Hello Neighbors!

One of the great things about volunteering in the community is the opportunity to meet people and come up with creative ways to solve problems that concern all of us. We all can make a difference, with just small, easy steps. Case in point, recently one of our neighbors expressed concern about traffic issues in our neighborhood. He was concerned about issues such as speeding, failure to come to complete stops, and loud noises from vehicles. A Day at the Polls

The men and women who man the polls on Election Day are the people most voters associate with the elec-



tion process. They are the most visible representatives of a complex network of individuals and agencies that work together to insure fair, accessible and transparent elections.

The duties of a typical poll worker will vary according to the needs of a particular ward or polling place. They may include logging the voter numbers of registered voters in the poll books, processing new voter registrations, assisting voters with casting their votes, processing absentee ballots, and organizing lines for voting and registration. Ideally, each ward has a chief inspector to oversee the election workers and fill in as needed.

The day begins when the poll workers arrive at their assigned polling places at 6:15 am. The City of Wauwatosa delivers voting equipment prior to the election. For East 'Tosa, these locations are Roosevelt Elementary School and Longfellow Middle School. Poll workers are responsible for setting up the machines, checking to see that the seals on the machines and memory packs are intact, activating the machines and running initial tapes showing that no votes have been cast prior to the election. Once this is done and the various stations have been set up, the polls are ready to open at 7:00 am.

The rest of the day is determined by the number of people who vote. Wauwatosa often has higher voter turnout than other places in the state. For the recent August 12 primary, the turnout for Wauwatosa was close to 21%. This was higher than the state average of 15%. As might be expected, the biggest turnouts are for presidential and gubernatorial elections and for hotly contested local elec-

tions. These are the elections that can result in lines around the block both for casting ballots and for same day registration. Wauwatosa's turnout for the 2012 presidential election was 88.63%, which was well over the state average of 72.5%.

At 8:00 pm, the polls close and the poll workers get to work assembling data for the city, county and sometimes the school board. This information includes total votes from the optical scanner and the touchscreen machines, registration documents, a tally of write-in votes, and a report of the total vote for each candidate. Results may also be read aloud to interested observers including candidates, reporters, and representatives of candidates. Work is usually done by 9:00, at which time the election data is turned over to an employee from the city clerk's office. Once the representatives from the clerk's office have arrived, the poll workers can go home.

The City of Wauwatosa is always looking for people to help with elections, especially with a major election looming. Contrary to popular belief, the people who work at the polls are not volunteers. Poll workers are paid both for training and for working elections. Chief inspectors are paid slightly more. Compensation is not lavish, but it's adequate.

Another misconception is that most poll workers are elderly. For obvious reasons, retired people make up a sizable percentage of poll workers. It may not be easy or even possible for someone managing a job or a family to dedicate a fifteen hour block of time to working the polls. Those, people who are no longer working and whose children are grown are in the best position to offer their services. This might be an interesting opportunity, however, for someone who is younger and not yet committed to job or family.

While the work is often demanding, it may also be fun to spend a day interacting with the people who come in to vote and also getting to know fellow poll workers. The camaraderie is one of the reasons many poll workers return, election after election. People often bring snacks and coffee to help get the team through the long day and take advantage of the lulls, if any, to catch up on news of families and activities. It is, in many ways, as much a social activity as it is a clerical responsibility. Attention to the data is critical, but the opportunity to spend the day greeting and assisting and socializing with others is one of the perks.

You must be 18 years old, a U.S. citizen and a resident of Wauwatosa to qualify to work at the polls. You will be given training by the city and you will also have ample opportunity to learn on the job. Please call the Clerk's Office for more information at (414) 479-8919.

Confessions of a Dog Trainer: My Dog Sleeps on My Bed

Those who know me are fully aware that I talk about dogs a lot. No matter how a conversation with my co-workers or friends begins, it's almost guaranteed to turn into questions about dogs.



A few of my friends - and countless clients - confess to me that they know it's wrong that they let their dogs up on their furniture and allow them to sleep in bed. They are often very apologetic and seemingly humiliated by the "awful" truth that they allow their dog "human" privileges. Well, I've got news for you, my dog is allowed on my furniture and he makes himself quite comfortable each evening at the foot of my bed.

While allowing pets on furniture is definitely a personal choice, there are some influencers that should be taken into consideration. Here are the guidelines I follow to assess whether or not you canine companion should be allowed the comfort of cozying up on the couch.

