COUNTRY OVERVIEW Ghana is a lower middle income country (LMIC) located in West Africa sitting on the Atlantic Ocean and bordered by Togo, Cote d'Ivoire, and Burkina Faso. In 2017, Ghana's economy accelerated to 8.1% making it the second-fastest growing economy in Africa behind Ethiopia. The main drivers of the economy are mining, oil and cocoa production sectors. **CARE** began operations in Ghana in 1994 as part of the Gulf of Guinea (Benin, Ghana, Togo) mission, transitioning to a full Country Office in 2009.

PROGRAMME FOCUS

ADDRESS THE INJUSTICE OF POVERTY

Our programmes focus on two main areas in the fight against extreme poverty and social injustice: Social and Economic Empowerment (SEE) and Food and Nutrition Security (FNS) seeking to transform the lives of poor, vulnerable and marginalized women and youth.

INTEGRATED APPROACHES

EMPOWERING WOMEN, IMPROVING FOOD AND NUTRITION SECURITY

CARE and partners work with communities, especially women smallholder farmers in cocoa, soy and groundnut value chains to improve productivity and profitability, diversify livelihoods and increase household incomes, promote the production and consumption of diverse and nutritious foods; with specific attention to strengthening capacities for inclusive governance and accountability, resilience building, and sustainability.

Our core approaches also seek to **strengthen women's voice**, **participation and leadership in decision-making** in the household, in the community, and in the broader society, as well as their access to and benefit from opportunities and resources.

MINDING THE GAP

CARE's programmes promote inclusive governance and social accountability in multiple sectors strengthening citizens' voice and contribution to solving development challenges.

LEAVE NO ONE BEHIND

CARE is committed to working with local civil society organizations, the private sector, government and communities to achieve the **Sustainable Development Goals (SDG)** and Government's "Beyond Aid" agenda; a vision of national self-reliance and independence from development with citizens equitably contributing to and benefiting from a vibrant and thriving economy.

CARE and our partners work with Government to strengthen institutional capacity for effective coordination and integration of all actors in centralized and decentralized development processes; promote an enabling environment for civil society and citizen participation and leadership in development planning and oversight; and facilitate dialogue and consensus/peace building to protect and sustain development gains.

EXPANDING ROLE AS CONVENER AND FACILITATOR

As a founding member and committed supporter of the Civil Society Organisations (CSO) Platform on the Sustainable Development Goals, CARE is a coconvener of the sub-platform for SDG 5 (Gender Equality) and a participant in in sub-platforms for SDGs 1, 14, and 15. We are working with Government to develop a Data Quality Assurance Framework for CSO reporting on the SDGs.

ENGAGING THE PRIVATE SECTOR AND IMPROVING BUSINESS PRACTICE

CARE is working with multinational and national private sector entities to **promote equitable**, **fair and inclusive business practices** in cocoa sector in particular, and agriculture in general. We also work to strengthen the capacity of civil society to secure, protect and fulfill the rights of communities affected by the activities of extractive industries; and with fishing communities to protect their livelihoods from overfishing and illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing. CARE is active in **preventing and responding to child labor** in the cocoa sector.

SECURING WOMEN'S RIGHTS IN AGRICULTURE

CARE supports Women in Agriculture Platforms (WAP) and Community Development Committee (CDC) through with women smallholder farmers and other community activists participate in and influence key decisions including the fair allocation of fertile land for farming to women. WAPs in Northern Ghana have been instrumental in influencing the Government's "Planting for Food and Jobs" programme to adjust its selection criteria to permit more women farmers to benefit from subsidies for inputs.

"We wanted a tractor for the WAP members in the Talensi District, so we wrote to the district assembly for support. Although the men put pressure on the committee to give them the tractor, we never gave up. The committee eventually gave us the tractor because, according to them, we were persistent, well organized, and convincing.

COUNTRY OFFICE OVERVIEW

The Ghana Country Office comprises 78 team members in four locations: Accra, Bolgatanga (Upper East Region), Kumasi (Ashanti Region), and Tamale (Northern Region) implementing a portfolio of 17 projects worth about USD \$8.6 million in 150 districts across the country working with more than 50 partners.


