

The Back Cover Professional Re-write The Good and the Bad (An Illustrative Example)

THE BAD

About the Book:

Second Chances is a transformational romance story that is very close to the author's heart... Jennifer has just turned 40 and has spent 20 years in a loveless marriage to Jim. Sick of his bad boy ways, she finally decides to leave him. Jennifer is packing her bags, when Jim bursts in on her — home early from work that day. After a violent confrontation, heard by numerous people all over the trailer park, Jennifer is seen running away from the trailer and Jim is lying dead on the bedroom floor. With the police hot on her trail, she runs away to New Mexico, where she changes her name and joins a band of roaming hippies. There she meets Jock, a handsome troubadour, and they spend a heated night in the mountains of Las Palmas. Jennifer is shocked to discover that she can love again. But when the police show up and ruin her morning coffee, Jennifer is forced to relive the horror of that final day with Jim, and tell Jock the truth about her past life. Entering a plea of not guilty, by reason of self-defence, Jennifer is vindicated for Jim's death, and free to be with Jock. They move to northern California and where they open an organic peach farm and have a beautiful baby girl, named Serendipity. You will shed tears and be moved (and maybe even smile) by this heartfelt story.

What's so bad about that?

The synopsis is too long. Shorter and concise is always better.

The synopsis provides extraneous details that don't add value – did we really need to know that Jim was home early from work that day?

The synopsis gives away the entire plot, including the ending. The potential reader already knows that Jock and Jennifer are going to end up together, so why would they buy the book? There has to be suspense or mystery created in the description to "hook" the potential reader, and make them want to know more.

The synopsis should not include information about the author, including their motivations for writing the book. This kind of information belongs in the About the Author blurb (if at all).

The synopsis should never tell the potential reader how they should feel upon reading the book.



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About the Author:

What's so bad about that?

The blurb is much too long. It should be three or four sentences only.

Providing intimate and personal details about the author should only be done if they are relevant to the book and strengthen the author's credibility. If in doubt, leave it out.

The author should only make promises about what the book can deliver if they are, in fact, true. Don't make promises that cannot be delivered – if in doubt, leave it out.

If the author wants to include accolades, they should take the form of quoted testimonials from third parties, named awards (if won), or if they've appeared on a bestseller list (and name it).
