Murray reports:

I had the opportunity to deliver a Shalom Basket to a woman in Atlanta. The basket was sent by a friend who knew her from work. They do not presently work with each other, but have stayed in touch and developed quite a friendship. As always, before I went to the door, I prayed and asked the Lord to bless the delivery. It was a yellow light basket, so I was cautiously optimistic that I might be able to talk to the woman about Jesus.

I rang the doorbell and waited. Eventually I heard footsteps in the house and a young child talking, but began to wonder if anyone was going to answer. After a few minutes I saw a man coming to the door who looked to be in his late thirties, dressed casually, and wearing a smile.

When he opened the door I held the basket out and said, "Hi, Mr. Schwartz. Your wife's friend Jill wanted to wish you and Sandy a sweet, happy, and healthy New Year. I hope you enjoy it."

His eyes lit up. "This is incredible," he said. "I don't even know the person who sent it but I am sure my wife does. Thank you so much." "Who are you, anyway," he asked?

Whenever anyone asks who I am, if I have been given the ok to talk to the Jewish person about spiritual issues, that question is the open door. "My name is Murray and I am with a ministry here in Atlanta called Light of Messiah Ministries. Our ministry helps Christians learn more about Jewish people and Jewish people learn more about what Christians are all about. I happen to be Jewish, and a believer in Jesus too!"

"Oh," he said,, "Well I am happy for you, if you believe it, but I am not really interested in God right now. We have a six year old son who has a terminal illness. He will not be alive much longer."

David went on to tell me that his son is very sick and that there is no cure for the illness. He also explained that he has never really been interested in God, though he thinks of himself as a spiritual person. He told me that he used to work with a Christian who was always trying to "convert" him, but that he was not interested and it was a "turn off".

David and I chatted for about 15 minutes. He presented many objections to the gospel. He asked how I could believe God sent "good people to hell". He wanted to know why, if Jesus is really the Messiah, there is so much hatred, war, and sickness. I answered his questions but discerned that David was more interested in presenting objections than hearing the answers. As we were talking, his wife Sandy, drove up.

Sandy joined in the conversation, but her demeanor was different. "Murray, I don't even know if I believe in God. If there is a God though, I am not mad at Him for what is happening to my son. Tell me about your ministry and what you do." I shared my testimony with Sandy and told her how our ministry helps Jewish people.



"Murray," she asked, "would you be willing to help us tell our four year old son about his brother's illness. We do not know how to talk to our son about death." "Of course," I said. "I will be happy to meet with you all...and walk with you through this difficult time." I prayed with Sandy, wished them a happy New Year, and left.

Both Sandy and her husband were thankful for the basket and for our ministry's availability to help them in their time of need. They do not go to a synagogue. Please pray for them, and for us, as we continue ministry to this special Jewish family.

As I drove away I thanked the Lord for this divine appointment. I am always amazed at how He guides us to the people He wants us to minister to. I also called and thanked Sandy's Christian friend. She told me that she had been afraid to send a basket to her friend until this year. I encouraged her and we prayed for her Jewish friends.

Please pray for the Jewish people who received Shalom Baskets. Pray that the gesture of friendship that was extended to them will be the catalyst for spiritual discussions. Pray that relationships will be strengthened, walls broken down, and that many Jewish people will come to know the Lord because of the work we did during the Jewish holidays this year.
