or


NUH-PEA

"GEEZ ... who does that Rock think he is, anyways? ... I am the mighty Napi N-A-P-I ... dumb Rock should know better than to m-- ... wait, hold up ... what's that incredibly loud rumbling rock sound?", Napi mutters to himself.

"I have never known someone to take something back from a Rock!", screams The Rock, "You should know better!"

The setting for NAPI & The Rock is Southern Alberta,
Canada and Northern Montana, USA

Known collectively as the Blackfoot Confederacy -there are four distinct bands (groups): the Siksika
(near Calgary, Alberta), the Kainai (near Lethbridge,
Alberta), the northern Piikani (near Pincher Creek,
Alberta) and the southern Pikuni (Browning, Montana)

NAPI & The Rock also tells the story of how the random massive rock formations, that you'll find scattered throughout the prairies, came to be.

You can actually visit the site of NAPI & The Rock—there's even an info display and remnants of The Rock. Blackfoot people call it "Okotok" (big rock), but, it's formally known as the "Okotoks Erratics". A short drive west of Okotoks, Alberta and you'll find it.


