### From the Executive Director



Alberta has a new Minister of Culture and Community Services - Heather Klimchuk. She was appointed in October by Alberta's new Premier Alison Redford. Opinion throughout the arts sector is that both the new pre-

mier and the new minister will be more arts friendly and better informed about the culture sector than their predecessors.

Minister Klimchuk attended the Alberta Craft Council's annual 'Twas the Night on November 25. I took her on a short tour of the Craft Council and introduced her around. She did some Christmas shopping. And we agreed to meet more formally soon.

Although the Craft Council is Alberta's largest Provincial Arts Service Organization (PASO) and Edmonton's second largest art gallery, and despite multiple invitations to other ministers over the years, Ms. Klimchuk is the first culture minister to attend a Craft Council event in a decade! Indeed, she explained that as soon as she was appointed to her new position, she created a select list of arts organizations to visit, and the Craft Council was one of these.

I'm looking forward to my next meeting with Ms. Klimchuk. As soon as the opportunity arises, I will bring up several issues with her:

The lottery revenue traditionally allocated to the Alberta Foundation for the Arts has been cut by 16% for the past two years, for a total loss to the arts sector of about \$11 million dollars. This needs to be restored, quickly. This should be done just as Premier Redford, soon after she was elected, dramatically restored \$100 million to education funding. As you have read in this column in the past, \$11 million is the cost of a highway overpass, but it's a tiny investment with huge payback for Alberta's arts sector and for Alberta's overall creative edge.

I would also like to talk to the minister about Alberta developing a real and useful cultural policy that includes initiatives such as repairing arts education in schools, properly funding institutions such as Alberta College of Art + Design, incorporating more arts programs into hospitals and social services, featuring more of the arts in tourism development and promotion, creating viable export schemes for the arts sector and artists, profiling Alberta's

artists in more projects such as Alberta at the Smithsonian or the Cultural Olympiad, improving arts infrastructure, assisting smaller grass-roots arts ventures... and planning for a stable and prosperous arts future.

I would also like to encourage the minister and her government to think and act more comprehensively with federal and municipal governments on arts issues:

The federal government has been cutting cultural programs steadily for years. (In 2008 it was the complete shut-down of the National Portrait Gallery which both Edmonton and Calgary were competing to build. In 2009, \$40 million was cut from about a dozen programs including all diplomatic and export activity for the arts. In 2010 it was another complete shut-down, this time of Edmonton's exciting bid for the 2017 world fair. And in 2011, it has been the nasty public squabble between MPs and MLAs over federal funding for the on and off Royal Alberta Museum.) Our culture minister needs to defend the province's interests in the arts just as other ministers defend or promote Alberta's interests in health, energy, transportation, education and other federalprovincial issues.

Our new minister also needs to learn from and encourage the efforts of Calgary, Edmonton, and other Alberta cities that have been investing in their arts policies, arts councils and important arts projects, often despite declining support from both the provincial and federal governments. Ms. Klimchuk has a challenge, but also an opportunity, to encourage the premier and all her government colleagues to join in the enthusiastic arts support that we see from Mayor Mandel in Edmonton, Mayor Nenshi in Calgary, Mayor Flewwelling in Red Deer, and others. And, for instance, our new minister and her colleagues need to copy the example of Edmonton's city council which regularly votes enthusiastically to increase arts funding in the capital.

I like Heather Klimchuk. I think she has promise. I think she and the new premier might both be really good for the arts in Alberta. Let's hope. Let's also work toward that. So, Happy New Year to them, and Happy New Year to the arts!



I am so happy that Illya was able to come to Canada and through his own intelligence, energy and talent was able to build his equipment, and practice his craft. Sometimes you have to look back before you can see clearly.

