I "felt" Sally more than I actually knew her. By this I mean that during the few times we shared together she impacted upon my sense of self in such



an authentic way that it was impossible for me not to respond in kind. In her presence, I felt appreciated and valued without having to be profound. Hers was a rare gift, and selfishly I will miss her recognition of what it means to be uniquely human.

Sally was a writer and encouraged me to follow her lead. This reflection is a way of thanking Sally for her faith in my ability to express my thoughts through an art form she chose to reflect upon her own. Her powerful presence equaled her powerful words. I am simply trying to return the favor.

When I learned that Sally had died, a question occurred to me: what happens to the mind when the heart stops beating? Do our precious meandering thoughts, our bursts of ah-hahs, our fragments of poetry and bouts of mindfulness cease to exist when we do? Or like all great minds, will the people who knew us keep knowing us because their minds and hearts refuse to let us go? In Sally's case, I believe the answer is yes.

I would like to leave Sally's family and friends, in our neighborhood and in places we can only imagine Sally's thoughts took her, with a quotation by Henry Van Dyke. He sums life up quite nicely. I think Sally would agree.

#### The Ship: A Parable of Immortality

I am standing upon the seashore. A ship at my side spreads her white sails to the morning breeze and starts for the blue ocean. She is an object of beauty and strength, and I stand and watch until at last she hangs like a speck of white cloud just where the sea and sky come down to mingle with each other.

Then someone at my side says, 'There she goes!'

Gone where?

Gone from my sight ... that is all.

She is just as large in mast and hull and spar as she was when she left my side and just as able to bear her load of living freight to the place of destination. Her diminished size is in me, not in her.

And just at the moment when someone at my side says, 'There she goes!' there are other eyes watching her coming and their voices ready to take up the glad shouts 'Here she comes!'

## City of Rochester

## Dear Neighbor,

We need your help to make our City safe for pedestrians and motorists. Please obey the alternate parking and other parking regulations posted along City streets.

In addition to the posted restrictions, here are several other general rules for parking that apply in all areas of the City.

## It is unlawful to:

- -Park less than five feet away from the edge of any driveway
- -Park less than fifteen feet away from any fire hydrant
- -Park any vehicle more than twelve inches away from the edge of the roadway
- -Park on or across any sidewalk, crosswalk, grassy area, or privately owned driveway
- -Park any vehicle on a city street for more than twelve hours at a time.
- -Park any vehicle in an intersection (or obstructing an intersection)
- -Park with your vehicle's driver side towards the curb (except one way streets where allowed)

Parking in a legal manner allows fire, ambulance and police vehicles to respond quickly to emergencies. It also helps citizens to walk and drive safely in our neighborhoods.
