They have been an enthusiastic bunch, having the good of the organization utmost in their minds. Over the years they have dealt with the never changing issue of declining membership, technology changes, and finding a focus or purpose that will revive and inspire old and new members. 

- Concerns:
- 1. Time frame for submitting resolutions from branch to district to provincial can be challenging.

### Branches with a District

- Most Districts have their Annual General Meeting in March or April when their members vote on any resolutions submitted by their branches.

#### Branches without a District

- **Districts that are active we need your input.** Would your District be able to review resolutions submitted by a branch in your area at an earlier time than at your AGM so the deadline can be changed.

### ACWW PROJECT—CARIBBEAN, CENTRAL & SOUTH AMERICA

**COUNTRY:** Guatemala

**SOCIETY:** Fundación Junkabal

**PROJECT:** Fertilise your Future

PROJECT NO: 1,022

ACWW GRANT: £5,807\* (£2,000 available to pledge) (around \$4,000.00 Canadian)

This project seeks to promote integral vocational training for 45 women so that they can be active agents of prosperity within their community. The beneficiaries are women aged 15 to 25 years, living around the municipal garbage dump of Guatemala City, who have not been able to complete their education and lack a sustainable livelihood or income with which to support their families.

The training will include workshops on the subjects of 'Values & Virtues' and 'Discover your Strengths and Vocation', so that the beneficiaries can discover their own value and abilities and build up their self-esteem. Personal interviews will be held with each beneficiary to help them to find out what income-earning activities interest them, and they will be registered with suitable vocational training schemes, for example in hairdressing, catering, pastry-making or IT.

It is expected that the beneficiaries will be able to improve their livelihoods considerably as a result of the project, either by setting up small businesses within their community or by finding employment in the formal economy.

On completion of their training, the women will be part of Junkabal's social programme and will be able to access further workshops and be part of its network of continuous support, including access to health clinics. Junkabal will monitor this project closely by means of regular visits to the women's homes and the community in order to understand the challenges they face and to assess the use they are making of their newly-acquired skills.

### **ACWW PROJECT—EUROPE**

ACWW GRANT: £8,388\* (pledges and donations received; amount now required: £1,238) (\$2,000.00 Canadian)

The aim of this project is to help victims of domestic violence to regain confidence and self-esteem and look forward to an independent life. The Association opened its shelter for women and children suffering from domestic violence in 2007, and members have been working hard ever since to provide a safe, welcoming environment for users of the shelter, and to equip them with skills and the means to move forward with their lives.

Materials will be purchased and trainers appointed, so that the beneficiaries can be taught 'quilling', an art form involving the use of strips of paper which are rolled, shaped and glued in order make decorative objects, such as pictures, photo frames, greetings cards, coasters, candlesticks etc. The training and the activity will be carried out for 12 months, but after two months, the beneficiaries will be involved in advertising and selling the objects they have created. It is expected that the children will participate as well, according to their ages and abilities.

By learning how to create beautiful things and by developing their physical, social and intellectual skills, it is hoped that the beneficiaries will have a more positive outlook than before, and feel better able to live independently. Items made as a result of the project will be advertised by means of flyers and sold at bazaars, local events and the Association's website. The money earned will be used to help fund the operating costs of the shelter.

\*The amounts shown are made up of the project grant, actually being sent to the implementing societies, plus 20% monitoring costs, which are always set aside for each project grant over £2,000. ACWW regards the monitoring of its projects as being of paramount importance.

### Triangle Women's Institute Celebrates 80th

The air was still and crisp outside the Grasmere Pioneer Hall, as snow steadily fell on the sleepy, silent little hamlet.

Inside the white brick building, it was a completely different story. The room hummed with hundreds of voices, chatting and laughing amidst the clink of plates. Visitors come from far and wide for the Annual Snowflake Salad Bar Luncheon and Bazaar in Grasmere, hosted by the Triangle Women's Institute. This year, they are celebrating their 80th Anniversary.

"Our charter ladies, in 1937, were the first wives of the pioneers in the valley," said Bonnie Crosson, a member of the group. The ladies operate the library out of the Pioneer Hall.