The well-known and popular Series – summer school of the visual arts - has been at Red Deer College for 35 years and has been providing summer workshops for art and craft enthusiasts. Developed by Alberta Culture with funding support from the Alberta Foundation for the Arts at the forestry school in Hinton, this grass roots community program found its way to Red Deer College when it outgrew its ability to travel to various locations. In its glory years, Red Deer College was abuzz with almost 1,000 participants from around the world.

Over the past few years, enrolments have declined and Red Deer College has taken a moment to reflect on how we can renew the program, reconnect with our supporters and rediscover our roots. Our first step was to figure out why people come to Series by being clear about what we do well. We offer great workshops with great instructors, in brand new studios and with enthusiastic participants. But we lost sight of the importance of connecting with people who share our love of art making and creativity.

To reinvigorate the program, we have, most importantly, recognized the current economic times and tightened our belts. The quality of instruction will still be exceptional but you'll notice the workshop fees will be lower, to make Series more accessible. Thanks to instructor art donations we have \$4,200 in scholarships available to deserving participants. We encourage you to apply – no experience is necessary.

Applications are available at www.rdc.ab.ca/future\_student/awards and the deadline is March 15th, 2012.

We're aiming to reach potential students using a more modest brochure while providing further information on our website and Facebook page. We also encourage our supporters to spread the word – Series 2012, Summer Art & Fine Craft Workshops, July 9 – August 3, 2012

If you haven't been to Series before, it's a great experience - workshops run from 9 am – 4 pm Monday – Friday and for the real enthusiast the studios are open daily until 10 pm. For those looking for an all-round experience there will be a social gathering after class every day - including one sponsored by the Alberta Craft Council. Additionally, the Red Deer and District Museum has invited us to some very exciting exhibitions. Every week Red Deer College's own filmmaker Larry Reese's thought provoking documentary entitled Mapping Creativity will be shown. The Monday evening instructor presentations showcasing their art or craft are always a highlight. Back by popular demand will be our Open Model sessions which are free for all Series participants. You can do all of this by staying right on campus. We're working hard to renew, reconnect and re-grow. See you in the summer.





## THINKING BIG

A group exhibition unveiling public art projects January 14 – April 7, 2012

Opening Reception: Saturday, January 14 from 2-4pm

Public art can foster civic pride, enhance a community's image, express cultural identity, commemorate events and people, and encourage artistic innovation. Alberta Craft Council members are increasingly active in public art projects – submitting proposals to major competitions, winning prominent commissions, exploring new creative and technical territory, and attracting public, business, political and media attention.

Developing a public art project from concept to final unveiling, can be an elaborate, complicated, sometimes frustrating, and potentially rewarding process, for the artist(s), for the owner or sponsor, as well as for community groups or the general public. Competition for public art projects can be stiff. Juries, whatever their decision, inevitably disappoint most of the competing artists. Each successful project needs to be brilliant, feasible, buildable, on budget, on schedule, safe, durable and acceptable to a jury. Each project also needs to reflect, inform or engage its audience, satisfy its supporters and funders, and appease its detractors whether art critics or irate taxpayers. Each project can generate public and media attention which can range from supportive to indignant.

For an individual artist, developing a public art project can be a time-consuming process requiring a delicate balance between creative vision and attending to the competition process and issues such as budget parameters, timelines, site conditions, production processes,

cost control, technical and structural concerns, cooperative suppliers or fabricators, potential set-backs or delays, conservation matters, and general administration including everything from meeting minutes and process documentation to contracts and liability insurance.

So why do artists subject themselves to such risk and rigor? Artistic exploration is probably the paramount motivation. But, sense of accomplishment, career growth, peer recognition, media and public attention, and money all factor into the decision to enter a competition.

What is the story behind some of these public art projects - these new "monuments"? How do they happen? How are the imagined, built, funded, maintained? Thinking Big uses sketches, technical drawings, models, material tests, photo and video documentation, artists' journals, and media coverage, to explore the creative energy, technical expertise, and hard work involved in public art projects.

First let me say, making a living as an artist doing nothing else but what you create is one of the toughest career choices there is. Focusing on Public art really does put you out there on the thin branches.

