President's Letter HELLO NEIGHBORS!

With the changing of the seasons, we're bringing in our last harvests from the garden and getting ready for winter, clearing out the last of the garden trimmings and making sure the snow blower's tuned and ready. How wonderful to roll into fall knowing we have such a great event to cap off the summer and fall months, nighttime Trick or Treat.

As a kid, I remember going out on Halloween night, no matter what night of the week it was. Staying out late and roaming the neighborhood was all part of the experience. It's just how we did it. Times have changed and we're very fortunate the city allows our neighborhood association to recreate a similar experience for our children by hosting the nighttime Trick or Treat as an organized event.

In order to make this event happen and keep it going for years to come, we've put in place a certain level of organization to help keep the event safe and family friendly, and to disperse the cost/effort. On a serious note, our event is intended for neighbors only. We just can't include friends and family who don't live in our neighborhood. This is for a number of reasons, which I'll explain below.

We've concentrated Trick or Treat on the two blocks between Clarke and Meinecke, away from the main streets of Center and North. That way our kids are off the busy thoroughfares and parents can worry a little less at street crossings.

Concentrating the event also puts an added financial burden on our neighbors volunteering to hand out candy on those blocks. That's why we ask for a set number of candy pieces per participant, so we can distribute them to the volunteer houses. Did you know some homes still buy additional candy to make sure they don't run out early? What nice neighbors we have! Please keep them in mind when selecting your participant candy and make sure the candy count meets or exceeds the count per child requested. We've also adjusted the participant cost to more evenly distribute the cost to all participants, regardless of household size.

We also need liability insurance for this type of event. It's an important component to keeping this event viable for many years to come. By limiting the event to those we serve, our neighbors in our neighborhood, we're able to keep the costs of the event down and manage the liability of our neighborhood association. This is an unfortunate necessity that comes with the times we live in.

So enough about the "why we do it," lets concentrate on the great memories our kids will have thanks to the dedicated volunteers who make Trick or Treat happen every year. I'd like to thank in advance all our volunteers who help make it possible. Be sure to share your thanks with them when you stop by registration.

Let's not forget the other great events we've hosted for the neighborhood this past year; the organized rummage, the neighborhood block party and movie in the park, the neighborhood charity run and many more. Look for these events plus more in 2013 and get them on your calendar.

Remember to help out neighbors, clearing snow and ice when you can, and pitch in to keep the main walking paths toward the grade school and North Avenue free of ice. That will encourage more of us to get out, walk, and chat with neighbors, even in the cooler months.

THE TOSA EAST TOWNE GARDEN CLUB

The newly formed Garden Club met at a resident's house to peruse the landscaping. The gardens were mostly shady areas utilizing low-maintenance shade-loving plants like various hostas, astilbe, ajuga and pachysandra.

The residence also boasted a Victory garden with green beans, tomatoes, zucchini and swiss chard. Herbs, such as chives, mint, basil and rosemary, were interspersed throughout, tucked in corners and featured in the easy-to-reach areas. Pest-inhibiters like marigolds, nasturtiums and onions were strategically planted to spread the resistance across the entire garden. Rain barrels collect and store rainwater for future use or for constant seepage into soaker hoses.

A goldfish pond in the rear was a focal point with water lilies and several "feeder fish" that have grown to enormous size in the 75-gallon pool. A small fire pit graced the center of the backyard, where the family gathers for songs and s'mores.

An event is underway for March to help people plan for spring planting and to have more "green" ideas on keeping a beautiful lawn and landscape.

City Dog Life: Games to Play with Your Dog

Living in the city can present special challenges for dog owners and their pets. While in other settings dogs have room to run through a field, swim in a stream, or

chase something furry to their hearts' content. Here we must find appropriate ways to stimulate and engage our dogs' brains and bodies. You can try fun games even in the smallest yards and apartments that tap into your dog's natural instincts!



OWNING A DOG IN THE CITY OF WAUWATOSA

LICENSE LAWS

Dogs and cats are required to be licensed by March 31 of each year before the pet reaches six months of age or within 30 days of Wauwatosa residency. Proof of rabies vaccination must be given before licenses will be issued. License tags should be attached to a collar and kept on at all times.

