## CAMPAIGN—CALL TO ACTION

Welcome back Ladies hope you have all had a wonderful summer and are ready to get back to work! We are hoping that Our "Single Use Plastics Campaign" is going to go strong this year and all Branches will participate is some ways. The following are suggestions of activities that your Branch or District can do. This is just a guideline and of course if you find other ways to get the word out please share with us.

- 1. If doing a Raffle Basket a good idea would be to do the basket with the Campaign in mind. Fill with metal straws, reusable mugs, cloth napkins, reusable wraps for food, shopping bags, a book or pamphlet on recycling in your area and whatever else would be appropriate. Also Why not attach to the basket an information sheet on WI and what we hope to accomplish thru this campaign. There is a downloadable information sheet on the BCWI website that you can use if you choose.
- 2. Have speakers for your members or the public. Speakers could be someone explaining the local recycling programs, how to compost (which also helps cut back on what we throw away), or any other relevant topic.
- 3. Host workshops either for your members or open them up to the public. Some suggestions could be making shopping bags, mesh vegetable bags, making your own reusable foods wraps,
- 4. Watch some informative documentaries with your members. The more we learn about the problem the better we are able to do something about it. A good one is "A Plastic Ocean", which is available on Netflix:
- 5. Do a tour of your local Recycling Facilities so all of your members can see what is involved and are clear on what can be recycled.
- 6. Write to your local MP"s or your Provincial, Federal Governments.
- 7. Meet with a local restaurant and local grocery stores ask what they are doing about single use plastics, express your concerns.
- 8. Explore other Groups and websites to get ideas. Take part in other initiatives such as The Great Canadian Shore Cleanup. Encourage your members to be observant and pick up plastics that are thrown away.
- 9. For WI week/month in February do a write up of what your branch has done and get the message out to your community by a local newspaper, Community Facebook page, other Service Groups in your area, by whatever recourses you have available to you.

I want to compile a report on the Campaign for the 2019 AGM, so please send me your thoughts and comments. Do you agree with Campaigning in general, did you learn something, should we as a Provincial BCWI continue with campaigns, if so what suggestions are there for future campaigns? ## RESOLUTIONS

Following the AGM, I reported my intention to forward the BCWI Resolution: Re

Absentee Foreign Investments of Agricultural Land to government. Letters went to the Premier, the Minister of Agriculture, and the Minister of the Environment and Climate Change Strategy. We received replies from Honourable Lana Popham and Honourable George Heyman.

Our letter was definitely read carefully. First, we know this because the minister uses several of our talking points including: affordability of farm land, foreign absentee investments, and preservation of agricultural land resource in her reply. Second, Minister Popham also outlined what she is actively engaged in doing, as her mandated priority in the revitalization of the ALR. Included in this was the Advisory 9 Member Committee tasked with holding public consultations. (Peace River District made a presentation to this committee last spring.)

Our point in sending our resolution to government was to seek legislation to give British Columbians the legal right to retain control of our food producing lands. The minister acknowledges that BC currently, does not have legislation regulating foreign ownership of farmland but she said that British Columbians have raised many issues in the consultation process, some regarding foreign ownership, and there is "significant support to ensure the Province continues to preserve the important agricultural land resource".

I am cautiously optimistic, as the reply from the minister states that the committee is using this input to develop recommendations for the ALR and ALC, "including potential changes to the current legislative, regulatory and administrative framework".

For members wishing to follow this issue I recommend reading Articles by Peter Mitham in Country Life in BC. Sept 2018 <u>ALR Report confirms agenda</u> and October 2018 <u>Local governments can't undermine ALR rules</u>. Mitham is reporting on the development of government agriculture policy. In the Sept issue he states that the preliminary report has" 17 specific recommendations... 13 for immediate legislative and regulatory change... and 4 steps that Victoria could take immediately to protect the land itself'. A final report is expected this fall. *Norma Tilgner, Resolutions Chair*

It is called the WE Fund. WE stands for **Women Empowered**.



ACWW has always had a close relationship with trees. Whether is has been planting them as part of projects work, or the use of the 'tree of life' in older logos or promotional materials, the tree reflects us putting down roots, building a community and the renewal of the passing seasons.

Our second competition is to use the theme of trees in making a beautiful tissue holder for the tissue travel packs size 11 cm x 5 cmx 3 cm (4,5" x 2,5" x 1,2")

Make a tissue holder for a purse depicting the theme of "Trees" using the technique of quilting. It can be done by hand or sewn with a machine.

Use 100% cotton fabric (quilter's weight cotton) if possible. Any other good quality fabric like linen can also be used. Make sure the fabric is colorfast and washable. Use good quality thread to compliment the finished article.

Fasteners like buttons or zippers may be used but it should be easy to open. The tissue holder should be lined. Be creative!

Submit: Bring to the Competitions stall in the Registration Area when you register, or as soon as possible thereafter.

For both competitions, please ensure that you remember to comply with the following:

1) You include your name, society and country on the back of the piece

2) You agree to allow ACWW free use of the image, or images of your artwork for promotion and publicity