The challenges are many, you have to please the client and you have to satisfy your own artistic integrity. The public artist has to learn to price their work, to know about all the technical aspects for each commission, create time lines and meet deadlines. Negotiate the business and find the essence of the commission that leads to design, execution, production and finally, installation...it takes a good work ethic, it is exciting and it is worth it.

All public art commissions begin with an idea. Before anything is even physically made, hours and hours of time are put into planning, thinking, and dreaming about the work. A jury deliberates over the submitted proposals in order to select ONE artwork. This means of course, that there are many artists who have put hours into their proposals, who do not have the opportunity to create their work. As a professional artist, I have also spent many hours dreaming up projects that do not get selected and do not get completed. This is part of the process, but all that hard work makes unveiling a finished work even more exciting. Claire Uhlick

### What's a Girl to Do

Felted hats by Edmonton fibre artist Virginia Stephen February 18 – March 24, 2012 Opening Reception: Saturday, Feb. 18, 2012, 2 – 4 pm



Fibre artist, Virginia Stephen, explores a variety of life issues she faces through hand felted hats in her exhibition What's a Girl to Do. The inspiration for Virginia's exhibition began with a felted hat,"What's a Girl to Do?? - Less is Less" created for the 2011 Alberta Craft Council In the Red group exhibition. By being 16% too small it comments on the effects of cut backs in government on arts organizations and artists. Virginia's exhibition of hand felted hats, designed not to be worn on the head but to explore many of those life issues that affect the headspace of this artist. It is, in a way, a memoir of recent circumstances, explored with drama and humour and by pushing the structural potential of felt as a sculptural medium. Individual themes include issues of balance, work stress, keeping the magic, dealing with weather, keeping up appearances, and the relationships between 'less' and 'more'. Underlying the work is the notion that it is 'ok' to laugh at ourselves

and our circumstances, and it is also 'ok' to laugh in a gallery, with or at the art. Virginia Stephen holds an MA in Visual and Performing Arts Education and undergraduate degrees in both art history and arts education. Currently Executive Director of Liberal Studies, Faculty of Extension at the University of Alberta, Virginia brings to her practice over 25 years of experience as an arts educator, museum educator, senior arts administrator and consultant. She has completed a term as Acting Director of the Arts and Cultural Management Program at MacEwan University where she taught Museum/Gallery Management, Human Resources and Advocacy for several years. She was Deputy Director (Head of Programs and curator of Education) of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia and Executive Director of the Edmonton Art Gallery.

As an educator, artist, writer and curator her focus has been to facilitate individual and group interaction with art to enrich ways of knowing, ways of interacting with the world and other people, and ways to achieve innovation with students, adults, and corporate groups. She has worked and presented across Canada and been a guest speaker at education, museum, healthcare, and leadership conferences and symposia in the United States and Europe. She has written exhibition catalogues and books for museum audiences of all ages and contributed to arts education and museum periodicals, anthologies and peer reviewed journals in Canada and the United States.



Keith Turnbull graduated with a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Alberta in 1966 and continued on to receive a Bachelor of Library Sciences in 1969. Keith began his art education in 1992 by attending courses in sculpture at the University of Alberta's Extension Department and later at the Edmonton City Arts Centre, Harcourt House Arts Centre and the Sculptors' Association of Alberta. He is active in the Edmonton

Arts community, sitting at various times on the boards of Fringe Theatre Adventures and the Edmonton Arts Council (past chair). He is currently vice president of Harcourt House Arts Centre and sits on the executive of the Sculptors' Association of Alberta. He has curated art shows, teaches figurative sculpture, has participated in many group sculpture exhibits in Edmonton, and is represented in private collections across Canada and the US. Most recently Keith was involved with the Homelessness Memorial in Downtown Edmonton, a tribute to the lives of people who are often invisible and forgotten.

