Major Progress Seen in 1995 On North Beach Revitalization

Pace to quicken in 1996 with completion of Ocean Terrace and Normandy Isle improvements

After years of planning and discussion, great strides were made in 1995 on a number of important redevelopment efforts that have already begun to transform the face of North Beach. The year also saw a renewed commitment from the City of Miami Beach to upgrading the quality of life in the North Beach community as well as extensive participation by community activists and residents in planning further revitalization activities.

Begun in August, the \$20 million dollar Northshore Streetscape Project is moving forward with completion of the Ocean Terrace section scheduled for this spring. Work on Phase II of the Project, the Normandy Isle area, began in December. The \$1.1 million dollar Southeast Normandy Isle Streetscape Project, completed in mid-December, has given the project area an entirely new look with defined parking areas, new curbs and sidewalks, and hundreds of trees and shrubs.

At the southern end of North Beach, the lushly landscaped **Brittany Bay Park** was completed last spring. (cont'd. p. 2)

Message From the President

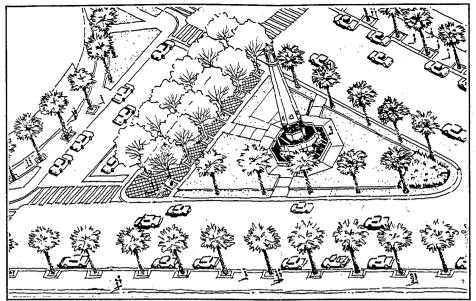
As outlined in the accompanying story, 1995 was a banner year for North Beach revitalization with over \$33 million dollars in public sector improvements underway or set to begin soon. Substantial private sector reinvestment also took place in the form of new and renovated commercial and residential developments.

The outlook for 1996 is even brighter. Completion of the Ocean Terrace and Normandy Isle streetscape renovations will bring new cafes and shops to those areas. Extensive tree planting and beautification will dramatically improve the look and feel of our neighborhoods. Residential development will continue, generating demand for more retail. All in all, it's a very exciting time for North Beach.

As NBDC continues its work in bringing about these North Beach improvements, we remain committed to a community-based revitalization strategy. Last fall, NBDC was asked by the City of Miami Beach to convene a representative group of North Beach residents; propertyowners, and activists to develop a program for allocating North Beach's share of City "Quality of Life" funds. The resulting "Strategic Planning Committee" met over several months and then reached a consensus on a program of projects designed to improve the quality of life in North Beach. The process was a model for citizen participation in community decision-making.

To encourage broad participation in its efforts, NBDC meets on the **third** Tuesday of each month and welcomes anyone interested in working to better the community. Great things are in store for North Beach this year and I invite you to join us in making them happen!

(from p. 1) This scenic park on Indian Creek will become increasingly popular as nearby developments are occupied.

Extensive planning for other revitalization initiatives took place over the year as well. Funding was identified for the Oceanfront Recreational Corridor, a landscaped path which will run along the beach from 63rd to 75th Streets; construction could begin as early as this summer. The City of Miami Beach developed a Three-year Strategic Plan of physical and service improvements for North Beach including the renovation of all City parks, utility and street improvements, and enhanced police protection and code enforcement. The City also made available \$350,000 in Quality of Life funds for which a detailed spending program was developed (see story p.3).

Two North Beach Luxury Condo Towers Completed

Nearly 300 new households to have major economic impact - more new construction planned

Work on two luxury condominium developments in North Beach has been substantially completed with new residents scheduled to move in by spring,

The 19-story Mediterranean-style Florida Tower at 6422 Collins contains 60 two and three bedroom units with expansive bay and ocean views. NOMA Enterprises developed the project.

Taken together, these activities represent a major step forward for North Beach, and, more importantly, set the stage for an even greater accomplishments in 1996.

Grant Funds Available to

Improve Storefronts

NBDC continues to solicit applicants for the North Beach Facade Renovation Program aimed at improving blighted commercial areas and helping businesses that serve low and moderate income customers. Through the Facade Program, matching funds are provided to eligible tenants and property owners to upgrade facades and cor-

The 33-story LaGorce Palace at 6251 Collins boasts a sleek contemporary design with soaring glass columns. Developed by Pacific International Equities, the project contains 208 two and three bedroom units.

Plans were recently announced for another development at 6395 Collins, the 47-story White Diamond, which will contain 386 luxury condominiums.