- First off, if your dog exhibits undesirable behaviors toward you (such as growling) while he is on any piece of furniture, it is not a good idea for him to be up there. If this type of behavior happens, you should begin a behavior modification program that focuses on using positive reinforcement training and counter conditioning, such as the phenomenal protocol outlined in Jean Donaldson's book, Mine! A Practical Guide to Resource Guarding in Dogs. Management techniques should also be used to prevent access to the furniture while you are completing the behavior modification program.
- If your dog is comfortable with you approaching while they are cozied up, it's time to train the trade-off. It is important that if you the human would like to gain access to a certain piece of furniture, that your dog will move at your request and take up camp somewhere else. Dogs are not born knowing how to do this, therefore you must train the behavior and make it worth their while for moving (treats, access to a different squishy, warm spot, or an invitation to jump back up after he has jumped off). Online resources, such as www.clickertraining.com, have wonderful instructions how to teach your dog to hop-up and hop-off of surfaces.
- And lastly, if you the human are already oc-

cupying a piece of furniture and your dog wants to join in, it's an excellent idea to teach them to wait for an invitation before they jump up. Teaching them to have some impulse control and not just hop up any 'ole time they want will allow you to snuggle at your discretion. Snuggling with your canine companion is great, but stretching your legs out after a long day feels wonderful too, right?

In my own home, my dog sleeps on the bed with my husband and I and he is allowed on both of the couches. Of course he has plenty of other options and most of the time when we are hanging out he finds comfort on a nearby rug or dog bed where he can keep tabs on every single entry door to our house while keeping track of his humans.

Dogs enjoy being comfortable. If your dog is comfortable on the couch and is not exhibiting any undesirable behavior, don't apologize or feel guilty. I guarantee your dog is not trying to take over the world...he's just more comfortable being on a soft piece of furniture, just like us.

Prepare your vegetable garden bed for winter – and the spring planting!

One task that may not seem like a fun one, but is so necessary, is preparing the garden bed for winter. Mostly, this job is getting it ready for spring, which seems a long way off, with a hard Wisconsin winter ahead of us. But these steps may help, and make the spring plantings easier.

Clean out all the old foliage and debris from the annual plants in the garden. This is easy if the plants have already died naturally. But some plants, like tomatoes, hang on until a harder frost, and there is no reason not to allow them to give fresh produce until that time. Cleaning out the debris and foliage leaves the area ready for spring planting.

The debris collected from your garden will become a valuable addition to the compost bin and prevent build up of harmful diseases and insects in the garden. The heat from the compost pile will kill these things and give you good soil to add back to your garden. If soil comes along with the pulled plant material, don't worry: it contains microbes that hasten the decomposition. The ratio is to add 2-parts brown material and 1-part green. Leaves, small twigs, pine needles are the "brown," and vegetable scraps, grass and green plants are the "green."

A trench dug in your garden can serve as a compost area if space is limited in the yard. Bury the debris with the ratio of "brown" and "green". This will enrich the soil for next year. Trenches can be dug in another area for the next round of composting.

The garden can continue to produce on into the winter, if the gardener plans accordingly. Kale and collard greens can be harvested long after coldsensitive plants have died. Carrots planted in August can be covered with straw or debris and not harvested until after a few frosts have sweetened the taste. Parsnips are the same, sweeter and delicious after a few frosts.

The garden can also be transformed into a root cellar. Plants do not have to be buried deep to protect them from frost and cold. Pull up a cabbage, intact, and bury it head down with the root up so it can be found. The cabbage can be pulled up and enjoyed in the winter, once the outer leaves are removed. Potatoes and carrots can be dug up and then preserved with a mound of straw and dirt over them.

One way to protect the garden is with a cover crop, that holds the soil and then adds nutrients when churned under in the spring. Johnny's Seeds is a good source for cover crops and any vegetable seeds that may be desired.

Spinach seeds can be planted 4- to 6-weeks before frost and covered in straw for an early spring treat.

My favorite part of having the garden ready for winter, is that in the spring, I can run out quickly and plant my early seeds, like peas, spinach, parsnips, beets and more, and run back into the warm house for another cup of cocoa.

Getting Started Is Easy

A Wauwatosa Police Officer will come to a neighborhood meeting to present information on neighborhood watch programs and provide crime prevention materials and signage. The designated Block Captain will distribute the quarterly Tosa Watch newsletter to neighbors. The newsletter informs citizens of services and special events offered by the Police Department.

Many blocks have Block Captains already in place and are currently receiving the Tosa Watch newsletter. If you are interested, speak with your Block Captain to organize the neighborhood watch meeting. If you are not sure who your Block Captain is, the Community Support Division can help.




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
