the eye-opening experience of rural costs of living, subsistence living and cultural differences makes a lasting impression for future Alaskan adults.

Throughout the process students are engaged in various Iron Dog activities, and this year's choice to cooperate with Barrow coincides with Alaska National Guard

"The perspective it gives city kids cannot be overstated," Kastner says.

Students are required to record their experiences and share what they learned in the process. Sponsors also receive a complete package of thank-you letters, presentations and journals of the students participating in the program. Along with the annual cooperation with King Career Center with students from Eagle River and Anchorage, Barrow students will partake in Iron Dog race activities, being flown in to spend time working with urban students for three days. They return home and the Anchorage students will then fly out a few days later to Barrow to spend time learning about rural

projects and missions to connect with that community as well.


SOUTH ANCHORAGE HIGH MEDIA TEAM LIVE COVERAGE

In addition to greater start and finish coverage provided by Channel 2 News, and enhanced coverage for media drops likely to be provided by GCI, Iron Dog worked with the South Anchorage High media team to provide coverage as well.

"We're working on beefing up the infrastructure and believe GCI will be stepping up for that, and in addition, along with our Student Exchange Program we're working with the South Anchorage High media team — they held a live stream event of our Rookie Workshop which has never happened before — and again working with GCI and Ravn Alaska airlines, we're trying to have that sort of augmented experience at every event," says Kastner.

Iron Dog fans can expect Iron Dog's January media event to be live on the Internet. Live streaming would then be focused on the Donlin Gold's Safety Expo, and every other venue during Iron Dog events. Included are plans to have a live feed of the Nome City Garage at the halfway point of the race, the finish and the final awards banquet.

"Those students will also go to Barrow this year with our Student Exchange Program and shadow the students so that at the end they'll have this whole documented piece put together of the experience of the Iron Dog from a student perspective," Kastner

THE IRON DOG IS MADE POSSIBLE by sponsors.

Whether private, corporate or governmental agencies, sponsors ensure Iron Dog can foot the bill to present such an enormous race, tackle logistical concerns and provide racers with a big enough race purse to make all their hard work and risks worthwhile.

Iron Dog's primary sponsor, Alaska National Guard, has been helping Iron Dog to grow and improve, and they, too, have benefitted and adapted to Iron Dog's involvement in Alaska's communities.

"The Guard provides the largest cash sponsorship," said Iron Dog executive director Kevin Kastner. "Over the years they have provided some media, promotional and field help, but we really try hard to do all the lifting for them so they can focus on recruitment while participating at our events."

The Guard's cash support strongly compliments Iron Dog's ability to promote the events while the vast number of in-kind supporters makes the race logistically possible. Without them, it would have been very difficult for Iron Dog to consider adding events to Anchorage. And, there's more.

"What most don't know about are the number of 'extra' events we conduct with the Guard around the actual Iron Dog events," Kastner said. "This year alone we will have partnered events with Iron Dog, Alaska National Guard and Donlin

Sponsors generate potential employees and recruits by leveraging the excitement of Iron Dog and demonstrating how perseverance, hard work and dedication can pay off, both in racing and in life. And Iron Dog looks to a continued, mutually beneficial relationship.

"There are too many to mention," Kastner said, adding that without the 30-plus years of support by Northern Air Cargo, Iron Dog probably could not carry on the race logistically. This also applies to Everts Air Cargo, Ryan Air, Ravn Alaska, Carlile, Lynden and many others. Logistics are expensive and these partners do most of the heavy lifting that make the race possible.

Your best viewing opportunities: on-location, couch potato, desktop and mobile race viewing By Justin Matley

IRON DOG KNOWS THERE ARE THOUSANDS of new fans out there, if only the race was a little easier to connect with and follow. What makes Iron Dog so great, the "longest, toughest" side of it, is also what has made it historically challenging with regard to spectator viewing. But 2015 promises to tip the scale in favor of greater spectator participation.

TO SEE THE ACTION LIVE

If you're new to participating in the Iron Dog action, keep in mind there are multiple opportunities, leading up to and after the race, to meet teams, ask questions and determine if you have what it takes to become a future Iron Dog competitor. Drop in on the **DONLIN GOLD SAFETY EXPO** held for the first time at **GABELA'S** from 4–8 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 18. This is where teams and their gear are inspected before given approval to race. Fans can talk to racers, check out the snowmachines, and enjoy some extra family fun, excitement, food and Iron Dog gear.

