

# LOOKING INTO OUR PAST Tosa East Towne's Rich History

**Next time you're out** in your backyard, close your eyes. Imagine being completely surrounded by an ancient forest: maple, beech, white and red oak, black walnut and hickory trees. Imagine looking up and seeing nothing but a canopy of leaves so dense it blocks the sunlight. Beneath your feet is a thick carpet of dried leaves and branches. Suddenly you hear a branch snap nearby. It could be just a squirrel...or a wild turkey, a deer, a lynx, a wildcat or even a bear!

Welcome to Tosa East Towne—180 years ago. The forest here provided

great hunting for Native Americans. The Pottawatomie village nearby was ruled by Chief Wau-wau-tae-sie.

Charles Hart, the first white settler, arrived in the area from Connecticut in 1835. Others from New England soon followed. Treaties with the U.S. Government would eventually force the Native Americans from this area. Still, for years, it was common to see numerous Indians from different tribes wander into the area to trade with the settlers.

The forest that once covered our Tosa East Towne area was cleared for farmland. Settlers paid \$1.25 per acre to the U.S. Government. Originally, our East Towne area was split in two. Aaron and Nathan Paddack owned the western half. H.H. Freeman owned the eastern half. They sold off parcels of land to several families.

This terrible occurrence has all of the Tosa neighborhood associations asking if they have the coverage they need. "What if this happens, are we covered?" "What if that happens?" "What if people (fill in the blank), —are we covered?"

And yes, Tosa East Towne is also asking these questions, too. We are finding out exactly what our insurance covers. What does it cover? Who does it cover? When does it cover? Where does it cover?



Recent research has shown that incorporating a number of key design elements can substantially improve the overall quality of life for these residents. With diminished memory and reasoning capacities, those with Alzheimer's disease respond more intensely to their surroundings than those who are not cognitively impaired. This renovation will allow us to not just take good care of our residents, but to give them their best opportunity to truly thrive.

corn, wheat and rye? Look out your window and envision the cows and horses that roamed there. Children probably threw pebbles into a small stream called Schoonover Creek. You can see what remains of that creek in the Washington Highlands.

In 1869, Cornelius Lefeber (son of Charles Lefeber secretary to Napoleon Bonaparte) moved his family from Ohio to 60th Street and North. His son, Abraham, also bought 62 acres in our neighborhood. In 1876, only ten families owned land in what is now Tosa East Towne.

Many of the people who settled in Wauwatosa were educated and well read. The education of their children was very important to them. Private lessons were taught in the homes of prominent citizens. The first public school was established in 1838 in the home of Gideon Wales, just west of the village on Harwood Avenue. There were only seven students at the time. A few years later the school was built where St. Bernard's is today. The Underwood family built the first private school near Mayfair and Watertown Plank Roads in 1839.

Churches played an important role in the lives of the people here, also establishing schools and holding social events. There were picnics, closely supervised dancing parties, lecture and singing parties. Playing cards was banned. Circuses were not welcome. There were no theaters or show houses. The New Englanders who settled here thought all actors were characters of low morals. Even when a play was held in a school building, it could lead to great controversy! In the summer, girls would fill baskets with food to be auctioned off to the highest bidder. Several courtships were probably started this way. In the winter, people would strap blades to their shoes and skate on the Menomonee River which stretched 150 feet across at some points.

In the 1920s, Wauwatosa grew from just under 6000 people to 25,000. A large number of people from Milwaukee started to move here. There wasn't any one event that caused this. The population boom was credited to Wauwatosa's reputation for being a beautiful area, with wonderful artesian well water, a fabulous school system and a high quality citizenry.

Abraham Lefeber died in 1922 and his land was subdivided. This happened right after Wauwatosa adopted one of the most workable zoning ordinances in the state. The ordinance specified a designated use for each lot and limited stores and light manufacturing plants to certain streets.

Many of the homes in Tosa East Towne were built during the 1920s. Roosevelt Elementary was built in 1929.

There are stories to be told about our area. Maybe you've heard about the ghosts lurking in some of our old East Towne homes. Do you have strong family roots in Tosa? How did those large families live in our bungalows with just one bathroom and little closet space? Was there really a skating rink at Center Park?

# NORTH AVENUE NEIGHBORHOOD ALLIANCE UPDATES

# East Tosa North Avenue Planning Project

**Every great neighborhood is** associated with a lively and functioning main street, where locals and visitors intermingle while the hum of daily life continues. Access to services and goods on our commercial strip should be easy, convenient and reflective of the local economy. With funding from a Community Development Block Grant, the City of Wauwatosa with assistance from the North Avenue Neighborhood Alliance (a citizen-led 501c3 non-profit) selected RDG Planning & Design of Omaha Nebraska to prepare a comprehensive plan of North Avenue between 60th and Wauwatosa Avenue with the idea of reconnecting the local business environment and success with the demographic and economic realities of the neighborhoods.

Residents of Washington Highlands, Old Hillcrest, TETNA, Pabst Park and Inglewood Heights, lead by Planner Marty Schukert of RDG, participated in many discussions and a three-day Design Workshop to identify physical and economic realities which currently depress our local economy, and opportunities to enhance the place we love as East Tosa. The resulting concepts are available for review at easttosa.org. 
