Basically, brushing your teeth is a lot like practicing your faith.

So why then is it expected of parents to teach their children how to brush their teach, but it is up to the child to decide if they will practice their faith.

As a parent, don't you nag, discipline, and ultimately teach your children how to brush their teeth. Why do we find it so offensive to do the same when it comes to faith. Is it because our parents were so religiously oppressive to us and

we do not want to be that way to our children. But for some reason, whether your parents taught you or not, you will probably brush your teeth at least once today.

Deuteronomy 6:6-9

6 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. 7 You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. 8 You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. 9 You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.

The Lord is pretty clear about what parents are to be doing for their children.

Yeah but how?

Well, how do you brush your teeth? How does fluoride work? What is the purpose of tooth paste?

You do not have to be an expert to teach your children the faith. Simply practicing it is enough. This includes family devotions, meal time prayer, and yes going to worship. More importantly, it means being an example...the most difficult of task of them all. However, when you fail, be the example that seeks forgiveness and that will teach them more than you could ever teach in anything else.

Carbon Monoxide Prevention For Everyone

Carbon monoxide is sometimes called the "silent killer", it is a gas that you cannot see, taste or smell. Children process carbon monoxide differently than adults, and may be more severely affected by it.

In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

Install a carbon monoxide alarm on every level of your home, especially near sleeping areas.

A carbon monoxide detector is not a substitute for a smoke alarm, but combination units are an option.

Don't use a grill, generator or camping stove inside your home, garage or near an open window.

Don't leave a car, SUV or motorcycle engine running inside a garage.


the Mayflower. They will be thinking about all they are thankful for. The class would like to wish everyone God's richest blessings this Thanksgiving!

First graders are working hard and having fun. During this fall season they have been busy making scarecrows and learning about the life cycle of a pumpkin. They also learned about predictions as they tried



to solve the case of "The Candy Corn Bandit". The Candy Corn Bandit came to our room and stole our candy corn while we were at the library. The first graders then tried to predict how the bandit looked, how he got into the school, why he took the candy,

2nd Grade -

4th Grade -

can People and also with our family heritage projects that are due November 1. In science, the class is studying insects. Multiplication and division facts are the topic in math. Students should be practicing their facts daily. The students are learning about verbs and how to use them in English.

The fifth graders were blessed to be able to be part of Health Jam. This is a two day field trip organized by the 4-H extension office. The first day the fifth graders were at Lutheran Outdoor Ministries Camp in Oregon. They participated in many les-



sons covering the topics of health and fitness, dentistry, the heart, hand washing, nursing, diabetes, and the immune system. The second day they were able to tour the KSB hospital in Dixon. They got to see the lab, imaging, physical therapy, dietary, and emergency medical services. The goal was to teach them ways turn to God for help and He is always there to help. The students participated in a simulation to experience what is like to be an explorer during the time of Columbus. The students have also started making cards for Veterans Day.

6th Grade -

October has flown by for sixth grade. The sixth graders have been busy working with fractions and decimals in math, verbs in English, and earthquakes in science. They have become experts on their 19 linking verbs. They are able to diagram the subject,



verb, and compliments of a sentence now. In math, they have begun reviewing comparing, adding, subtracting, and multiplying fractions. In reading, they have been studying fiction and nonfiction stories that explain the questions of What Really Happened? They have been developing their inferring skills based off of evidence from the stories. In science, the sixth graders have learned about tectonic plates and the natural processes that come about because of the movement of tectonic plates like earthquakes. In P.E., the sixth graders are playing volleyball. The class has been split into teams of two and are competing in a round robin tournament. In history, the students did incredibly well on their unit on Sumeria. They learned a lot, and are moving on to Egypt. Students will be writing booklets on mummies and pyramids in November.

7th Grade -

Seventh graders are busy learning all about animals. They have been looking at common characteristics of all animals. In Math, the 7th graders are learning about rational numbers. They are comparing and ordering the fractions. They are also able to convert from fraction to decimal and decimal to



fraction. The flipped classroom is working well. The students are working hard. Both 7th and 8th grade math students are also spending time on Khan Academy. This website helps build upon their knowledge of the math concepts they are working on in class.: In history, Students enjoyed making explorer videos and showing them to the class. Problem Solving Preschoolers

One of my preschoolers came to that had a page ripped. "Look what someone did to our book ." she told me. "That is bad. Now we have to throw it away!" Seeing a teachable moment I asked, "Maybe we can find a way to fix this book. What do you think we could do to fix it?" Immediately. the children began to offer ways

and possibilities for saving the book. They asked for tape, they hunted down glue sticks and soon the book was repaired and back on the shelf.

babies are having an impact on their environment. Infants bat neighbor, the dad. When multiple children want to be the at things to make them move. A toddler navigates along the furniture to get from one side of the room to another. A preschooler will try all kinds of ways to reach the pedals on the tricycle to move it by himself. Children create ideas for stuff you could never imagine. Children explore the world with a curiosity that generates thinking and understanding, one issue at a time. Problem solving skills encompass all areas of development; emotional, social, cognitive, physical and crea-

Problem solving skills are important for a variety of reasons. Everyday adults and children must solve problems. When children develop an "I can" attitude early in life, they discover they can figure things out and they develop confidence in their own abilities. Additionally, problem solving skills are important for future learning in science, math, social studies and multitudes of other areas. When you support children solving their own problems at a young age, you are promoting the development of problem-solving skills.