Two days later, on Feb. 20, **DOWNTOWN ANCHORAGE** begins hosting evening events that lead up to the **GEREMONIAL START** of Iron Dog, and on Feb. 21 teams will be parading and greeting fans before heading off. Ask them the tough questions about racing across Alaska in winter, inspect their sled modifications, and above all cheer for them as they speed out of town headed for the local countryside. Watch teams cruise by headed East on Fourth Ave between E and G streets, then north on E Street, and finally along Second Avenue heading down to and across Ship Creek before vanishing. Military





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personnel will have opportunities to see racers cross through Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson, and expect a little viewing as teams get closer to Community Covenant Church in Eagle River, where they'll load and truck machines to Big Lake for a restart the next day.

On Sunday, Feb. 22, Iron Dog will host the RAGE RESTART, which kicks off the official start of the race, on BIG LAKE near Big Lake Power Sports & Marina off South Big Lake Road. See the serious side of Iron Dog, as teams get focused and nerves tense in anticipation to get under way. Teams are released in two-minute intervals and can be seen speeding off across the lake. Expect fewer festivities than in Anchorage, but enjoy some real race action.

If you splurge on a ticket to **NOME**, or live there already, you'll get a unique perspective on how hard teams are racing, the toll it takes on them and their machines, the halfway awards banquet and the release for the second leg of the course to Fairbanks.

And in **FAIRBANKS** another festive, downtown experience can be had as the crowd gathers on the frozen Chena River near First Avenue, Lacey Street and Wendell Avenue. Racers can be seen cruising up the river,

making way for the finish. Cheer them on from the sidelines or watch from the bank overhead or the nearby footbridge. If you get cold, duck into a downtown restaurant or café for something hot to eat, or check with Iron Dog sponsors for their offerings.

OUT OF SIGHT. BUT ON YOUR DEVICE

While racers are hundreds of miles into the backcountry, you'll need to rely on technology to stay abreast of the action. Watch enhanced coverage on KTUU Channel 2, listen on the radio, or surf the Iron Dog website and Facebook page.

Expect greater television coverage with **KTUU GHANNEL 2** to include the new Anchorage start and improved checkpoint race coverage as compared to previous years. Plans have been made for KTUU to even cover Fairbanks action for a full hour this year to capture more racers crossing the finish. Expect limited live coverage of the race as racers pass through selected checkpoints and portions of the course trail. Sound bites from those broadcasts will also be broadcast on radio station **KFQD AM 750**.

For those who prefer web-based and mobile viewing information and near-real-time



GPS tracking, the only place to be is the Iron Dog website, **WWW.IRONDOG.ORG**. Look for the Race Tracking section of the site. There you'll find team information, checkpoints and live, GPS tracking. Literally watch teams progress on a map view of Alaska, from checkpoint to checkpoint. GPS tracking provide custom features so you can follow along exactly the way you want and filter out any unwanted information.

It's important to remember that teams are released in succession, so those in front are not necessarily winning the race. The Iron Dog champions are chosen for the fastest time the course was completed overall.

THIS YEAR AN ALL-FEMALE TEAM will be gunning for the Iron Dog finish line. Experienced riders Rachel Kidwell and Ashley Wood, Team 4, riding Polaris, are bringing added energy to the race and hope to be the second women's team ever to complete the course to Fairbanks.

"Rachel completed trail class last year. Ashley's a notable go-getter; she's won the Mayor's Cup and she's an accomplished racer. She's got a long list of successful races," says Iron Dog executive director Kevin Kastner. "Rachel's been on the trail and Ashley hasn't, but she's a great racer, so it'll be exciting to watch them in the Iron Dog."

To date, the only Pro, all-female team to make it to the Fairbanks finish was Jackie Page and Missy McClurg in 2001, placing 15th overall. This year's female team will be picking up the torch for women and attempting to carry it across the finish again, but Team 4's overall desire is to simply take

on the challenge and enjoy it all the way.

"I got into cross-country snowmachine racing a little bit and had always known about the sport and the race, had watched some of the guys race Iron Dog and thought it was an amazing feat," says Team 4's captain Kidwell. "We decided that the Iron Dog sounded like fun."

Kidwell cites Wood's exceptional background and racing skills in general, combined with high energy and mechanical ability, and involvement in the sledding community, as factors that make her a great teammate. Aside from riding and mechanical skills, Kidwell plans to contribute a lot of heart, a desire to never let the team down, and more than enough determination to make it to the finish.

