February Tips

March Tips

In our March reading, we can note an interesting pattern giving us more clues and insight to our studies. Notice the indentation found in Deuteronomy 32, 33, Judges 5, 14 and 1 Samuel 2. The author is using a writing style change to convey importance in the words and meaning of the text. This can be compared to watching musical theater where the cast bursts into song at what seems a random point in the show. This song in the musical is another way of showing the audience the importance of the information being conveyed. It is strategically put there to evoke passion and great feeling for the bigger picture of the story. The Bible is no different. As Eugene Peterson says: "To understand the Bible is to understand poetry."

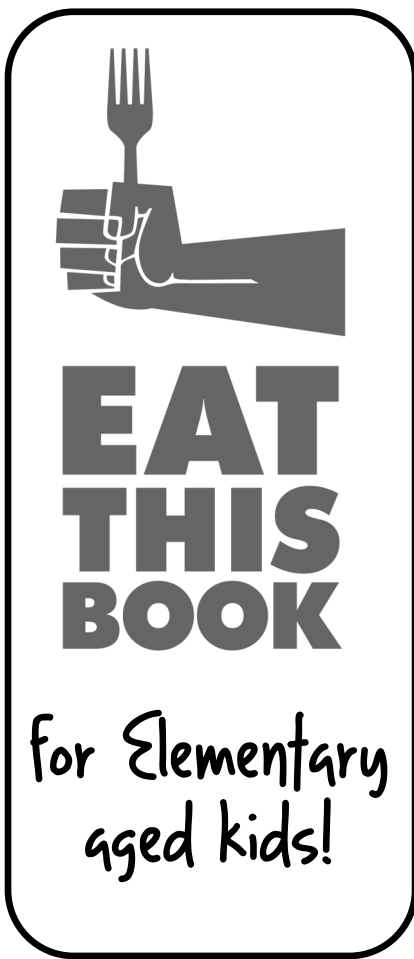

We hope you are enjoying the Eat This Book for Elementary Kids. Feeling behind? Don't worry! We have all the past month's readings available at the entrance to the K1 room and online at blackhawkchurch.org/eatthisbook. Remember, **the goal is not to read every word, but to develop the habit of reading the Bible each day.**

PAYING ATTENTION

This month pay close attention to the images we are given in the text. Did you ever notice how rarely we get a physical description of people in the Bible? Descriptions of people are only included when they are important to the story. We are also given very elaborate explanations of the Temple. These accounts are detailed, almost like building plans. Solomon intended this Temple to mirror the Garden of Eden. While you read, look for the images of people and the Temple that we are given by the authors. Here are some questions and ideas for how to use these descriptions this month.

- Look for the physical images of people as you read. Draw pictures of the explanations you find.
- How did knowing the physical description help you understand the story?
- What stories have we already read that give you details to draw more pictures?
- Where do you see descriptions of the Temple that reminds you of the Garden of Eden? Can you draw a picture of what you think the Temple looked like given the imagery from the text?

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God is **Wise**, in **Control** and can be **Trusted!**



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1. **Job** teaches us that God is wise, in control, and we can trust Him to be just. As the reader, we learn right away that Job didn't do anything to deserve his struggles. Job trusted God even when he lost everything. Job's life stands as an example for anyone who is suffering.
2. **Proverbs** is like watching "Sesame Street". Like the show, the book of Proverbs teaches the same theme over and over. The theme? Get wisdom! Proverbs teaches us that God is pleased when we are godly, moral, hardworking and use wisdom. The book was meant to be read as a whole to gain practical advice for daily living. When reading, try to not take your favorite verses out of context from the rest of the book.
3. **Ecclesiastes** is one of the hardest books in the Bible to read. It teaches us that we cannot expect to understand the meaning of life for ourselves. The good in life is a gift from God but we should expect adversity, too. But we can trust that God is in control and He is wise. We cannot have a truly happy life without God.
4. **Isaiah** was a prophet who is quoted in the New Testament more than all the other prophets combined. God revealed Himself as He spoke through Isaiah. Many of Isaiah's prophecies pointed to Jesus: his birth, name, ministry, death, the cross, resurrection, and as eternal ruler! Isaiah taught that God is more powerful than great empires and armies, and we can trust Him and have confidence in His plan!
5. **Don't forget!** Eat This Book is not about reading ALL of the Bible, it is about getting in the Word every day. Enjoy!

