

Felony Disenfranchisement in the Commonwealth of Kentucky

FINDINGS

- 1.) Kentucky is one of four states that permanently disenfranchise all persons with felony convictions even after they have completed their full sentence.
- 2.) Kentucky has the third highest rate of disenfranchisement in the country. One out of every 14 Kentucky residents is disenfranchised, a rate almost three times the national rate.
- 3.) Kentucky has the second highest African American disenfranchisement rate in the country with more than one of every five African Americans ineligible to vote, nearly triple the national rate.
- 4.) 75% of people ineligible to vote because of felony convictions have completed their sentences.



- 5.) In 2001, a simplification of the restoration process increased applications for restoration and the number of people granted their voting rights grew from 831 in 2000 to 1,231 in 2003.
- 6.) In 2004, additional requirements added to the application process produced a decline in the number of people who had their voting rights restored to 164 in 2006.
- 7.) In 2008, removal of some of the additional requirements resulted in an increase in those whose voting rights were restored to 4,260 between 2008 and 2010.
- 8.) Restoration of voting rights in Kentucky depends on the policy of the sitting governor, making it inconsistent and inequitable.

- 1. Place a Constitutional Amendment on the ballot.
- 2. Reexamine and improve the current application process.
- 3. Provide information and assistance three months prior to sentence completion.
- 4. Increase public education on restoration process and resources available.
- 5. Release restoration application and approval data annually.
