69th Street Community Gathering Place

On May 19th, the Wauwatosa Common Council approved the design for a community gathering place to be created in a section of the existing public parking lot at 69th and North. The vote to approve the design was the culmination of months of work on the part of a group of Tosa East Towne residents, North Avenue business owners, elected officials, and city employees. The process began with the development of the Wauwatosa North Avenue Plan, which was approved by the Common Council in July of 2011. The plan was based in large measure on feedback from area residents and business owners. In the plan there was a proposal for development of a combined parking and recreation area in the existing city parking lot at 69th and North.



In October of 2014, an open house was organized by the city as an opportunity for members of the general public to share ideas for development of the lot. Not long afterward, a steering committee was appointed to work with SmithGroupJJR, the landscape architects contracted to design the 69th Street Center. Previously, the city had purchased a parcel behind Voline Garage, and razed the deteriorating house located on the lot. The vacant lot was to be developed as part of the 69th Street Center.

TETNA was asked to propose members for the committee. Sarah Hunt-Frank and I volunteered. Sarah, with her background as a professional set designer, was invaluable to the committee as we considered how best to arrange elements within the space. I volunteered for the committee because I was interested in handicapped parking. With limited

But the idea is great, and there is no reason we all can't be Welcome Wagons on our own blocks.

When someone new moves into the neighborhood, take your copy of the most recent TETNA newsletter and share it with them. Clue them into the Facebook pages for TETNA, the East Tosa Alliance, Friends of Center Street Park and any other websites that you use to find out about what is happening in the city.

When you meet someone new this summer at one of the many community events, find out where they live and what they like about the block, their neighborhood, their city. Maybe you will hear an idea that sparks a thought for something we can do around here, or maybe it will remind you of something that you like about your own block, neighborhood or city that you would like to share. Maybe, eventually we could make our own Welcome Wagon page on the TETNA website where we can all post these great resources and ideas for residents new and old, but in the meantime - we can do it the old fashioned way - one neighbor at a time!

East Tosa Gardens - Hostas, Slugs and Toad Houses

Have you noticed that something is nibbling on your hosta leaves? Sometimes the leaf is riddled with munching! This unsightly blemish can really affect the appearance of your garden. Determining the cause is easy: slugs. They love to munch and nibble the delicate, delicious hosta leaves, and can really wreak havoc on your hard work.

An easy and humane way to give slugs their marching orders is to sprinkle the leaves with something that does not feel good on their underbellies. Ashes from your charcoal grill will work. If you have a gas grill, find a neighbor who uses charcoal. --I am sure they won't mind if you clean out their grill for them, --and now you have made a new best friend! If you are disparate, regular kitchen flour will work, too, although it's effect is not as lasting.

Flour or ashes can be sprinkled around the perimeter of the hosta bed to keep the slugs from getting near, if you don't like the look of ash dusting on your leaves. Ashes on the ground will disappear to the human eye but still be felt by the slugs and make them reroute their GPS.

Another cute and adorable way to remove slugs from your hostas is to get a toad house. These new fashionable lawn accessories actually provide a shelter for toads, who will then happily remove the slugs and other pests from your garden. Just tuck the toad house in your garden as a lawn ornament, near your hostas.



Put an end to the riddled leaves and unsightly blemishes. Tell the slugs that this is the end of the smorgasbord! No more all-you-can-eat buffet. There is no free lunch!

And, remember to sit back, sip some iced tea, and enjoy the beautiful view that your hard work has created.

mobility, I often have difficulty finding places to park on North Avenue. I also have background as a visual artist, and was interested in the more detailed aspects of the design.

Under the leadership of SmithGroupJJR's Tom Rogers, we met periodically to review and refine proposals. Early in the process, we reached a general consensus that the original idea for a multi-purpose space was not viable. Over time, our collective vision for the space evolved from enhanced parking lot to something more like a pocket park. Green space, seating, a performance area, and decorative lighting were high on our lists of requirements for the park. These elements, especially the green space and seating, would have been difficult if not impossible to incorporate into a parking lot.

The committee talked about coordinating the need for parking with the need for a gathering space. We considered the balance between accommodating cars and accommodating people, finally deciding on a compromise in which about a third of the lot would be devoted to parking and the rest to a public gathering place. We looked at other small parks from around the country to find elements that would work in the new park. The group came up with ideas including trees, shrubs and flowers on the north and east sides of the space; bike racks; permanent seating; pergolas on the west side; overhead lights strung from one side of the space to the other; and artistic elements of some kind. We also wanted to see Wauwatosa history reflected in the design.

