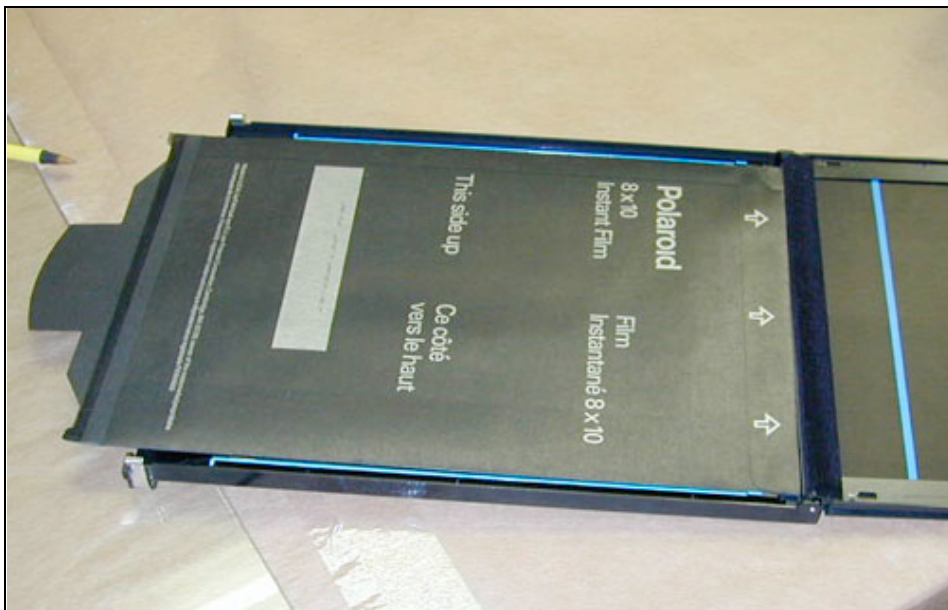


How To Load the Polaroid 81-05 8x10 Film Holder



Open the film holder,
position your negative so
"This side up" is up.



**Make sure your negative
stays between the blue
lines!**

Otherwise it will tear and
jam when you load it into the
processor.



This is tricky: Make sure the red tab slips under the top lip of the negative sleeve as shown, but **BE VERY CAREFUL**, as it is easy at this point to misalign the negative sleeve from between the blue lines as stated above, and it can also be easy to accidentally cause the sleeve to slip open and expose the negative.



After you have properly inserted the negative sleeve, close the film holder. You will notice that the negative sleeve partially sticks out the bottom of the film holder and you must now pull it away from the holder (use both hands, pulling from each side evenly) until it is completely removed.

(Shown to the left is the negative sleeve pulled out about a 1/3 of the way.)

You are now ready to make a picture.



After making your exposure, insert the positive on the other side of the film holder, white side in, grey side out. Be careful handling the positive as it can scratch very easily.



Very important: Slide the positive all the way down and as you are doing this, the tab on the negative that sticks out of the top of the holder **needs to be inserted into the white slotted top** of the positive as shown in the bottom left picture.

You also need to make sure the top of the positive does not hang over the edge of the front of the film holder. Also, when inserting the positive, be careful not to touch the chemical pods.

You are now ready to develop the picture in the processor!





Using the 81-05 film holder can be a little tricky until you get used to it, but the basic principal is easy to understand. The positive and negative slide into two different slots on the film holder and are interlocked by the top tabs so that they are simultaneously pulled into the processor for development.