Licenses are available at the Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission Office, through the MADACC website, or at the Treasurer's Office. The fee is \$12 for a neutered or spayed animal and \$24 for an unaltered animal.

NUISANCE LAWS

The maximum number of both dogs and cats over the age of three months is limited to a total of three animals, with no more than two of either species being female.

Frequent or habitual noises by animals are prohibited and may be considered a nuisance.

Owners or dog walkers must carry a feces scoop and shall be responsible for its acts on either public or private property. Property should be cleaned up immediately. Dogs and cats must be maintained in a clean, healthy, and sanitary environment.

Animals may not run at large. Leashes may not exceed 10' in length for leashed animals.

ANIMAL BITES

Report all bite incidents to the Wauwatosa Police Department at the non-emergency number (414) 471-8430. The police report will be sent to the Wauwatosa Health Department for investigation.

DIGGING

Does your dog love to dig everywhere he shouldn't? Digging is pure pleasure for many dogs, and a pure pain to the city gardener or tenant dealing with a tiny space. Rather than scolding your dog for something he so clearly enjoys, how about giving him a designated digging area? Whether a section of the yard, a small kiddie pool or sandbox with a lid, fill an area with sand and, when your dog isn't looking, hide a few toys, tennis balls, and/or bones in the sand.

Show your dog where to dig-dig a little yourself and talk in an excited voice if he needs encouragement. Don't be afraid to act a little silly! The more excitement and interest you exhibit, the more your dog will get into the game! Very soon that patch of sand will become everybody's favorite place in the yard. Be aware that some dogs really like to throw sand around when they dig, and you may have to sweep or rake sand back into the box from time to time. Re-bury the toys at night so your dog has new treasures to find each day.

HIDE AND SEEK

Really! Your dog will love it. If you have a young puppy or a new-to-you adopted dog, start by hiding in the next room or on the other side of the couch and calling her. You don't want to frustrate your pooch by making it too hard at the beginning, so make it easy. When she comes galumphing in to where you are, tell her what a good girl she is and give her a few treats to reinforce the idea that finding her human is a wonderful thing.

Once she is really into this game, you can play all over the house and yard (on a long leash if you don't have a fenced yard for safety). Again, make your hiding places easy at first, and always be very excited when she finds you. As she gets the game, you can make your hiding places harder and more interesting. This is a great game for kids to play with their dog, and uses up a little kid AND dog energy—never a bad thing.

These games are just the beginning! Take a look around and be creative with "props" that are in and around your house!

If you have not been to Bel Air Cantina before, I hope you will give it a try when they make a new location on 68th and North Avenue next spring. It will be definitely worth your while.

The first thing you will notice about Bel Air is the attitude, the mood and atmosphere when you walk in is fun and trendy. It's a place where you know you'll have fun. If you are a tequila fan, you will probably never want to leave, three words—The Tequila Society. Bel Air is NOT your "traditional" Mexican restaurant. It is a Mexican Fusion

restaurant. Fusion is a culinary term to describe the melding of two types of cuisine;

Italian Nachos, Vietnamese Spaghetti Bolognese, the California Burger for example. Bel Air Cantina does that effectively and efficiently.

The menu has some standard fair, chips & salsa, guacamole and tacos with Bel Air's flavor twists. Where your tongue will part with the ordinary is when the flavor gets kicked up to a new level. The Arbol Salmon, grilled salmon topped with arbol chili sauce and citrus slaw, is a delightful mix of flavor and texture. Asian pork as a meat choice for your tacos is a perfect example of Fusion, bringing two cultures together on your palate. The Korean Beef fajitas are quite the dining experience. The perfectly tender and seasoned meat melts in your mouth.

I have always been impressed with the portion size for the value at Bel Air. We always leave with leftovers and they re-heat nicely the next day for lunch. That way you get to enjoy your experience a little longer.

Soon you can walk there and enjoy all this yourself. But for now you can dream...or head down to their first location on Milwaukee's East Side.