The final conceptual design was reviewed by the steering committee on May 12th. We were pleased with the presentation as it included almost everything we wanted. Among the highlights were a bike rack decorated with letters spelling out the word "TOSA," benches with lighted bases and facts about Wauwatosa etched into the wood; lighted pavers with quotes about Wauwatosa; picnic tables; a pergola; and an abundance of lights to enliven the space at night. While we decided against a raised stage, there is an area near the back of the lot that could accommodate a small portable stage and offer electrical connections for lights and amplifiers. Seating will be provided with the benches and coordinating picnic tables. With parking retained at the back of the lot and a new parking area created behind Voline, the number

of parking spaces available at that location will remain nearly the same as before, at twenty spaces. Two of those spaces will be designated handicapped parking.

It is anticipated that the process of refining the design and bidding the work will take us through the summer. We hope the 69th Street Center will be ready for people to enjoy by summer of 2016.

Run Tosa Run draws strong turnout.

The neighborhood came together in big way on May 16th for another successful Run Tosa Run



event, with more runners and more money raised for Ronald McDonald House Charities in Eastern Wisconsin.

This was the second year of our revamped format, including a 5K course that took in the full neighborhood. By the time Alderman Bobby Pantuso sounded the starting horn Saturday morning, we had about 200 people registered and ended up with 176 finishers. That was in addition to the few dozen little medalists who participated in our half-mile kids run.

With the proceeds from the race, the TETNA board approved a \$3,000 donation to Ronald McDonald House Charities, a significant increase over last year's donation.

The results of this year's race looked a lot like last year's, with Brice Cleland of Milwaukee taking the top male prize at a time of 16 minutes flat. The female winner was Amy Schlotthauer of Menomonee Falls with a time of 19:41. The top Tosa male runner was Nathan Lanser at 18:58 for fourth place overall, and top Tosa female was Megan Olson, the second-place woman overall, at 21:57. 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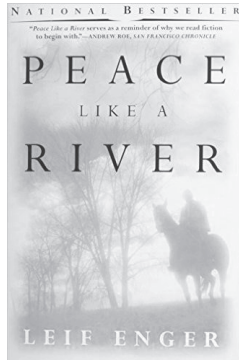

Firefly Art Fair

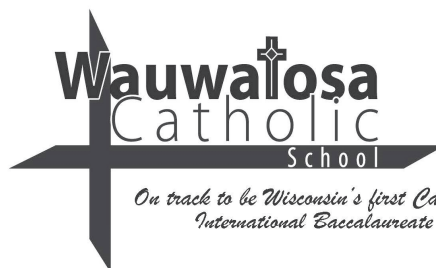

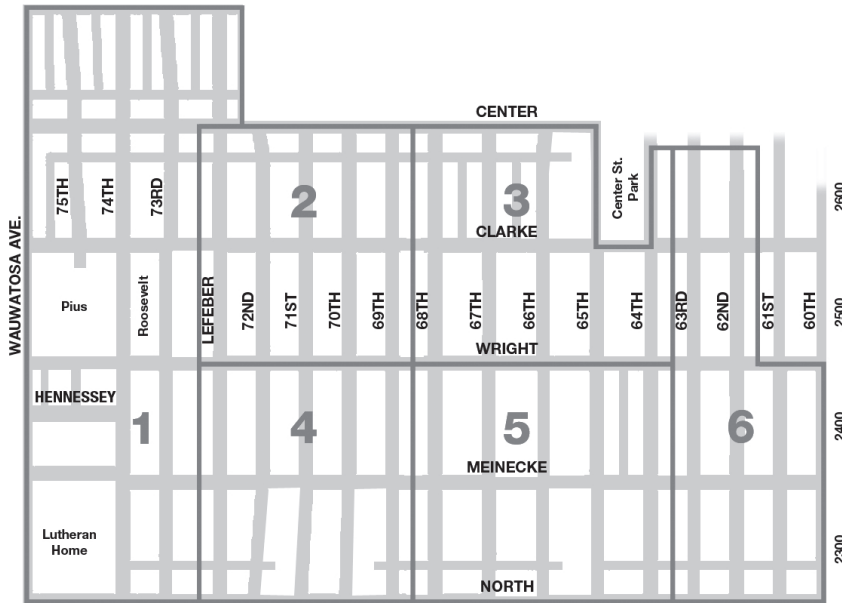