Speaking of his art, Keith states that "my goal is to create figurative sculptures that portray people in all their diversity". Keith believes that our real heroes are not those that receive riches and awards, but those who modestly work, raise children, create art, share their knowledge and continue the struggle for a human society on the surface of our beautiful planet. He especially likes to work from live models who are representative of the diversity of the population, and who themselves are interesting people who enjoy the creative atmosphere of the sculpture studio. The models in his exhibition Women are those who have sat for drop-in sculpture sessions at Harcourt House over the past few years. These models, and the resultant sculptures, represent a wide range of body types, ethnicities and ages to show the true beauty of women Keith wishes to express.





### **Knitting Workshop with Margie Davidson**

Picture seven of Edmonton's most shady characters, meeting in the dark of night, concealing from the world their addiction to needles. All the while, they scratch their arms and sniffle, their skin and noses irritated by the stuff as they satisfy their collective habit. Shamelessly, one participant admits that she can't remember if she's done this before and is surprised when muscle memory kicks in and guides the needles for her. Four are seasoned with the needle (even if one can't remember how) and three are newly initiated... all are excited to take the end results of their addiction to the cold streets of downtown Edmonton.

Yes, knitting can certainly be a subversive experience - with the right teacher!

Fibre artist and instructor, Margie Davidson led the third in a series of workshops for ACC staff wanting to expand their knowledge - this time, in the fibre arts. Armed with knitting needles, skeins of yarn and endless patience, Margie has been showing us the ways of the wool: the difference between British and Continental techniques, casting on and off, knitting and purling, blocking a sample, and basic measurement techniques. The end result? Seven long and cozy scarves!

Margie suggests that this need only be the beginning of a knitting addiction which can be as traditional as your grandmother's tea cozy or as unconventional as graffiti. It has become well documented that "yarn-bombing" - a type of knitted graffiti - has begun to incite edgy knitters, encouraging them to share their work with the world. An alternative to spray paint and stencils, yarn-bombers "decorate" public property, like park benches, traffic posts, girders, meters and boulevard trees to name only a few. Although less threatening than the permanence of traditional graffiti mediums, a yarn-bomb is equally difficult to miss. Well before I knew what a yarn-bomb was, I was baffled by

one I came across on the east side of Edmonton. On the shoulder of a busy artery, flanking the valley I found a steel girder encased in a knitted envelope. It was sweetly subversive!

Now armed with new technical skills, and an ever expanding appreciation for the vast applications of the fibre medium in both traditional and unconventional culture, our group plans to continue knitting. And maybe, (just maybe) we'll partake in the delinquent cladding of parking meters or construction fences in hopes of adding a touch of warmth and colour to an otherwise frosty Edmonton winter.

And as for our motley group of knitters... Annette, Laura, Jessica, Elaine, Nancy and I would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to Margie for taking time away from her own knitting (she is preparing for an exhibition in the ACC Feature Gallery scheduled for October) to teach us basic techniques and a newly-spun appreciation for this medium.

The ACC staff is always excited to expand our knowledge for the techniques represented by our consignment artists. Any member interested in providing a brief workshop to the ACC Staff can contact Linda (linda@albertacraft. ab.ca) to discuss possibilities.

## Graduates bring life back to the Potteries

### Potteries design students, in collaboration with local industry, are reinventing a classic British brand

It is a long-standing tradition in Stoke-on-Trent known as the turnover test. Someone will flip over a (hopefully empty) cup, mug, plate or saucer to find out from the printed "backstamp" on the bottom which company made it, and where.

But in this part of north Staffordshire – where the famed pottery industry is now a shadow of its former self – the once-familiar Stoke-on-Trent provenance has been dying out as factories have been mothballed and production shipped abroad.

Now, a ground-breaking commercial collaboration between postgraduate design students at Staffordshire University and local industry has led to Stoke-on-Trent once again appearing on a new range of bone chinaware. The students have not only benefited from the kudos of helping to design it, but stand to receive a 4% royalty on sales and the chance to get involved in the commercial side of the venture.

