

Bob and Adam are business associates. Bob answered Adam's questions, gave him appropriate literature, and answered more of his questions. Bob also called us at the right time.

Adam merely needed to talk to someone who had felt the fear he was feeling. He needed someone to understand his thoughts, "What about mom and dad? What do I tell my grandparents? How will I act around my Jewish family during Jewish celebrations?" His heart had already been prepared. Adam was ready.

I called Adam after receiving his email. We only spoke for a little while. It was a very emotional conversation. *"I never knew it was going to be so hard,"* he said.

Pressure from the community can become great when a Jewish person accepts Jesus. Sometimes it means misunderstanding from one's family. I've been through some very difficult times with my own family. One of our other staff workers, Bert, has been through it with his family. We have both experienced our parents not talking to us, in my case for two years, and in Bert's case for longer than that. When a new Jewish believer calls us suffering the pain of rejection from his or her family we can understand. We have been there. It is not easy to help someone feeling the pain of rejection. But we have experienced the pain ourselves. We have experienced the rejection as well. The good news is that we have also experienced the comfort of God when difficult times come! We have experienced the love of our brothers and sisters in Christ who have prayed for us and wept with us as we grieved over the hurt we felt. We have experienced the comfort of God through Jesus. We remember how God met with us so we can confidently tell new Jewish Christians that everything will be ok. God will be there with them through it all. We're there for new Jewish believers like Adam. Please pray for him and his family.
