350 community members volunteered with Great River Greening this Earth Day. The weather was spectacular and in record time the volunteers planted nearly 2,000 trees, shrubs, and wildflowers along Bushaway Road in Wayzata.

This project perfectly encapsulates our mission of inspiring communities to restore land and water across Minnesota. We hope people will return over the years and watch it all grow.



Support of an innovative partnership addresses a supply and demand problem for restoration environmentalists.

As Great River Greening looks to expand pollinator habitat restoration in Minnesota, a limiting factor is the shortage of seed. This is due in part by a rising demand for local seed types, as well as commercial seed production capacity.

This shortage severely limits the pollinator habitat restoration work Great River Greening and other restoration entities can do.

Thanks to a \$200,000 grant from The Patrick and Aimee Butler Family Foundation, Great River Greening now has the support to initiate a partnership of nonprofits, municipalities, and counties to establish grow-out areas as sources of nectar/pollen-bearing plant seed. These areas could be part of a habitat restoration, stand-alone nurseries, or greenhouse contracts for species that are difficult to establish by direct seeding.

The primary goal is to create a sustainable future for pollinator habitat restoration and conservation by creating local sources of genetically appropriate seed which could be harvested when commercial seed suppliers lack sufficient inventory.

"The Butler Family Foundation is supporting the creation of an important and innovative partnership. In Brief



Great River Greening restoration site earns spot on National Register of Historic Places

Pilot Knob is a high, prominent hill on the east bank of the Minnesota River near where it meets the Mississippi River. From atop, you can see both Minneapolis and Saint Paul downtown skylines. With such vistas, as well as its designation as a national historic site, this 25-acre urban, public space is a rarity.

After a nearly 15-year wait, the once-sacred place has been added to the National Register of Historic Places.

When the City of Mendota Heights purchased Pilot Knob in 2005, the land was severely degraded. Great River Greening was brought in to restore its native Oak Savanna habitat. Since then, more than 1,800 volunteers have helped us transform the land.





Stoking the fire of environmental restoration

Great River Greening hosted a winter brush pile burning event at Allemansrätt Wilderness Park, using invasive buckthorn as the fuel. One hundred volunteers joined us in the snow on a sunny February morning to haul and stack pre-cut buckthorn. And burn it, while also roasting hotdogs and marshmallows.

Allemansrätt is located in Lindström. The 125-acre city park is home to high quality oak forest, wetlands, lakeshore, diverse wildlife, unique glacial geology, and several miles of trails. Great River Greening volunteers have also worked at this site to plant Bur Oak trees in an old hay field, as part of a joint study with the University of Minnesota to explore how Bur Oaks from three Midwest regions adapt to future weather patterns.

1,100 volunteers came out for healthy lands and water
