## Tips for Successful Rummage Sales

Do you have too much stuff? Do you want clear out old stuff to make way for new? The TETNA rummage sale is the perfect time to get rid of your unwanted stuff. Here are some tips to help you turn your junk in to someone else's treasure.

The first key is to make your sale attractive so people will want to stop and shop.

You will want to have a lot of stuff at your sale. And I mean, A LOT of stuff! If you feel that you don't have enough stuff to make an impression on passersby, then join your sale with another family and choose the house with the most visibility or most traffic. The more stuff you have in your sale, the more likely you are to attract shoppers.

Turn passersby into shoppers is to have some larger items like furniture or large kids' toys. Put these large items in the front yard so they are visible from the road. Large and interesting items will cause people to get out of their cars for a closer look. If a large item sells early, offer to hold it with a sold sign for the buyer until they are done shopping in the neighborhood. This way you can still attract the passersby until the shopper is ready to pick up the item.

Another way to make your sale attractive is to keep the sale condensed. Your sale should look like the items that are there at that particular time are the only items that were ever there. If things are too spread out, the sale will look picked over, like the good things are already gone and shoppers will not be inclined to buy. If you notice that things are looking to sparse and spread out during the sale, take down a table and condense the items onto fewer tables.

Here are some other great ideas to organize your items for prime selling:

- Like things should be grouped together, kitchen things with kitchen things, tools with tools, etc.
- Rather than piling books in a box, bring out a small bookshelf to display them on.
- Have a bin of 25 cent (or even free) kids toys to occupy the kiddies so mom and dad can shop! The kids love being able to purchase a trinket too!
- Remember to have an extension cord ready to demonstrate the function of any appliances for the consumer. People will want to know that it works before they take it home.
- Make sure the items are clean. If it can be washed in the dish washer or washing machine, do it. If not, a little soap and a garden hose will help. Dirt makes your
junk look like junk, not treasure.
Let's talk pricing. One thing to remember when getting ready for your rummage sale is to price items reasonably. You may have paid a lot more for an item at the store, but this is a rummage sale, so use rummage sale prices. Approximate $10 \%$ of the value of an item to get a reasonable rummage price. If your prices are too high, people may browse but no one will buy. And what was the goal? To get rid of that stuff and put green stuff in your pocket!

To save some prep time, you could price items by table. For example, everything on this table is $\$ 1$. Or you can purchase the pre-priced tags.

Feel free to barter. If someone asks you if you will take a lesser price for an item, you have the right to say, "No, it's worth more than that." But is it? Really? Or do you actually want them to carry it away and put the green in your pocket? Hmmmm?

Have change ready. A few days before the sale, head to the bank for a roll of quarters, $25 \$ 1$ bills, a few $\$ 5 \mathrm{~s}$. Nothing kills a sale quicker than asking for exact change.

Put the kids to work selling lemonade and other baked goods. After a busy day of rummaging, shoppers will be happy to purchase lemonade and cookies. This is a great way to teach kids about money and the value of working hard. Plus the extra incentive of keeping the profits will keep them motivated.

After the sale is over, you may want to have scheduled a Goodwill or Salvation Army pickup. DO NOT take the stuff back into your house! You were willing to get rid of that stuff once ---so you really don't need it, -- so don't let it get back into your house! (Remember the clutter? The piles of stuff you had to walk around? Ugh!) Store it in the garage until a pickup or drop off can be arranged.

So now you are ready to lessen the stuff in your house, get people to carry your stuff away, and put some green stuff in your pocket! Good luck and happy selling

# East Tosa Profiles: Edward Haydin <br> By Nancy Hall 

Ed describes himself as a someone who "like[s] to make things happen, get things started." For that we thank him as the projects he has started for East Tosa have contributed significantly toward the evolution of our neighborhood as an area hotspot. The most visible evidence of his involvement has been the East Tosa Gran Prix, which made its debut this past summer. The second in what we hope will be an annual event is planned for Sunday, June 29, 2014.

Last year the weather cooperated and our race proved to be a wonderful and exciting celebration for neighborhood residents, many of whom were able to watch world class racers fly past from the comfort of their own front yards. This was a splendid showcase for Wauwatosa especially for the sponsors in our rapidly evolving neighborhood business district.

