Nuances of Editing for a Global Audience DAVID B. SCHLOSSER

As the world grows ever more connected, English is increasingly essential as the common language shared among people engaged in commerce, academics, and culture. People around the world come to English in different ways—from schools, from immersion, from books, from movies, from music—and from languages that differ significantly from English in their structure, habits, and even alphabet. David B. Schlosser will lead this exploration of how editors can contribute to the fundamental goal of maximizing the accessibility of written communications when their audiences might arrive from any location with an Internet connection.

David B. Schlosser is an award-winning editor, and has also been recognized with awards for his fiction and nonfiction writing. After careers in politics and public relations, for the past seven years he has focused on editing, writing, and publishing consulting. He has worked on all flavors of fiction and nonfiction, and has edited the scientific and engineering journal for one of the world's largest microprocessor companies. "Can You Really Make a Living at This?" Creating and Maintaining a Sustainable Editing Business

There's more to being a successful independent editor than understanding the craft of good writing. This workshop—taught by two full-time editors and communicators who do, indeed, make a living at this looks at the business of being a freelancer. We'll talk about strategically deciding what services to provide, attracting the clients you want (and avoiding those you don't), budgeting, negotiating, marketing, networking, and finding balance.

Ina Chang is a freelance writer and editor specializing in strategic communications for corporations and foundations. She spent two decades editing nonfiction books and has also worked as an Associated Press reporter in China, a freelance journalist, and a nonfiction writing instructor. She is the author of the children's book *A Separate Battle: Women and the Civil War.* Ina serves on the board of directors of Freelancers Union as its elected member representative.

Beth Jusino is a freelance developmental editor and publishing consultant, working with individual writers to help them navigate the terrain between first draft and published book. A former literary agent, she's the author of two short e-books: *Writing a Nonfiction Book Proposal* and *Market While You Write*. A Horse of a Different Color: Fiction Editing

There is no doubt that the rise in self-publishing has created an increasing demand for qualified developmental and copy editors for fiction projects. However, the skills, sensibility, and touch necessary for fiction editing can be quite distinct from those that nonfiction editing requires. This hands-on workshop will explore the nuances of different fiction genres, address the most common mistakes nonfiction editors make when approaching fiction, and touch on how to gauge and execute the correct level of edit for your author's needs.

Leslie Miller and Ingrid Emerick, cofounders of Girl Friday Productions, are experienced fiction editors and have overseen hundreds of fiction-editing projects. Former publishing executives for the women's writing imprint Seal Press, they established Girl Friday, a boutique editorial and writing company, in 2006. IT Help Desk for Editors: Protecting and Sharing Your Data TIM HANNON

Have questions about the Cloud, computer function, security, backups, or anything else computer-related? IT guru Tim Hannon will provide expert advice for both Mac and PC users. 