Dig In

Many Bibles have sidebars and extra information scattered through out the text. These are clues to help you learn more about the time and culture of the stories you are reading. As you read, check out the side notes in your Bible, keeping an eye out for historical information about the Prophets.

Challenge yourself by looking at a few different Bibles to see how much information you can gather about the time when Isaiah and Jeremiah lived.

Looking at other versions can give you a better understanding of the stories by hearing them in different words. Do you find a certain passage difficult to understand? Try looking it up in The Message to see if it makes more sense to you. Multiple versions can be a big help in understanding what the Bible says.

What is a Prophet?

Good question! Prophets were called by God to speak for Him. They would hear God’s message and tell other people. Oftentimes, they brought bad news. This was hard for the people to hear.

Questions to ask yourself as you read....

What is the message each prophet is receiving from God?
How are the prophets showing God’s message to the Israelites?

How do you think you would have responded to the prophets?
What do you think a prophet look like in our society today?
Who was your favorite prophet to read and why?

Did you know?

The Bible divides the prophets into two categories, Major and Minor Prophets. Both are equally important because every prophet was inspired by God and used by Him in a significant way. The only reason they are labeled Major or Minor is due to historical significance of the events of their time as well as the length of their book in the Bible.

We're Moving . . . Into the New Testament!



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The Bible is divided into two big sections: the Old Testament and the New Testament. The word testament means covenant or agreement. In the Bible, the agreement is between a loving God and His children. We need the Old Testament to fully understand the New Testament. It gives us background and knowledge so the New Testament can make sense.

Old Testament

God made a covenant with His chosen people, the Israelites, to bless the world through them. It was written in Hebrew, the language of the people of Israel. The Old Testament gives us the law, the Ten Commandments, genealogy, history, psalms and wisdom. There are also prophecies telling us of the coming of Christ.

New Testament

In the New Testament, God lives up to His promise through His son, Jesus. The New Testament begins with a list of names. This is Jesus' Family Tree. Even though it is not very interesting to read, it shows how Jesus is connected to what we read in the Old Testament. We learn that we are not able to follow the rules perfectly. Jesus was God's gift to those of us who trust that Jesus was the son of God and that He died for our sins.

THE GOSPELS

The first four books of the New Testament are called the Gospels. And here's something you might not know—*Gospel* means "Good News." Do you know what the good news is in the New Testament? If you guessed Jesus you are correct!

All four Gospels tell about the life of Jesus. They include the story of His death and resurrection too. The writers of the Gospels were Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Each of the four writers tried to reach a different audience, so each book contains slightly different details. Matthew wrote mostly to the Jews, Mark wrote to the Christians in Rome, Luke tried to reach the Gentile Christians and John wrote to new Christians. But God inspired all four Gospel writers and what they wrote long ago was written for us, too.

The order of the Gospels in the Bible is Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The writers of Eat This Book are having us read John before Luke. Wondering why? This is because the first book after the Gospels is Acts. Acts was also written by Luke and reading these two books together create a better flow for the reader.

Who was Paul?

After Jesus died and rose from the dead, the followers of Jesus had their work cut out for them. This month we learn about Paul. Paul went from someone who hated anyone who loved Jesus to Jesus' biggest fan. Much of the New Testament is letters Paul wrote to different cities that he had visited. In these letters Paul preached about grace and God's love for us.

Preaching the love of Christ was not an easy task on many levels.

