



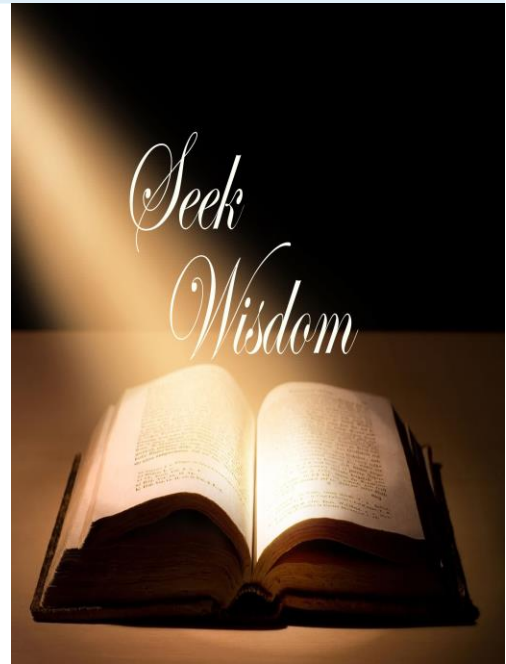

Halloween is a source of controversy for Christians. The thought of celebrating such an occasion with ghosts, goblins, witches, crazy clowns, spirits and other ghastly costumes raises cause for alarm. Does recognizing and engaging in such activities go against scripture and what exactly is the origin of Halloween? And should Christians engage in the merriment of the day?

Research suggests that Halloween is the evening before the Christian holy days known as "All Saints' or "Hallowmas" which is November 1st followed by "All Souls' Day November 2nd. Associated with the Reformation, its focus is on religious freedom won during that time. Yet there are also those who use the day to celebrate and pay tribute to Satan.



The bible does not specifically address Halloween and it is clear why there may be consternation about observing such an occasion. Maybe if people understood the real reason and origin of the day there could be more discussion and understanding that could perpetuate making decisions based on real knowledge.