How can parents support development of problem solving

Step back and watch—It may indeed be easier to jump in and help or show your child the right way to do something, but stepping in too early can stifle thinking. Instead of intervening right away, give your child some time to let ideas percolate. Let your child manipulate the puzzle pieces until he gets in where it belongs.

Acknowledge the efforts—Try to be patient while you encourage your child to try new ways and look at problems from new perspectives. Offer verbal support. "You are really working hard to get that piece in the puzzle. I see you are trying many different ways to make it fit." Sometimes nonverbal support, a smile, a pat on the back, or a thumb's up signal

will encourage a child to continue and not give up.

me a few weeks back with a book Create environments where children feel free to express their ideas without fear of being wrong or of not being taken seriously—In preschool, we make lots of lists about things. When children offer ideas, all are supported, non are refused. You accept every idea and let further exploration determine if it will be successful or not. Use open-ended questions to get children thinking. "What would happen if children went to school at night instead of in the day?"

Give children opportunities for open ended play activities—Create opportunities for children to initiate and solve their own problems and plenty of time to test out possible ideas and solutions. Child directed activities allow children to create their own problems and solutions. I often hear children Children are natural problem solvers. From shortly after birth, trying to figure out who will be the mom, the cat, the baby, the mom, they make it work and have two moms, or they decide to have two families. However they agree about it, they solve the problem for them selves.

> Encourage children to use materials differently—Blankets can be caves, capes, the lake or something you wrap a baby in. Children seem to be able to fashion Legos into anything they need at the time, especially a weapon. Help children see multiple uses for whatever is available in the home. Do not stop and say, "You cannot use that hairbrush for a microphone."

> Do not let a mistake be the end of it—Help your child figure out why a solution did not work. If the kite would not fly because the tail was too long, or too heavy, help your child reach that conclusion, don't just decide never to fly kites again.

The Three Year Old Class

The boys and girls in the Pre K 3 class are having lots of fun everyday. The children discovered that mixing red paint and yellow paint makes a great color for pumpkins. The boys and girls went out to the garden and chose a pumpkin to take home. They were all excited and some had a hard time choosing just the right pumpkin. The children all took turns scooping some of the inside out of a pumpkin in our room. It was gooey and sticky.

The boys and girls learned about families this month. The children brought in pictures from when they were babies. They have all grown so much. The boys and girls learned about Joseph and his brothers and how they did not always get along. They also learned about how Moses was protected from harm by his mother and sister. We all decided that being part of a family is a wonderful thing. Having lots of people that love you is part of God's plan for each of us.

When the children were learning about Moses and how he was found floating in a basket, they investigated what things in our classroom would float and what would sink. They had fun playing in the water.

The boys and girls learned a little about bats. They learned that they are good for us because they eat mosquitoes. They also learned a silly poem about bats.

The Four Year Old Class

The four year old preschool class spent a week investigating balls. The boys and girls learned that balls are many different sizes and made of many different materials. Some balls are filled with something like rubberbands, or something else that makes them bounce but even balls that look empty have air in them. The children conducted experiments with balls like having them race down the slide to see which would be the fastest. They threw the balls to see which would go the farthest. When we were done learning about balls everyone played a game of T-ball. The children have been watching outdoors and seeing leaves change color and fall from the trees. The children know the weather is changing because now they all wear coats and pants to school instead of flip flops and shorts.

The boys and girls have been learning about making guesses about things or predictions as scientists say. They made predictions about which objects would weigh more. They compared 10 kernels of corn to a variety of very light

things. Most of the time the 10 kernels of corn weighed more.

The children learned about nocturnal animals and they had fun doing some things with their eyes closed. One of the children stood away from the group and called the name of a child who had on a blindfold. That child had to follow the sound to get to the other child. All of the children were excellent listeners. The boys and girls enjoyed hearing the story, <u>Stellaluna</u>, about a baby bat that gets separated from it's mother and ends up being raised by a mother bird.

After going through the fire house when the fire men brought it here to Immanuel, the boys and girls walked to the Fire Station on Park Boulevard and learned even more about fire safety. The children saw where the firefighters sleep and eat. They also heard the alarm that wakes the firefighters up when they are sleeping. The firemen told us that the biggest cause of fires in homes is children playing with matches.
