# East Tosa Gran Prix Brings International Cycling to East Tosa

On June 30, 2013, East Tosa will play host to the final race of the Tour of

America's Dairyland, the East Tosa Gran Prix. This exciting event will bring national and international exposure to our community.

The Tour of America's Dairyland is the largest competitive professional cycling event in the United States. The events take place in eleven cities in Southeastern Wisconsin over eleven days. The Tour attracts professional riders from around the world. In addition to the professional racers, amateur cyclists of different ages and skill levels will participate in races throughout the day.

The East Tosa race will be a criterium course through the neighborhood. For those not familiar with cycling a criterium is a short course loop, usually less than a mile. It will be a multi-lap race with racers traversing the course up to 80 times. Our course will be .6 miles starting at the 72nd street parking lot on North Avenuewhich is where the event stage and announcers will call the race. The course turns north on Lefeber then east on Meinecke, down to 69th street and back out to North Avenue west to the finish line. Imagine the professional cyclists zooming through the neighborhood at up to 35 miles an hour. It is sure to be exciting.

This event will not just be one race. It will be an all-day cycling party starting with the junior boys and girls race (ages 10 to 15) at 10:30 and culminating in the men's professional race at 6:30. The organizers also hope to have a kids' race for local children to join in the fun.

# Why Bring the Race to East Tosa?

For the past several years the final race has been held in Madison. However, Tour organizers were looking for a new venue to create a fun, party-like atmosphere and East Tosa stepped up to the plate. The race is expected to draw up to 10,000 spectators with hopes that that number will grow to 30,000 within the next five years. If this race takes hold, it will put East Tosa on the international cycling map.


One of the principal organizers of the race, Ed Haydin, says "Bringing the race to East Tosa will draw people into our neighborhoods and allow us to promote our urban livability, our commercial district and showcase the City on a first hand basis." People will learn what TETNA residents have known all along, East Tosa is a friendly neighborhood with great houses, excel-

lent schools and diverse businesses. Many of these local businesses are sponsors of the Gran Prix. They are looking forward to showcasing the neighborhood they call home.

This event is not just about cycling. The Tour of America's Dairyland website describes it as "a massive neighborhood event complete with entertainment, family fun, and kids' activities. And it's FREE to come and watch." Spectators, local, national and international, are asked to "experience communities you've never before been or get to know your own Downtown a little better. Enjoy a hot cup of this, a cool sip of that, a taste of local culinary creation, and spend some time seeing what the local merchants have to offer!"

The residents of East Tosa will play an important role on race day. Organizers are hoping that residents will come out in full force to support this wonderful neighborhood event. Ed Haydin says "Our hope is that residents on the race course will invite friends and family in and have a yard party to join in the festive atmosphere- much like how Halloween is in October (except warmer!)."

So show up with friends and family, cheer loudly and have loads of fun. Let's show the world why East Tosa is the best neighborhood around.





# What Residents Need to Know About Race Day

The East Tosa Gran Prix will bring approximately 10,000 fans plus riders and race staff to our neighborhood. The spectators will be parking on our neighborhood streets and walking to the event.

The streets around the criterium course (see map, p. 4) will be blocked off all day for the safety of riders and spectators.

Residents who live within the course boundaries will not have an opportunity to move their cars during the day. If you need to use your car during race day, it is recommended that you find street parking outside of the course.

There will be clearly designated and manned "Safe Crossing" zones for residents and spectators who need to get across the course.

North Avenue businesses along the course will be open on race day. Many businesses may offer specials on race day.

Spectators can watch the races at any point along the course. Residents along the course will have a front seat to the spectacle. Consider inviting friends and family and host a yard party.

The Start/Finish line will be on 72<sup>nd</sup> and North Ave. This is where the awards podium and announcing stand will be.

# **TETNA Recycling**

Did you know that Tosa recycles just about everything that can be recycled? Did you know that since we made the switch to the new recycle bins, Tosa has saved tens of thousands of dollars in landfill fees? Do you know how easy it is to recycle these days?



In the 70's, before it was "the thing to do", my mom would gather us kids in the car, drive over to a recycle station and drop off her newspapers into a semi trailer. We would toss the brown bottles into the "brown glass" bin, the green glass in the "green glass" bin and the clear glass in the -- you get the picture.