1. In those days traveling was difficult. There were no airplanes and the maps were very poor compared to what we use. For Paul to travel as much as he did was quite a feat. For example, you could compare Paul traveling from Jerusalem to Rome as risky as an astronaut going to the moon. Rome was at the end of the earth to them!
2. Paul was preaching the Good News about Jesus. Not everyone thought this was good news. The political leaders were threatened by the Son of God. If Jesus was God's son, how could they reign?
3. Paul was shipwrecked three times and thrown into prison. None of these situations were ideal for preaching God's Word.

None of this stopped Paul from serving God. He was determined to be God's servant and spread grace to all he met.

Reading the mail...

Do you love getting a letter in the mail? Most people do! Back when most of the Biblical letters were sent, the entire town would gather to hear them being read in an open theater. Those who gathered would be sitting next to family, friends and neighbors. It was very different than when we grab a letter out of the mailbox and read it in our kitchen!

When we read the November selections, we are reading personal mail from the apostle Paul. He wrote to the places he visited while spreading the Word of God, encouraging them through their challenges as Christ followers. Corinth especially was known for being wild and crazy and Paul took them on with "weakness and fear, and with much trembling." (1Cor 2:3) His letters to the Corinthians and the other people he had visited were calling them out on their bad decisions and encouraging them to stay on the right path.

Here are some questions to ask yourself as you read:

1. Imagine you were in the theater listening to these letters from Paul. How would you feel? Encouraged? Embarrassed? Both?
2. These letters sometimes were calling people out on their mistakes. How would you like to hear that in the middle of a group of people you knew?
3. What are your favorite verses from these readings?

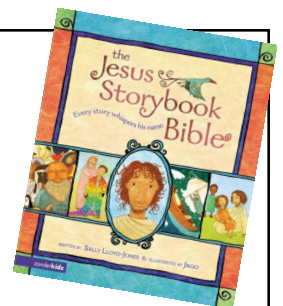

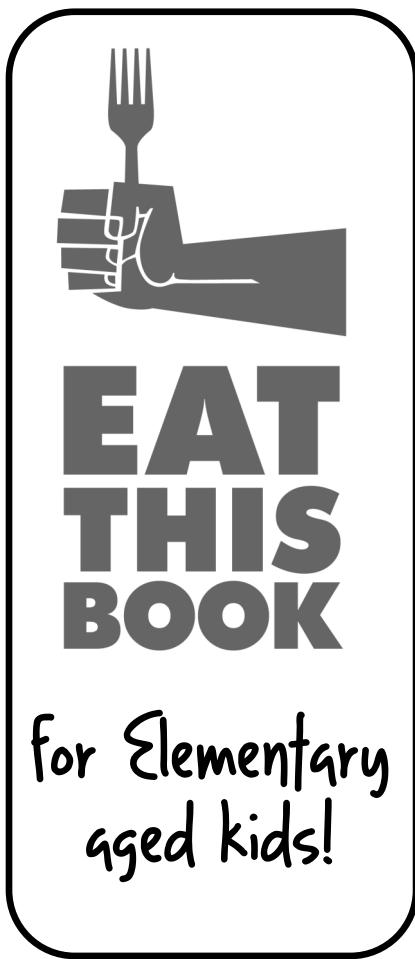

December's Reading

The books James through Jude are called the General Letters. We call them the General Letters because unlike the letters Paul wrote, they were written for everyone, not just people living in a certain area. (Note: 2 and 3 John are an exception to this rule) These letters were written to remind people how God wanted them to live and how to deal with people who weren't speaking the truth. Their purpose is to warn the Christ followers that there were people saying they were followers, but really were not. These letters helped the followers of Jesus to stay strong in their belief in Jesus and not be tricked by the people who didn't agree with them. The letters were promising that God would return to earth bringing justice once and for all. The book of Revelation wraps this all up and gives us the hope of Christ's return.

Questions to ask yourself as you read

1. How can you tell if someone is telling you the truth?
2. Is there a line you read that could help you keep your faith on track? Write it down and put it somewhere you will see it often.
3. When everything is made right by God will there be bullying? Sickness? What will it look like?
