TETNA's Halloween Trick or Treat nighttime event is back and it's going to be bigger and better than ever! Mark your calendars for the evening of Oct. 31 and plan to attend this spooktacular event from 6:30-8:30 p.m.



Every year TETNA offers this safe and fun event in our neighborhood. In the past, the trick or treat blocks have been limited to certain areas. This year we are going all out and opening the TETNA Trick or Treat event to the ENTIRE neighborhood! So get your costumes, candy buckets and spooky faces ready to explore the Halloween festivities that our whole neighborhood has to offer.

The Trick or Treat event is for TETNA members and the trick-or-treating is for children ages 14 and under. The whole family is welcome to join the fun and each group of children should be accompanied by at least one adult. You must register to participate in the event – whether your little goblins will be trick-or-treating or you will be handing out candy (or both!).

Trick-or-treating? Come to the registration and sign up! You will get a glow stick for each trick-or-treater and a map with event info. The cost to participate is a 100-piece bag of candy PER CHILD. The candy must be individually wrapped and factory sealed. Due to safety Continued on p. 4

East Tosa Gardens - Composting & Worm Bins

Don't be intimidated by composting! It can be cheap and easy, and with a little practice, the process can be very beneficial. There are many ways to compost at home.

Compost is the stuff you get when garden debris, yard waste, and kitchen scraps break down into beautiful, rich, dark soil. Also called "humus" (HYOO/ mus), it is so full of nutrients that some call it "Black Gold." Bacteria and microorganisms break down the organic material into fertile earth.

One way to compost is with red worms. A storage bin with holes around the top for ventilation works just fine. Fill the bin with shredded color-free newspaper, coconut coi, and some kitchen scraps. Avoid putting dairy, citrus and meats in the bin. (Think of your worms as vegan.) Keep a plastic spoon in or near the bin to stir and churn the debris and to bury the new addition of scraps. Gage the right amount of kitchen scraps according to the worm's consumption of previous additions.

Don't worry: the worms will not come out of the bin to wander around your house! They are simple creatures and want to stay where the food is. When you are ready to harvest the soil, or castings, place a bowl with holes on the bottom on top of the soil, then place your kitchen scraps in that bowl. The worms will gather in the bowl of food, leaving the rich soil for you to spread on your garden. Use the worms in the bowl to repopulate the bin after you have removed the soil.

Another way to compost is a compost bin in your backyard. All organic material will break down. Even if you just throw your yard waste into a hole in the ground, it will eventually make compost.

How quickly materials break down depends on four aspects: moisture, oxygen, temperature and good ingredients. The compost pile should be damp but not wet, well-aerated, warm and have lots of different matter.

You will want to control the **moisture**: A lid will keep unwanted excess water from your compost. Drainage at the bottom is important too. Too much water causes odor-causing bacteria to build

up, and the rain can wash away nutrients if allowed free-reign.

Aeration can be achieved though tossing with a pitchfork in a simple enclosure in your yard, or there are several gadgets that help with the churning of the debris, like the Biosphere or other barrel-type inventions.

Temperature is a key factor in the breaking down of material. The fastest decomposition happens between 140 and 160 degrees F, but it will also continue to occur as long as the temps are above freezing. The microbes will raise the temperature as they work so the only concern for the owner is insulation. Choose a bin with a dark color and set it in the sun. The material in the middle will get the warmest, insulated by the outer debris. As you aerate your compost, you will automatically mix the cooler material to the center for its turn in the warmth.

Materials that make the best compost are a combination of debris. The ideal mix is 75% brown material and 25% green material or a 50/50 mix by weight of kitchen scraps to yard waste. Brown material includes dried grass, leaves, newspaper. Green material refers to vegetable peels and fruit rinds. If your compost is too wet, add more "brown" stuff. If too dry, add more green "stuff"

It is not the end of the world if you take a step in the wrong direction. There is no wrong answer. Add, subtract, and play around with what works for you. Remember, if your car is going the wrong direction, you don't just dump it and start over: you make adjustments and turn it around!

But make sure to bring your bags of candy for all your trick-or-treaters!

Online Registration New this year, you can register and pay for your annual membership along with Trick-or-Treating completely online at www.tosaeasttowne.org If you would prefer to give out your own candy, we will send you the display sign for you to print, and there is nothing more you need to do. However, if you plan to have any trick-or-treaters participating or want to hand out some of

the awesome TETNA-provided candy, you will need to stop by to pick up/drop off at the inperson registration.



Neighborhood Reads - The TETNA Bookclub

TETNA has had an active book group for the past few years, which meets once a month to discuss a wide range of books. We try to pick books that are readily available in the public library system, so they are often older books, or not quite on the bestseller list. Our genres range from mystery to classic to non-fiction and beyond. We are always excited to find a book written by a local author, or set in Wisconsin. A few times we have extended the fun by arranging to see a movie showing of one of our books, eating at a restaurant specializing in food featured in a book, or meeting an author when they come to town.



All-City Read Selection for 2015-16 - Peace Like a River

Tosa's All-City Read, for those unfamiliar with the event, invites city residents to join in reading a book together and then gathering in February for discussion groups and other activities held throughout the city. The event's slogan is "One book. One City. Lots of ways to bring neighbors together." This is the third year for the program,



sponsored by the Wauwatosa Neighborhood Association Council.

This year's selection is Peace Like a River, by Minnesota novelist Leif Enger. It's a classic Midwestern coming of age story, with an element of magic realism, told in retrospect by an adult Reuben Land about a period of turmoil and mystery in his young life. The story focuses on eleven year old Reuben, who struggles with asthma, and his family. He, his younger sister Swede, and their older brother Davy live in rural Minnesota with their loving father Jeremiah, a deeply spiritual and intelligent man who may have the power to perform miracles.

The story is set into motion when Davy, motivated both by vengeance and concern for his family, commits a serious crime and chooses to flee rather than face the possibility of incarceration. Fearing that Davy will come to harm if the police and FBI apprehend him on the run, the family sets out after him in an Airstream trailer and follows his trail through the rugged and beautiful Badlands. Along the way, they meet two people who change their lives forever.

Enger is an engaging writer and storyteller. The book was popular and well reviewed when it was published in 2001. It won several awards including the American Library Association's Alex Award, for best adult novel for teens. It has been on several lists for notable fiction and was on the New York Times bestseller list. It has also been a selection for community reads in Traverse City, Michigan; Pasadena, California; Rochester, New York; and the state of lowa.