Ed's interest in bicycles was born out of practicality, starting as a necessary tool to explore the roads around Holy Hill but he also recalled engaging rides and conversations with his wife as they were getting to know each other. They still ride together seeking the steepest hills around the region with the same passion for conversation and often times includes a stop for lunch or an OKG mango smoothie. He's especially fanatic about European pro cycling, which he characterized as an individual sport with essential team tactics. Among the highlights of a recent family trip was an opportunity to cheer two stages of the Tour de France in the French Alpe city of Cerre Chevalier near Briancon. Nearby were the historic mountains of Alpe d'Huez and Col Du Galiber up which he did not attempt to ride a bicycle.

When I sat down with Ed, I was treated to a long and lively discussion about how neighborhoods like ours grow into cultural communities. He reinforces the concept that our commercial district's continued success is directly linked to the participation of the local residents. An Architect by profession, his passionate interest is the interplay among individuals, groups, businesses and governments as they come together in various combinations to encourage a culture to thrive. An essential ingredient for growth is the community's ownership of its place. When I referred to the growth of East Tosa as "organic,' he reminded me that what appears to have evolved naturally was really the result of years of participation by many people. This organic ownership recently extended to the new projects such as formation of the Friends of Center Street Park group. Good neighborhoods take care of their city.

Although his board term is complete, another of Ed's projects was the leadership of the local non-profit East Tosa Alliance which was founded along with other neighbors including Meg Miller. The mission of the Alliance is to counteract a threat of devalued properties along the

North Avenue corridor, which directly affects residential property values and our quality of life. The Alliance advocates for thoughtful development of the trade district, supporting access from the neighborhoods to the street and encouraging new businesses to consider building or expanding in East Tosa. The Alliance also sponsors the East Tosa Gran Prix and the now annual Chili'n on the Avenue chili cook-off, approaching its fifth year, to showcase and celebrate the neighborhoods and our relationship with North Avenue.

Ed and his wife, Paige, have lived in the TETNA neighborhood since 1996. They have two children, who attend Longfellow and East. A native of Richfield, Wisconsin, Ed spent several childhood years in Denver, Colorado, where he developed an interest in fly-fishing for trout, which continues. His family loves to travel, having been all over the United States, including Yellowstone and Yosemite, as well as to Europe and to Mexico. A recent trip to the Yucatan Peninsula included a visit to nearby Mayan ruins of Tulum ... remnants of a much earlier civilization and community than ours.

## The "New" North Avenue

Big changes are coming to North Avenue this summer. The chicanes which have defined the streetscape for the past few years will be gone and North Avenue will run straight from $76^{\text {th }}$ to $60^{\text {th }}$ street. The new streetscape will result in a gain of ten to twelve parking spots. It will also be more pedestrian and bicycle friendly. These improvements will increase the accessibility to the businesses on North Ave.
In order to facilitate pedestrian traffic, the new streetscape will include pedestrian crossings, similar to those in the Village, at $65^{\text {th }} \mathrm{St}, 72^{\text {nd }} \mathrm{St}$. and $73^{\text {rd }} \mathrm{St}$.

The new North Avenue will also be more bike friendly with brightly painted green bike lanes running from $76^{\text {th }}$ Street to 60 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Street. In addition, the intersection at $68^{\text {th }}$ Street will include bike boxes which will increase bicyclist visibility and decrease car/bike conflicts. (see inset for more information on bike boxes).

These changes are part of improving North Avenue and making our part of Wauwatosa the best it can be.

## What are Bike Boxes?

A bike box is a colored area at an intersection behind the pedestrian crosswalk but in front of the stop line for vehicles. It will run across the traffic lanes and will contain room for several bikes. It is used only at red lights and will allow the cyclists an advantage when the light turns green in both proceeding straight
 and turning left. It will prevent problems with drivers turning right in front of cy clists in the bike lane. The bike boxes do not serve a function when the light is green and traffic is flowing normally.

Bike Boxes have been used for several years in Europe and Asia. They are becoming more popular in the States with cities like Madison, Seattle and Portland implementing them.