Team 4 knows they have a lot to learn but feel they have strong suits that will aid them in the Iron Dog.

the sport and dedicated to it, and we ride really well. We have the heart for it. Still, we're rookies so there's a whole lot that we still have to learn," she says. "We'll be racing against teams that have raced Iron Dog for 10 or 15 years and they're still probably learning about it."

Kidwell and Wood should put some pressure on the other racers. These experienced riders, with a completed Trail Class run — and the knowledge that goes with it — in the gear bag, are tackling the race with an attitude that bodes well with the Iron Dog mantra to never give up.







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
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

a thriving tourism industry and events such as Fur Rendezvous and Iditarod. Thus an enormous turnout is expected to send race teams off from the Fourth Avenue starting line. Teams will travel 19 miles to Big Lake for a race restart the following day.

BIG LAKE

For years, Big Lake has hosted the start of the race with direct access to the Iditarod Trail and is the perfect setting for spectators to watch race teams speed off to their long expedition. Annual ice roads are plowed on the ice allowing for vehicle access to all areas of the lake, and the starting line, also positioned on the ice, provides a flat field for teams to gather and prepare before taking off. The community of Big Lake is home to 3,000 people spread over an area of 131.9 square miles. Big Lake is a longtime vacation and recreation area, though more and more permanent residents are moving there.


NOME

Until 1994, Nome was officially the race finish, tying Iron Dog to the Gold Rush history of Alaska, hence the earlier race name, Gold Rush Classic. In 1994 the race finish was moved to Fairbanks. Nome remains heavily involved in the race as a halfway point, perhaps more involved now than before. Instead of hosting the ending of the long journey, Nome now facilitates the Trail Class finish, numerous support efforts and crews, lodging and banquets for Trail Class and Pro Racers, and a race restart. Nome is located in western Alaska on the coast of the Bering Sea and the surrounding area is some of the most challenging on the course, due to ice shelves and open water conditions.

FAIRBANKS

Since 1998 Fairbanks has been the official finish of the race. Fairbanks facilitates the final rallying of Pro Class racers who completed the entire 2,050-mile journey. Fairbanks is home to the final banquet and awards ceremony. Since 2011, the racers finish near downtown after traveling along the Chena River from the east through North Pole. Fairbanks is Alaska's second largest city and home to more than 50,000. It is known as the home of University of Alaska Fairbanks, the popular Chena Hot Springs Resort, and the World Ice Art Championships.

SMALLER COMMUNITIES AND CHECKPOINTS

SKWENTNA, population 111, is located on mostly flat land in southcentral Alaska on the Skwentna River. It is 89 miles from the start

PUNTILLA, population 2, is located on Puntilla Lake near a breathtaking mountain pass. Puntilla is 161 miles from the start.

ROHN, population 0, is located at a small roadhouse where two rivers join, and is 236 miles from the start.

NIKOLAI, population 93, is 310 miles from the start on the south fork of the Kuskokwim River.

MCGRATH, population 379, located on the Innoko River, is 362 miles from the start.

OPHIR, population 0, is 425 miles from the start located on the Innoko River.

POORMAN, population 0, located in a flat-land region and the last checkpoint before Ruby, is 524 miles from the start.

RUBY, population 178, is on the Yukon River and marks the turning point to Nome. Pro racers pass through Ruby twice, first 596 miles from the start on the way to Nome and again at mile 1,620 on the return route to Fairbanks.

GALENA, population 641, is an Athabascan village in the Interior, 648 miles from the start on the way to Nome and 1,568 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

SHAKTOOLIK, population 230, is on a point jutting into Norton Sound, 882 miles from the start and 1,334 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

KOYUK, population 299, located on the coast, is 939 miles from the start on the way to Nome and is 1,277 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

white Mountain, population 209, located in the mountains on the Fish River, is 1,033 miles from the start on the way to Nome and is 1,183 miles from the start on the return route to Fairbanks.

TANANA, population 290, located on the Yukon River, is 1,740 miles from the start.

MANLEY HOT SPRINGS, population 72, is 1,812 miles from the start.



NENANA, population 371, located on mile 305 of the George Parks Highway, is 1,917 miles from the start.

NORTH POLE, population 2,183, is located on the Richardson Highway, just south of Fairbanks. North Pole was added to the race course to facilitate a new finish location in Fairbanks, and increased the course distance.






