"Crime is very difficult to prevent," says Wauwatosa Police Sergeant Paul Leist, "because you have to take away a person's desire to commit the crime. We can lock our doors, check our windows, but if that person's

desire remains, they're going to find another crime scene."

Sergeant Leist spoke to a crowd of about 40 people at the Tosa East Towne Neighborhood Association's annual meeting. The neighbors who gathered at Cranky Al's wanted to know if the darkened street lights at night or the economy had any effect on crime.

Sergeant Leist said he needed to check the statistics, but he doubted any specific crime had been committed because of the darkened streetlights. He also said he has yet to connect the economy to crime. "Most of these are career criminals," he said. Criminals are going to commit crime regardless.

While it is difficult to prevent crime, Sgt. Leist said what we can do is displace it. "We can displace crime by being good observers and quick callers." Sgt. Leist says the police response time is a couple of minutes, maybe less. "Take advantage of this."

Sgt. Leist said in the first two months of 2011, overall crime was down 24 percent in Wauwatosa compared to the same time last year. In Tosa East Towne, crime was down 15 percent. He said most of the police calls are related to theft. Burglaries account for the second most common calls to police. Most of the burglaries occur in opened or unlocked garages. continued on page 7







Square-foot Gardening and Organic Seeds

Did you ever want to have a garden? Do you like homegrown veggies? Do you think you have to have a lot of room to do it? Do you think you don't have enough room to do it?

To say we have small yards in East Towne Tosa would be putting it mildly. But there are a lot of great things we can do in our small gardens and vegetable plots that will really give us a lot of bang for our buck.

A new book, "Square-Foot Gardening" by Mel Bartholomew sells for about \$20 and can give inspiration to those of us with tiny yards. The basis of his gardening style is that traditional gardening is based on commercial growing, which needs large rows for equipment tires to roll along. But in a small space, the ground used for rows is wasted space. Bartholomew's concept is that with a 4-foot square, you can reach all of your plants with fewer rows.

"We get about one robbery a week in Tosa, burglaries: about three to five a week." However, Sgt. Leist emphasized the numbers are low. "We are talking about hundreds, not thousands of crimes like in larger cities."

Sgt. Leist attributed the safety and quality of Tosa East Towne to the residents. "You, the neighbors, pay attention to what's going on. When you see something unusual, you've got to call us." He suggested everyone program the police department's seven digit non-emergency number into their cell phones: 471-8430.

One neighbor at the meeting said his home had been burglarized one night in December when the streetlights had been off. The city of Wauwatosa has been experimenting with turning off some streetlights periodically to save money.

Sgt. Leist emphasized the importance of keeping lights on in and around the house regardless of whether the streetlights are on or off. "Leave them on all night."

The Wauwatosa Police Department's Community Support Division also offers free home security inspections. You can call 471-8430, ext. 111 to arrange for an officer to come to your home and point out areas where you can make your home more secure.

Still, there is concern the darkened streetlights are also putting pedestrians at risk. Fifth District Alderman Bobby Pantuso agrees. He told the crowd he is "absolutely against" the darkened streetlights. He said he has been working with City Administrator James Archambo to try to figure out a better method.

Alderman Pantuso said one idea is to take the grid and black out every other streetlight instead of darkening the whole block. The long term goal, however, is to replace the incandescent streetlights with energy-efficient LED lights. Alderman Pantuso said that is a very expensive process. Given the current budget issues, he said it could take maybe five years to replace all the streetlights.

Also at the meeting, Meg Miller of the North Avenue Neighborhood Alliance talked about efforts to keep North Avenue a vital part of our community. She said there is an ongoing effort to recruit businesses to North Avenue. A bakery known for its artesian bread has tentative plans to move across from the Rosebud Theater. Miller said residents can visit www.easttosa.org to view long range plans for North Avenue in Tosa East Towne.

Basically, you have a raised bed that is 4-foot by 4-foot with a walkway around it. This 4-foot-square is broken into 16 one-foot squares in which you plant your seeds or seedlings. For every person in your family, there should be one 4x4 square in order to have enough vegetables to enjoy for the summer.

The other realization that Bartholomew had was how much material was wasted by home gardeners. How many of us have opened the package of carrot seeds, sprinkled the entire 200 seeds in the row and then, later, thinned them out (wasting plants) and then found yourself with a bountiful harvest of too many carrots for your family to eat at once? With Bartholomew's plan, in one 1x1 square, you would plant exactly what you need. You plant what you will eat at the time of harvest.

Each plant takes a certain amount of room in the 1x1 spot and Bartholomew gives good direction on which plants will take more room. In a 1x1 square, you could plant 16 carrot seeds or 9 spinach seeds or one broccoli plant. Some plants, like zucchini, take a 3x3 space of your 4x4 square. Then you use the remaining seven 1-foot squares for other plants. Trellis in the back, tall plants nexts, and small plants on the southern side for maximum sun for all!

Even if you don't want to use Bartholomew's plan, he has great tips on pest control. Some plants are natural pest repellents. Marigolds and onion are two. If planted toward the center of your garden, they can repel pests in a 10-foot radius! And no pesticides on your veggies!

I am trying this gardening style on the side of my house this summer. (Yes, in that coveted sunny spot in my yard) and I can't wait to watch my garden grow!