Back when the elementary school was functional in Grasmere, the library served the school, and children's gym classes were held in the Pioneer Hall.

The groups mandate has always focused on education. "To educate women, to support schools and to enhance communities," said Crosson, explaining that over the years the membership has fluctuated and the projects have varied, but the goal has always stayed the same.

The Grasmere chapter is part of a global network of Women's Institutes, which was started in the late 1800's.

When the group was established in 1937, founding women from pioneer families like the Sinclairs', the Phillips' and the MacDonalds' all banded together to help facilitate the establishment of hydro in the community. This first came from Eureka, Montana, the closest community, just across the US Border.

The ladies were also instrumental in getting Highway 93 extended down into their community.

"My husband's grandmother was one of the founding charter members," said Judy MacDonald, a member of the Triangle Women's Institute. "She was a hardworking lady."

Isabella MacDonald and her husband had a farm in the area and established a sawmill. She and other local ladies would trek up to Elko to help organize and cook meals for four days at a time during the cattle sales.

"Took everything but the kitchen sink," said MacDonald, joking that they would take everything they needed to fix up massive meals. "A tough breed, but also very kindly."

The ladies have raised money though countless concerts and fundraising meals to be donated as aid for flood victims, as well as to a fund called Sewing Machines For India and even to this day, they give an annual donation to BC Children's Hospital.

In 1979 the women received recognition from the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada for their outstanding contributions.

On a local level, the ladies sent care packages to soldiers overseas during wartime, and parties for them when they returned. They quilted blankets for families in need and even outfitted the Fernie Memorial Hospital nursery with hand-sewn clothing for infants born there.

Now, visitors come from as far as the Crowsnest Pass, Sparwood, and even south from Eureka to take part in the lunch and bazaar.

"The Institute started having their teas in the mid 1970's," said Crosson. The ladies switched over to a salad bar in the 80's, which has been a hit for decades. Over 125 people come out to feast on a selection of over 30 salads, made by the seven women running the Institute. "We've been doing this for so long," said Mary Munro, the president of the group. She says that in small communities like Grasmere, it's important to support each other. "This is a lovely bunch of ladies," she said.

"It's great to be part of this small community." Article by Alexandra Heck—Free Press





### Women We Recognize, Revere and Remember

February 19, 2018 marks the 121st Anniversary of the founding of the first Women's Institute in the world. WHERE did this happen – in Stoney Creek, Ontario; WHY did it happen? to bring women together to share their knowledge of ways to make their pioneer lifestyle healthier and easier, and to develop some laughter and fun for the whole family.





ation for our revered Founder Mrs. Adelaide Hoodless. Her vision and dedication to making life better for women, both rural areas and in small communities, has indeed been fulfilled.

Here in the Cowichan Valley, the Somenos and Cobble Hill Women's Institutes will be joining other members across the South Vancouver Island District. Together we will remember Mrs. Hoodless and her work. We will recall the efforts made by earlier members who helped shape our history in British Columbia.

In the 1920's Women's Institute members worked together to establish – not one, but 2! children's hospitals in our province. They were the first hospitals dedicated to children's health. Both opened and admitted their first patients in April of 1927 – both were 16 bed facilities, one in Vancouver and the other at Mill Bay. And what is the fate of these two hospitals? The one in Vancouver is now known as the British Columbia Children's Hospital and the one started at Mill Bay was moved to Victoria in 1958 and is known today as the Children's Health Foundation of Vancouver Island.

Both facilities have outstripped our ability to fund them, but we do continue to support them as much as we can, and feel a glow of pride at the service they are rendering to our youngest citizens.

During both World Wars, our members gave service both to communities right here and help overseas where possible. Their dedication showed also in the support they offered to our men and women in the military, as well as numerous ventures for the citizens living in Great Britain, Belgium, Russia and other countries. They gathered donations for many causes including Red Cross projects, ambulance monies, the Queen's Canadian Fund, and Milk for British Children - to mention a few.

All this is part of why we celebrate February. We recognize the efforts of members who have gone before, plus salute the work being done today. We will always remember why the Women's Institute was founded, and work to keep it alive and well to assist women of today who search for an outlet where they can learn, share their knowledge, all the while having some fun!




