About the Henry Street House:

The Henry Street House, located at 36 Society Street, is an elegant Greek Revival home located in Ansonborough, one of Charleston's most desirable neighborhoods. Originally built in 1804, the house was destroyed by the Great Fire of 1838. Following the fire, the house was rebuilt on the raised basement of the original building. In 1845 the the size of the structure was doubled by adding rooms and changing the layout from a single house to a double house. Thanks to the efforts of the current owners, the house is now beautifully restored with the attention to detail that makes Charleston famous for its conservation efforts.