The new brand is called Flux and its contemporary "mix and match" style reflects the current trend for affordable "chic informality" in home dining, which has replaced the full dinner service culture of past decades. Think spots, stripes, flowers and even buildings and giant letters in different typefaces with names like "Splat", "Geometrix" and "Zoo". The designs are deliberately complementary and intriguingly interchangeable

The project was set up last year within the university's Faculty

of Arts, Media and Design by Professor David Sanderson, director of its MA ceramic design course, with £20,000 funding from the Higher Education Funding Council's Innovation Fund.

The idea is simple – plain white bone china already made in Stoke-on-Trent is decorated with the 12 designs in the range. Sales – and 96% are to export markets – have been mainly through international trade fairs. Buyers from China, Hong Kong, Venezuela and Russia have snapped up the designs, with the "bling factor" of the cobalt and gold combination particularly popular.

Production costs have been kept down by using basic, simple shapes already being manufactured, and a move into matching glassware, using stencils of the same designs, is possible.

Students have benefited from the chance to sell their work internationally and get experience of sales and marketing at a time when factory closures mean there are limited opportunities to get hands-on experience at local level.

MA ceramic design graduate Sarah Callard, from Leeds, and Jenna Stanton, a current student from Edmonton, Canada – both designers for Flux – spent a week at the "Maison et Objet" trade fair in Paris, working on the Flux stall. Callard says Flux has given her an understanding of what it's like to work in industry: "We were involved in setting up the stand and the sales side, so it gave me the ability and confidence to talk to professional people about our brand and, of course, my own work."

The project is still on a relatively small scale but the staff and students are genuinely surprised at the huge amount of interest. The ware is not cheap – dinner plates retail at about £32 – but Flux has the capacity to produce single pieces to small batch and volume manufacture.

Sanderson says: "We're adding substantial value to 'blank' bone china ceramic products manufactured here in Stoke-on-Trent, by adding our designs, and selling them worldwide. The contemporary global market for high value tabletop products with the provenance of 'Made in England' is massive."

Stanton admits she was upset when she first arrived in Stoke to find the gates of the famous Spode factory chained up, after it went into administration in 2008. Flux was officially launched in the empty factory earlier this autumn, as part of the city's six-week British Ceramics Biennial.

Her pattern, Willow Blues – a play on words featuring a bird in a gilded cage – was a reflection of that sadness, she explains. Happily for her, it is also the most popular in the entire range.

Women of Fibre features a broad selection of the weaving of Mary Garnham Andrews, 95-year-old Banff artist and Master Weaver. While Mary's work anchors the exhibition in the tradition of weaving, the contemporary works of Articulation, an eclectic group of fibre artists, illustrates the ongoing vibrancy of fibre arts across Canada. The works of Articulation are inspired by the Whyte Museum's collection. The members of Articulation featured are: Donna Clement (Calgary), Gloria Daly (Duncan, BC), Ingrid Lincoln (Winnipeg), Vickie Newington (Calgary), Lesley Turner (Victoria) and Wendy Klotz (Calgary).

Mary Garnham Andrews (Banff) has been has been weaving for over 50 years and during that time has participated in weaving programs all over Canada. In 1962, she came to Banff and taught for fifteen years at the Banff School of Fine Arts (now The Banff Centre). Mary obtained her Master Weaver Certificate in 1975 and for many years she served as examiner on Master's tests for the Canadian Guild of Weavers.



Articulation (formed in 2004) is a group of nine women from across Canada whose focus is to use textiles in an expressive, contemporary fashion. In 2008, members of Articulation visited the Whyte Museum of the Canadian Rockies and researched the museum's collection with the goal of creating new works of textile art. In 2009, members of the group spent time in residence at The Banff Centre's Leighton Artists' Colony, each working on new pieces informed and inspired by what they had seen at the Whyte Museum.