Together, the two completed projects will add 268 new households to North Beach which will have a substantial economic impact on nearby commercial areas. This phenomenal growth is a great opportunity for North Beach merchants who are being encouraged to market their goods and services to the new residents.

Northshore Streetscape Project Update

After being delayed by frequent heavy rains last fall, work on the Northshore Streetscape Project is moving steadily forward. The new Ocean Terrace, Phase I of the Project, is taking shape with completion expected in early spring. Several Ocean Terrace hotels have begun substantial renovations in anticipation of the completion of the street. Plans are also in the works for cafes that will take advantage of the new 15 ft. wide sidewalks.

While efforts are being made to minimize the impact of construction, some level of disruption is unavoidable. To help lessen the impact, NBDC has undertaken a signage program to market area businesses and has obtained a commitment from the City to forgo parking meter enforcement during construction.

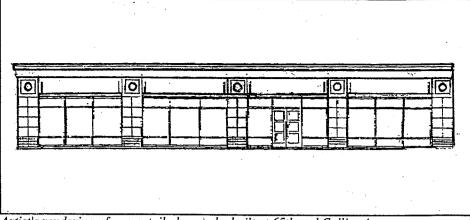
Work began in late December on Phase II of the project, the Normandy Isle commercial area which will include renovation of the historic fountain and the surrounding pedestrian area, pictured at left.

Blockbuster Video to Anchor New Collins Avenue Retail Center

Video chain's new North Beach location expected to attract other national retailers to area

North Beach is scheduled to see its first new retail development in several years with the construction of a 13,000 squarefoot shopping center anchored by Blockbuster Video at 65th Street and Collins Ave. Adler Development expects to complete the new center, which will have space for two to five retailers in addition to Blockbuster, in time for a opening. Blockbuster's decision to locate in the new center should help attract other similar retailers to the area according to leasing agent for the property, Lyle Stern of the Koniver Stern Group.

Adler Development President Steven Siegel reported that the decision to build the center was made in response to the tremendous growth being experienced along the Collins Avenue corridor in North Beach. The development is certainly indicative of high expectations for the ongoing revitalization of the area.

\$350,000 In North Beach Quality of Life Projects Slated

Beautification, tree planting, capital improvements to have highly visible impact

Work is scheduled to begin soon on an ambitious program of "Quality of Life" projects that will touch almost every corner of North Beach. The projects will be funded through North Beach's 1996 allocation of City of Miami Beach resort taxes intended to address community quality of life issues. The projects were developed through a series of community meetings coordinated by NBDC last fall. Projects to be funded include:

a dramatic upgrading of the western entrance to Normandy Isle with extensive landscaping and trees;

* tree planting on Hawthorne Ave.;

Crespi Blvd, South Shore Dr., and the Normandie Sud neighborhood;

- * capital improvements, landscaping, and tree planting at Dickens and 77th;
- improvements to Marseille Dr.;
- * road striping and signage improvements for Biscayne Beach area;
- * partial funding for a school nurse at Biscayne Elementary;
- * and partial funding for a Hispanic Community Center youth program.

Additional quality of life projects will be funded by the City on an annual basis. Areas not addressed by this year's projects will be targeted in the program developed for next year.

North Beach FEDCO Store Renovated and Expanded

A extensive renovation and expansion of the North Beach FEDCO store, a long-time retail presence on 71st St., is nearing completion. The new facility will include an additional 5,000 s.f. of space to accommodate a pharmacy, expanded executive offices, and a larger sales floor. The renovated store also features an attractive new keystone and stucco facade.

The substantial investment by the owners of **FEDCO** is an important vote of confidence in the long-term viability of the 71st St. commercial corridor. The project will serve as a catalyst for further commercial redevelopment in the area.

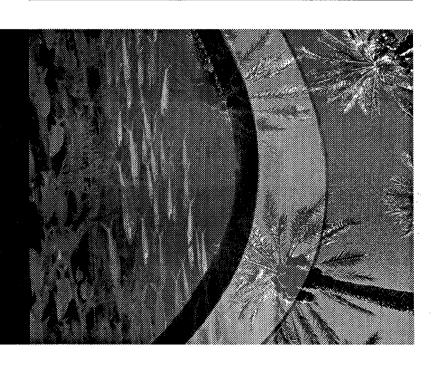
