Little Free Libraries By Renee Fensin

In the past few years, Little Free Libraries have popped up throughout the city offering books to the public. The mission of Little Free Libraries is to promote literacy and the love of reading by building free book exchanges. The Libraries are placed in yards and other public places. Neighbors are encouraged to browse the libraries for a book to read and to donate a book in return.

Inspired by this mission, Erik Brzezinski decided to build five Little Free Libraries and offer them to TETNA residents for his Eagle Scout project. He approached the TETNA board for assistance with this project and to help locate residents who would be interested in receiving a Library.

The TETNA board was impressed with Erik's presentation at the Annual Meeting. The board saw it as an opportunity to give back to the community at a grass roots level. The board also appreciated the community building that the Little Free Libraries brings to a neighborhood.

With the partnership in place, TETNA sought out current association members who would be interested in receiving a Little Free Library. The recipients had to meet certain criteria; they had to be the property owners, the block had to be easily accessible and actively walked and another Library could not be located on the same block. They also had to submit a 100 word description on why they wanted the library. The residents who responded offered such wonderful responses as wanting to promote literacy, sharing the magic of reading with others and connecting to the community through the Library.

Erik spent the summer obtaining materials through donations from Home Depot, funding from his troop and from TETNA. He then built five Little Free Libraries according to the prototype he presented at the TETNA annual meeting. Erik and his crew installed the Libraries during the Labor Day weekend.

The feedback from this partnership has been overwhelmingly positive. The recipients raved about how polite and professional Erik was. The community has embraced the Libraries as well. The homeowners shared their joy in seeing people borrowing from their new Libraries.



Common Council Corner By Joel Tilleson 5th District Alderperson

The second secon

By the time you read this article, the Council will be in the midst of deliberating future development at UWM's

Innovation Campus, which is located on the east side of Highway 45 just north of Froedtert & The Medical College. The history of this particular development – coupled with the fascinating history of this land – will undoubtedly play a large role in the Council's discussion.

On December 21, 2004, the Common Council adopted a master plan to guide development of the countyowned land east of Highway 45. The plan – referred to as the Kubala Washatko Plan after the architectural firm that designed it – sought to marry the need for economic development and expansion of the city's tax base with the desire to preserve as much of the prairie land as possible. The plan recommended 800,000 square feet of new development while simultaneously emphasizing that new construction utilize green technology and underground parking to create a sustainable business park with minimal environmental impact.

In 2009, the Milwaukee County Board and then-County Executive Scott Walker approved a \$13.55 million sale of the 88.4 acres to UWM's Real Estate Foundation with the idea that the University, though private development, would create a campus that would merge institutional studies with real-world application. On May 4, 2010, the Wauwatosa Common Council approved UWM's planned development and the necessary changes to the city's Zoning Code to allow for this development to take place.

As you may have noticed, construction is already underway on a boulevard (aptly named "Discovery Parkway") and hiking/biking trails running north-south from Watertown Plank to Swan Boulevard. Construction is also underway on two buildings – the Accelerator Building, an academic building that will bring researchers, inventers, and developers together under one roof, and the regional headquarters of ABB (commonly thought of as the "Rockwell of Europe"). Two other developments have been proposed. One is a hotel, which, after debate by the Milwaukee County Board pertaining to wage standards, has been approved by the County and will soon be considered by the City. The other is a nearly 200 unit apartment village proposed by Mandel Group, which is being planned for the area around the historic and longvacant Eschweiler buildings just south of Swan Boulevard. Mandel has proposed two options: 1) Save and restore four the Eschweiler buildings, contingent on the Forest Exploration Center charter school contributing to the rehabilitation through a fundraising drive, or 2) Restore the main Administration building only and tear the remaining buildings down for use as a public 'walled garden'.

While the concept of development on the county grounds has always been sensitive, the Mandel proposal has raised several unique considerations which the Council must carefully sort out. One issue the Council is closely watching is the Forest Exploration Center's desire to build a charter school in the Eschweiler buildings. If the FEC reaches their fundraising goal, they will be able to restore four of the Eschweiler buildings and locate their budding school to Innovation Campus. However, this scenario is complicated by the Wauwatosa School Board's concern that charter schools are a competitor capable of depriving the school district of needed funding.

Should the FEC not reach its fundraising goal, then the Council is faced with Mandel's proposal to raze all but one of the Eschweiler buildings. Mandel argues that despite his attempts to preserve all of the buildings, the harsh and deteriorating conditions of the buildings make it feasible to only preserve the Administration building, and that city assistance of \$2.5 million is needed to assist with the preservation. This raises a myriad of issues including, but certainly not limited to, our adherence to the 2004 Kubala Washatko plan, the practicality of restoring the Eschweiler buildings, and the appropriateness of city assistance in this development.

While this particular issue may be past the Council by the time this newsletter goes to print, development at Innovation Campus is ongoing, and similar issues may surface again. As always, your feedback is important as the Council weighs complex issues. Please feel free to call or email me with your own thoughts and have a safe and enjoyable fall.

City Dog Life - Walking the Dog By Laura Holder

A dog pulling on the leash is one of the most frequent reasons people sign up for dog training classes. A nice pleasant walk with your dog is something everyone wants to enjoy but is not always easy to accomplish. Learn how to make your stroll around the neighborhood fun and enjoyable on both ends of the leash.

Some people have questions on where your dog should be when you are walking. They have heard that dogs should not walk in front of you because



it will make him think he is the pack leader. Do not fear, dogs do not worry about this. The point of a casual walk is for you and your dog to walk together without either one of you pulling the other.

Tip 1: Red Light/Green Light Dogs pull on their leash because it works. If your dog is pulling forward despite you pulling back, complaining and whatever else you might try, he thinks the pulling behavior is being reinforced. If you feel tension in the leash, the easy correction is to simply stop. This may make for some short and frustrating walks in the beginning but it will work. By the same token, make a promise to your dog that you will never pull him around either. If you are going to change directions or need him to move give him a heads up in advance.

Tip 2: Take a Tired Dog A tired dog tends to pull less on walks and does not get distracted as easily. Playing a 5 minute game, such as fetch or tug-o-war, before going on a walk can alleviate a lot of frustration.

Tip 3: Allow Your Dog to Sniff Stuff If you think about it, our city dogs live in a world that is very unnatural for them. They are subject to weird sights and sounds. They are at the mercy of our schedule, we feed them, play with them and take them out when we want to. A walk is much more than just a walk for your dog. It is their time to catch up with the world. They want to check their "pee-mail", dissect the new smells left by the overnight critters and investigate the freshly cut grass. Allowing your dog to sniff on their walks is imperative to their mental well-being. Dogs need the opportunity to use their incredible noses and check out what has been happening around the neighborhood, give them that chance a few times during your walk.

Bonus Tip: Proper Equipment If you are going to stop pulling completely, you may need some extra help in the beginning. Employ the use of a front clip harness as a management tool. The front-clip harness attaches the leash to the front part of your dog's chest rather than on top of their back. This will help in avoid triggering your dog's opposition reflex.



Featured Group – TETNA Craft Club




