

#### Director—Fay Van Horn, Glenwood WI—Bulkley Tweedsmuir District



#### RESOLUTIONS

<u>RESOLUTION 2020-1</u> Make Water Cremation/Alkaline Hydrolysis an Option for British Columbians Taking Action on Carbon Emissions

Be it resolved that the South Vancouver Island Women's Institute petition the Solicitor General of the Government of British Columbia to amend the Cemetery, Interment and Funeral Services Act and all regulations to include a definition of cremation and in that definition include the provision for Alkaline Hydrolysis to be an approved method within the Province of British Columbia.

Further, we urge all British Columbia Women's Institute members to join us in this petitioning action.

#### Reasons for this request:

South Vancouver Island Women's Institute recognizes that even in death we can reduce our environmental footprint by reducing carbon emissions in the air by embracing new technologies to replace the practise of flame based cremation of the deceased human body in particular by the process of Alkaline Hydrolysis.

# <u>RESOLUTION 2020-2</u> Ban the Sale of Non Compostable Plastic Single Use Dog Waste Bags

Be it resolved that: Central Interior District Women's Institute urge the British Columbia Government to enact legislation to ban the sale of single use non compostable plastic dog waste bags and instead encourage products and methods that are proven environmentally safe and will degrade into natural substances.

#### Reasons for this request:

- BC has no legislation to prevent or discourage the ongoing use of non compostable plastic bags for disposing of dog waste.
- Plastic bags made from traditional petroleum/natural gas products take up to 1000 years to break down (oceancrusaders.org)
- Non compostable plastic bags eventually do break down into micro plastics infiltrating watersheds and soils.
- These micro plastics are entering the food chain and will have long term implications for animals and mankind.
- There are 8.2 million dogs in Canada. (Canada Animal Health Institute Jan. 2019) and the average dog produces 152 pounds of solid waste per year; and
- In the Westshore area of Victoria 640,000 dog bags are used each year. (Victoria News, Oct 24th 2018)
- There are many environmentally safe, methods and products, commercially available for the disposal of dog waste.

#### **RESOLUTIONS**

# <u>RESOLUTION 2020-3</u> We Demand our Right to a Fully Funded, Effective Public Education within Secure, Safe Schools

Members of British Columbia Women's Institute are mandated, in part, to ensure our children receive a good education in fully funded, safe schools, within the Public Education System.

British Columbia Women's Institute hereby resolves to strongly urge the Minister of Education to consider and implement the following.

#### The Minister of Education shall:

- 1. put an emphasis on and have accountability measures in place to ensure our students are being taught a strong foundation in printing, spelling, reading, and mathematics during the primary years.
- 2. provide adequate funding for required "duty staff," Educational Assistants, and other support staff to operate a quality, inclusive, educational program at each public school.
- 3. return the letter grade system to commence in the Grade 4 academic year and make it easily accessible to parents and students.
- 4. limit split classes to grades 1/2, 2/3, 4/5, 5/6 and where possible, kindergarten should not be in a split class.
- 5. limit the on duty adult to child ratio to 1:50 during recess and outdoor free playtimes.
- 6. limit the number of portables on one school property to 5 units. At such a time as population exceeds this then proper facilities are to be constructed in a timely manner.
- 1. With no pass or fail and no grading system in place in the elementary school years, our children can easily be pushed through the grades and be illiterate and unable to print legibly or complete basic academic skills and graduate. I personally know many children that have been pushed through and are lacking the basic skills academically. The parents (myself being one of them) were unaware as they misinterpreted the positive wording in the report cards and thought their children were doing well in school, during the primary years. Then when the child gets to grade 4 and the academic work is way over their child's head and they cannot keep up in class, do they realize their child is super behind academically. Then they have to play catch-up before middle school starts. We need accountability measures put in place to ensure our children are being taught adequately. Teachers need support because under the new academic system they are trying to teach extremely large split classes of children that are at all different levels of learning. How can they possibly accomplish this? Tim can't read, Tommy can't spell, Evan is bored and beyond his peers and needs more challenge, Maria is missing her Educational Assistant today and needs one to one support to learn ...
- 2. In Canada we pay taxes that go towards our school system. Educating our young should be our number one priority. Government needs to allocate more funding to our public school system. It is our basic rights as Canadians to receive a solid academic foundation during our childhood. Our children need to be adequately supervised during recess and lunch breaks for safety. We need our children to be housed in proper facilities. We need improved communication between the teachers and parents for academic success. We need librarians and counsellors returned to our schools. We rely on our PAC's to fund our libraries, build our playgrounds, and supply our teachers with money for classroom supplies and field trips. This is a disgrace.
- 3. Report cards have changed over the years. The language contained in the report cards are now worded so positively that parents can't decipher them and are having difficulty ascertaining how their child is actually doing in school. Children and parents both want to know academically how they are doing and the letter grade system is a very accurate, simple way to obtain this information. Letter grades also give the children