But now it is so easy, you have no excuses! We don't have to drive anywhere. We don't have to unload. We can just collect our recyclables in a separate container in the kitchen, put them in the city recycle bin and wheel it out to the curb.

Tosa recycles cardboard, glass, and any plastic with the recycle triangle on it, numbers 1 through 7.

If you are not sure if something is recyclable, toss it in anyway. As the recyclables are sorted at the Dept of Public Works, if they see something that doesn't belong, they can pull it out. Having one wrong thing in your bin will not cause all of it to be tossed out. And anything we can recycle is one less thing in the landfill!

Let's see if we can be so good at recycling that the city has to switch it around and make the recycle picked up every week and the trash pick-up every other week!

Whaddya say, East Tosa?

# Tips for Successful Rummage Sales

Do you have too much stuff? Do you want clear out old stuff to make way for new? The TETNA rummage sale is the perfect time to get rid of your unwanted stuff. Here are some tips to help you turn your junk in to someone else's treasure.

The first key is to make your sale attractive so people will want to stop and shop.

You will want to have a lot of stuff at your sale. And I mean, A LOT of stuff! If you feel that you don't have enough stuff to make an impression on passersby, then join your sale with another family and choose the house with the most visibility or most traffic. The more stuff you have in your sale, the more likely you are to attract shoppers.

Turn passersby into shoppers is to have some larger items like furniture or large kids' toys. Put these large items in the front yard so they are visible from the road. Large and interesting items will cause people to get out of their cars for a closer look. If a large item sells early, offer to hold it with a sold sign for the buyer until they are done shopping in the neighborhood. This way you can still attract the passersby until the shopper is ready to pick up the item.

Another way to make your sale attractive is to keep the sale condensed. Your sale should look like the items that are there at that particular time are the *only* items that were ever there. If things are too spread out, the sale will look picked over, like the good things are already gone and shoppers will not be inclined to buy. If you notice that things are looking to sparse and spread out during the sale, take down a table and condense the items onto fewer tables.

Here are some other great ideas to organize your items for prime selling:

- Like things should be grouped together, kitchen things with kitchen things, tools with tools, etc.
- Rather than piling books in a box, bring out a small bookshelf to display them on.
- Have a bin of 25 cent (or even free) kids toys to occupy the kiddies so mom and dad can shop! The kids love being able to purchase a trinket too!
- Remember to have an extension cord ready to

- demonstrate the function of any appliances for the consumer. People will want to know that it works before they take it home.
- Make sure the items are clean. If it can be washed in the dish washer or washing machine, do it. If not, a little soap and a garden hose will help. Dirt makes your junk look like junk, not treasure.

Let's talk pricing. One thing to remember when getting ready for your rummage sale is to price items reasonably. You may have paid a lot more for an item at the store, but this is a rummage sale, so use rummage sale prices. Approximate 10% of the value of an item to get a reasonable rummage price. If your prices are too high, people may browse but no one will buy. And what was the goal? To get rid of that stuff and put green stuff in your pocket!

To save some prep time, you could price items by table. For example, everything on this table is \$1. Or you can purchase the pre-priced tags.

Feel free to barter. If someone asks you if you will take a lesser price for an item, you have the right to say, "No, it's worth more than that." But is it? Really? Or do you actually want them to carry it away and put the green in your pocket? Hmmmm?

Have change ready. A few days before the sale, head to the bank for a roll of quarters, 25 \$1 bills, a few \$5s. Nothing kills a sale quicker than asking for exact change.

Put the kids to work selling lemonade and other baked goods. After a busy day of rummaging, shoppers will be happy to purchase lemonade and cookies. This is a great way to teach kids about money and the value of working hard. Plus the extra incentive of keeping the profits will keep them motivated.

After the sale is over, you may want to have scheduled a Goodwill or Salvation Army pickup. DO NOT take the stuff back into your house! You were willing to get rid of that stuff once ---so you really don't need it, -- so don't let it get back into your house! (Remember the clutter? The piles of stuff you had to walk around? Ugh!) Store it in the garage until a pickup or drop off can be arranged.

