Victoria Salliss Creative Arts Legacy

This VSCA Legacy is a fund available to members wishing financial support in hosting workshops.

Members make an application for funds directly to the BCWI Office, a minimum of one month before the event. The office needs details of speaker/ instructor costs, topics covered, materials required, timeline, registration fee, date and location of event, hall rental costs, meals to be served etc. Members are reminded that although we need details of the proposed event that we will reimburse speaker or instructor costs only.

The Committee reviews the application and responds prior to the event either accepting the application with the details submitted or may request more information.

In some instances, funds may be denied if the workshops or speakers are not meeting the goals of the fund to educate or deliver experiences for attendees. After the event the applicant must submit to the committee chair a written summary, photos of participants and projects, participant evaluations, and the bills for the speaker/instructor costs. This summary and photos may be shared in the Network News. It is after receiving these documents that the funds will be

disbursed.

Resolutions Report

In light of the BC Government's Ministry of Agriculture News Flash, (news.gov.bc.ca/18392) "New legisla-

tion makes it clear: Farmland is for Farming," regarding the Revitalization of the ALR through amendments in Bill 52, it seems that many of our concerns presented to the B.C. Minister of Agriculture's Advisory Committee for Revitalizing the Agricultural Land Reserve (Jill Copes, Katharina Keuth, and Ruby McBeth), and subsequently to Minister Lana Popham (BCWI Resolution 2018) have not been addressed.

The three key changes announced in Bill 52 are: first reinstating one zone for all ALR land in BC; second, addressing mega mansions and speculation in order to curb non-farm development; last are penalties for dumping debris, toxic waste on valuable farmland that can damage arable soils.

What has not been addressed is our concern over absentee foreign investment of agricultural land. When large tracts of land are owned by absentee owners who make no provision for custodial use of their land it destroys rural communities, ranges become more susceptible to fires and weed infestation, and the prices of land are driven beyond the ability of young farmers to purchase.

Bill 52 received Royal Assent Dec 4th 2018. The Bill will not have force and effect until it is adopted sometime this year. Much work remains to be done. Another resolution from 2016, The Rape Kit Resolution is being reviewed with the purpose of changing language so it becomes applicable to all provinces and territories. It will be brought before the members at the AGM in Chilliwack, and will if accepted by members be forwarded to WI Canada (FWIC).

Members please note that any new resolutions to be discussed at the AGM must be presented to the chair of the Resolutions Committee by the end of January 2019.

Sometime back I prepared an article on the association between our Lieutenant Governors and the British Columbia Women's Institute. It seems fitting that now, as Her Honour Judith Guichon, Lieutenant Governor 2012 – 2018 has retired from office, that her role with our members through her term should be acknowledged.

Ms. Guichon came to our gatherings twice – once at Merritt, and once in Vanderhoof where she was made most welcome, and her comments encouraged us to perhaps greater goals than we had aspired to in the past. She assumed the role of Patroness, which was an honour for us. At the Vanderhoof Triennial Convention of the BC Women's Institute we agreed to meet one of Ms. Guichon's wishes – namely her desire to have an Institute-made quilt.

In Vanderhoof, a request was made for those interested in participating in this project attend a meeting of a hastily formed committee – and the enthusiasm evidenced at that time ensured its success. Last April, those of you who attended the Annual General Meeting in Kamloops saw the blocks assembled, and responded jubilantly.

So now the quilt is complete and ready to be presented. The Rural Women's Tea, at Heffley Creek on October 29th will be another Historic Achievement in the history of the British Columbia Women's Institute for as those of us who can attend will be witnesses, Ms. Guichon will be there to accept her quilt. This personalized quilt tells of some of her achievements, and perhaps some high points in her life.

Once more, we are making history. In my work with the old records of the WI, I have not encountered any story to compare to this. Yes, we have worked with many people, and prepared items for many others. We have raised money for hospitals, scholarships and bursaries, donated money and needed items to people who have lost their homes to fire, or have been driven out by forest fires, plus a host of other ventures. But this is the first time, in my mind, that we have celebrated our association with a non-member whose encouragement has meant so much to many of us.

So, on behalf of our members everywhere, may I extend a huge thank you to all those members who spent time working on this venture, and have produced such a superlative gift for such a super British Columbian!

A Story of a Timepiece

At different points in her lifetime, Madge Watt left many papers and other items in the care of her sister, Katie Robertson Arthur. Among these items was this watch, and this is its story.

First, let me trace how it arrived in my care: Those of you who attended the unveiling of the Madge Watt plaque in Metchosin in September of 2016 will no doubt remember her great niece, Helen Geissinger who spoke about Madge and Dr. Watt. This past September, Helen sent me a package, and packed among some papers we were exchanging, I found a small envelope which held this small watch.

Madge had left it in the care of her sister, Katie, who had passed it along to her daughter Bethia who was Helen's mother. The thought was "some future member of the family will want it." To quote Helen,

"some of those generations have arrived, and with their advent, I have done some serious thinking about this wristwatch. It has history attached to it that is not really a part of our family history...

It belonged to Madge Watt, given to her by E. Pauline Johnson. Did you have to read Johnson's poems when you were in school? She wrote most of her work in Ontario, so she was certainly in the English curriculum when I went through school. One really famous poem was The Song My Paddle Sings.

Apparently Madge and Pauline were friends. How they met and when/where I do not know. What Madge gave Pauline in return for this little watch is unknown. But what they had in common was their approach to life, in which they had to make their own living by writing. They shared ideas about women's importance in holding up 1/2 of the world, about the importance of education for women and girls, and about the equality of both partners in marriage – to name a few.

Wikipedia has a good article about Pauline Johnson, who is part Mohawk. It lists her accomplishments and outlines her life. When reading it, I could see where Pauline and Madge would have had similar ideas.

This watch is sent to you in your capacity as BCWI Historian. It is a small broken thing of value only to people who care about its previous owner. I had intended to get the band fixed and re-attached to the watch but have been unable to find anyone here who could do the work properly. My apologies for sending you the wristwatch in such a sorry state. Because it is so small, it has been lost several times. Thus, when I found it again recently, I decided to send it to you at once, rather than waiting yet longer to locate a repair person here.

Please decide what to do with it."

As you can well imagine, I have spent a good deal of time pondering what would be the best repository for this memento of Madge Watt:

Betty, in our office, has limited space. I am already storing more of the BCWI historic items than I am truly comfortable doing. If items like this watch are donated to an archive, such as the one where our papers are stored in at UBC Okanagan, frequently they are boxed, placed in "safe storage" and no one sees them again.

Then I considered the warmth and appreciation that abounded in Metchosin through the time when Donna Jack and I were searching for a location for the plaque, and throughout the time when the program and event were being planned. They have a museum, and the stories of Madge, and her husband Dr. Alfred Watt, are

part of the contents of that museum. I think that everyone in Metchosin knows their names and is aware of their contributions to today's society. I believe it will be the great pleasure of all British Columbia Women's Institute to know that this watch will be cared for and treasured by those who are cognizant of Metchosin's history.



Some time passed to allow the Provincial Executive to consider and give their approval. I was also working around holiday times, but about a week ago it all came together. I am very pleased to announce today that the watch will be donated to the Metchosin Museum where it will be in the care of people who have grown up on the Dr. Alfred and Madge Watt story.



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


Horsefly WI




(Sept-June) and an evening group (Oct-March).