something to strive for in their studies. It also allows children to experience set backs in life while they are young and learn how to work through those trials positively. We are seeing a huge number of teens and young adults being diagnosed with stress and anxiety. A contributing factor is that they don't get the opportunity in their younger years to experience situations that are less than optimal. We adults tend to pave the way through life removing negativity and obstacles for them. (Participation ribbons for everyone). Receiving letter grades for the first time in grade 9 is too late as this can affect the drop out rate and their possible academic futures when applying to college and university. Children need the time to work toward improving their grades at a younger age before they are so far behind they can't catch up!

- 4. Kindergarten is a special year as it is the first introduction to school. It is mostly play based and is a time children learn to be in a classroom and be part of a group. Grade one is the beginning of academics. It is not fair to the children in grade one to be placed in a split class with kindergarteners. They are essentially repeating kindergarten and then are required to enter grade 2 the following year, therefore setting them behind their peers.
- 5. For example at one school; Currently we have 4 duties and 2 teachers working as duties during the lunch hour for a population of 415 students. This means our children are currently at 1:70. Currently the childcare regulations dictate a 1:12 adult to child ratio for the same age group in out of school care programs.
- 6. We currently have 14 portables on the playing field at Dunsmuir Middle School (population over 850 students grades 6-8). We currently have 5 portables at Wishart Elementary. Every single school in our District (Sooke 62) has at least 1-5 portables on their property. We are in an earthquake zone. Where will we house these students in an emergency situation? Are the gyms now over fire capacity during assemblies? Do we have enough toilets present to meet the student population? Where are the kids playing during the break times if their playing fields are covered in portables? What about parking availability for the staff and parents, are we becoming neighbourhood nuisances due to the lack of parking available? Our children deserve to be in properly constructed school facilities that our taxes in good faith go towards.





Everyone brought a small wrapped gift to the party. The game began with everyone picking a gift and sitting with the gift in a circle. The gift is not to be opened.


Starting with the oldest, they roll a dice and follow the rules, for more information on these rules contact Betty Bartlett at the Provincial Office.


Nor' Pioneer WI would like to wish everyone a very Happy New year, hope that you all have a wonderful 2020.




## 100 Years Salt Spring Island WI

On April 9th, 1920 a group of women met to plan and organize and sign a Certificate of Incorporation to begin the South Salt Spring Women's Institute. An organizational meeting was held on April 28, 1920 for the purpose of forming an institute and to choose provisional directors. A mem-

bership fee of \$0.50 per annum was proposed. The purpose was for the betterment of the district. The head office was the Burgoyne Bay School House (our current member Sharon Hawke lives in the same, renovated house).

The Inaugural meeting was held on May 18th, 1920 with Mrs. S.W. Raven, from Victoria and representing the De-



partment of Agriculture, taking the chair. After going over the aims and objects of the WI the list of members was read, officers were officially elected by motion.

Mrs. Raven spoke on the Institute work and Mr. Raven gave a talk on the Farmer's Institute and on Poultry. Now we are preparing to celebrate 100 continuous years of WI women on Salt Spring Island and the significant impact they have had on the community.