So now you are ready to lessen the stuff in your house, get people to carry your stuff away, and put some green stuff in your pocket! Good luck and happy selling!

# 2013: Big changes coming for North Avenue

In 2011, the Wauwatosa Common Council unanimously approved master plans to help guide the future of both the Village and East Tosa commercial districts. These plans provided a 15-year roadmap advising the city on how to gradually phase-in a

series of recommendations ranging from infrastructure improvements to updates to the city's zoning code. Almost immediately, community leaders in both commercial districts began to brainstorm with city officials on which projects should be prioritized.

Just two years later, East Tosa is in the midst of realizing the first round of recommended improvements. Capitalizing on a study in the master plan that concludes that up to \$20 million in consumer spending leaves the district each year due to a perceived lack of diverse dining options, several prominent area restauranteurs have decided to open locations on North Avenue in the coming weeks, and several more announcements are likely coming soon. Boutiques are also opening stores in East Tosa, with one even relocating their entire store from Milwaukee's Third Ward.

The master plan also recommends major changes to the traffic pattern on North Avenue. Considering these recommended changes, as well as responding to concerns

from residents and businesses alike that the current chicane traffic pattern was unsafe for pedestrians and business patrons, the four aldermen representing portions of East Tosa (Donegan, Pantuso, Moldenhauer, and Tilleson) jointly petitioned the city's Public Works Department to apply the first round of budgeted funds to enhancing safety on North Avenue. Planning is well underway on that project, and the city's Traffic & Safety Committee is currently reviewing a proposal that eliminates the winding chicane pattern and adds a bike lane on both sides of North Avenue between 60th and 76th. At a recent public hearing on the proposed traffic pattern, residents lauded the traffic-slowing features, and businesses praised the added parking spots and increased awareness that comes with opening the Avenue to bike commuters (a recent citizen survey revealed that hundreds of Tosans bike to work each day). The city expects to begin this resurfacing project by mid-Summer with targeted completion by early Fall.

While these early positive developments are thrilling to the residents who have observed these changes from year-to-year, the appeal is reaching beyond Wauwatosa's borders as well. Last October, it was announced that East Tosa will host the final day of the Tour of America's Dairyland 2013 bike race. This tour-style race is one of the largest of its kind in North America and will draw thousands of racers and spectators from around the world to the sidewalks along North Avenue. The day-long race will be held on Sunday, June 30.

# **Spring Egg Hunt Recap**

On a day when the calendar said spring but the snow on the ground said otherwise, Twenty six TETNA families and their children gathered at Center Street Park for the annual Spring Egg Hunt.

Volunteers arrived early to hide 900 eggs. The 45 children were able to search for eggs throughout the park. There was an area marked off for the smaller children so they could hunt for eggs away from the enthusiastic older children.

# 2013 - The Year of the Chicken

In February, the City Council approved an ordi-



nance allowing Tosa residents to own and keep chickens in their backyards. The ordinance will be in effect for a one year trial period and will allow residents to own up to four hens (no roosters).

Residents wish-

ing to have chickens must obtain written permission of all neighbors adjacent to or diagonally abutting your property, including those across an alley. In addition, a site plan must be approved by the Development Director. Finally there is a license fee per chicken kept. Application packets may be obtained on the City's website (http://wauwatosa.net/?nid=1140).

If you are considering raising chickens, there are certain things to consider. First, you must have a

secure coop. The coop should be secure against raccoons, hawks, dogs, cats and other unwanted visitors. The coop should also provide a safe place for the chickens to lay eggs. You can purchase coops or build your own. Do your research to find the type of coop that is right for you.

Research the type of chickens you would like to have. There are so many different types from good egg layers to fancy chickens with distinct plumage. A good place to start would be a hatchery which sells chickens. A large hatchery such as the Murray McMurray Hatchery (http://www.mcmurrayhatchery.com) offers many varieties of chickens and will ship. There are also local hatcheries such as Purely Poultry in Fremont, WI (http://www.purelypoultry.com). You can also talk to producers at local farmer's markets.

Finally, learn about proper chicken care. Know what type of feed your chickens eat and have it on hand when they arrive. Keep everything clean. A clean environment will reduce the chances of disease, parasites and other problems.


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
