Morrison Park Receives Upgrades Spigot installed, Trees pruned, and Traffic Box to be Painted

Since the 1970's the neighborhood association has partnered with the city to care for Morrison Park at the corner of Harvard Street and Culver Road. Morrison Park is the only green space within CHAP21 and more importantly is the first thing many people see when entering our community. You may have noticed some small changes this summer at the park that are part of a long term plan to improve the aesthetics and ease the maintenance of the park:

- We now have a water spigot installed in the park to ease the burden of watering. The spigot was funded directly by the dues we collect from the CHAP21 neighbors.
- High Falls Tree Service has generously donated their time to trim the ornamental trees at the park.



New Sidewalk Ramps for Harvard Street

New Parking Regulations Also in Effect

It was hard not to notice the construction vehicles on Harvard St. the past few months. They were installing curb ramps where the sidewalks meet the cross streets (Audubon, Beverly, Calumet, etc.) as part of the city's compliance with the Federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The city requested that the neighborhood associations inform their residents that installation of the ramps means new parking regulations. New York State law does not allow parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection (regardless of the crosswalk has or does not have delineated lines). So please be aware when parking on Harvard St. – all cars must be at least 20 feet from the new curb ramps. The city can ticket vehicles that violate the parking regulations. Any questions or concerns about the new curb ramps or the updated parking regulations can be addressed to the city's Traffic Control Board at 428-6709.

-The City of Rochester has removed the bricks lining Culver Road in preparation for replacement of a major water main valve later this summer. Also, the city has replaced sections of heaved sidewalk and has made plans to pour a concrete pad for the bus stop located on Culver Road.

-The "Traffic Box" on the corner is scheduled to be painted this summer.

What would become the CHAP21 neighborhood association was "dormant" for many years. What sparked the re-birth? Residents in the neighborhood came together to fight for property they were slated to lose as part of the can of worms re-construction project. After several meetings, the neighbors formally formed CHAP21 in August 1986. Zelda Artson-Crichlow and Bea Slizewski became the first co-chairs of the new neighborhood association.

The board has already discussed a number of potential names that have historical significance, such as Leighton Lea, a tract in our neighborhood that was annexed by the city in 1895; Old Brighton; Wide Waters/Erie Canal (remnants of which are found at Lake Riley in Cobbs Hill Park); Council Rock tract (which is where my home at 1058 Harvard is built); Morris Park, etc. We have also discussed potential names that carry a greater geographical significance, such as Harvard Speedway, Park Ave. East, ABC Neighborhood, etc. We are open to suggestions from the membership; any idea is welcome. Do you have a suggestion for a name change that will enhance the stature of our neighborhood? Or should we keep the name as is? 
