A Season of Renewal

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" Ecclesiastes 3:1

The word sabbatical shares the same roots as the Biblical word Sabbath, meaning to rest; to cease. Sabbath is *holy time* set aside for physical, emotional, spiritual and mental renewal. The first chapters of the book of Genesis tell a story of how the ancient Hebrews understood the created order. At first, there was chaos. And as God began creating, everything became orderly – the land, the sky, the ocean, things in the ocean, things walking on land, even things that crawl on land. And when God saw all these things, God was satisfied – God said, "It is GOOD!" When God finished the work of creation, God rested, blessing the seventh day and making it holy. The practice of Sabbath is our response to God's commandment to rest and keep it holy. Likewise, a sabbatical is simply an extended Sabbath, a time to disengage from our everyday lives in order to rest, travel, study, reflect, pray, worship and renew relationships; it is a season of spiritual growth and renewal.

From September 1 to November 30, I will be engaged in a 3-month sabbatical. During the sabbatical, I will rest, reflect, and renew.

Rest: I will take a break from the daily and weekly routine of ministry and rest. During the sabbatical time, I will simply stop what I normally do, so that I can take a break from it. I will have the luxury of not feeling the pressure of daily ministry and weekly sermon writing so that I can take a break.

Reflect: I will reflect on my life as a daughter, as a wife, as a sister, as an auntie, and as a pastor. This reflection will take place through hearing the stories of my parents as they reflect on their lives. Much of this reflection will take place as Dwight and I travel to Asia with my parents for five weeks in September and October. As I hear *their* stories which are, in fact, *my* stories, I will learn more about myself, reflect on who I am, and (Continued on p. 3 - Sabbatical)

understand better my commitments and passions for ministry. And as I travel with them to make new memories together, I will record digitally my reflections with them. These stories will be regarded as a gift from the passing generation to the next generation that will remind me of where we've been in order to know where we are going.

Renew: This is the most uncertain and the most exciting part of the sabbatical journey. Like the wind that blows where it will, the Spirit will blow and renew in the way that I need to be renewed. I cannot predetermine the result. Rather, I simply trust that I will be renewed. I will attend to my needs for rest and reflection and I will attend to God's presence and goodness in my life. I entrust the process of renewal to the Holy Spirit, and I will rely on God to guide and journey with me.

As I engage in my sabbatical time, the congregation will also be engaged in parallel activities.

First, you will take photos! You will take lots of photos of church life that will be compiled into a photo book to share with me.

Secondly, you will explore how the congregation's Japanese heritage can contribute to the expression of our Christian faith. The Board of Christian Nurture will offer classes on different Japanese cultural arts for all ages: ikebana (Japanese flower arranging), taiko drumming, and sushi making. What you learn will be used to enhance our worship and community life together.

Thirdly, you will engage in reflecting on your personal family stories. Each person in the congregation will be invited to find a photo that holds a significant memory, to reflect upon it, and to write 300-500 words about the photo/ memory. The sharing of these stories will be recorded and made into short digital stories. The sharing of these stories will be done in small group settings; and when I return, these photo essays will be shared with me in small group settings.

In addition to these parallel activities, guest preachers and Pastor Ede will lead in worship during the sabbatical; and Pastor Ede will provide pastoral care. In order for me to disengage completely from ministry, I will not be responding to phone calls or emails during the sabbatical. Please contact Pastor Ede for pastoral matters and Moderator Becky Kanenaka for other church matters. And as always, if you don't know whom to call, call Paula!

I am grateful to the congregation for affording me this time away; and I thank the Lilly Endowment, Inc. and its National Clergy Renewal Program for the grant to the congregation to help defray the cost of the sabbatical.

I pray that God will keep us in God's tender care during these months; and I look forward to returning in December to share together what God has been doing in our lives and to engage together in what God will have us do.

"When your children ask you..." Deuteronomy 6:20

Here we are at the end of school vacation, children still running around enjoying summer, while many of us in churches are starting to plan our Fall program for the children in our churches. It's a good time to ponder what we teach our children about generosity in all parts of their lives, including the church. How do we help them build Christian values about how they use their money that will carry them into adulthood? Do our Sunday School, Confirmation and Youth programs include discussions of giving and values about our attitudes toward our possessions? If they do not, how do we expect them to grow into adults who will not only give to their church, but also challenge our society's assumptions about wealth?

As Israel formed itself into a nation, leaders like Joshua and the prophets would occasionally say that the people were commanded to do something and then commanded to explain to their children why they did it. Children are naturally observant and inquisitive; knowing this, God encouraged leaders to take advantage of those qualities to instruct. Talk to your children or grandchildren, and to the children of your church, about why you give and how you make choices about using your money. When you do, you build a firm foundation for the future of God's work in the world.

Guest Preachers during Pastor Mary's Sabbatical

Pastor Diakonda Gurning is a Mission Developer with the Indonesian Lutheran Fellowship, a ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Northwest Washington Synod. Diakonda is one of the co-founders of the Washington New Sanctuary Movement, a faith-based community organization publicly protecting the rights of all immigrants and working for comprehensive immigration reform. In addition to a university degree from Indonesia, Diakonda has studied at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, Berkeley and Seattle University. He is married to Stacy Kitahata, a graduate of McCormick Theological Seminary who is a Program Director at the Krista Foundation for Global Citizenship. Diakonda will preach August 26 and September 2.
The Rev. Kurt Esslinger is the Director and Campus Minister of Agape House Christian Ministry at the University of Illinois in Chicago, IL. Kurt grew up in West Texas and has lived in various countries throughout the world since and speaks fairly fluent Korean. Some say he is not quite as crazy as he looks (depending on the day). He received his M Div from McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago; and is ordained in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) He is married to Hyeyoung Lee, a graduate of McCormick Theological Seminary who is a social worker serving "Korean American Women in Need" in Chicago. Kurt will preach September 23 and 30.
The Rev. Dr. Joanne Lindstrom is Associate Professor of Ministry and the Jean and Frank Mohr Director of Experiential Education and Field Studies at McCormick Theological Seminary. Joanne is an ordained minister of American Baptist Churches USA, a member in good standing with American Baptist Churches of Metro Chicago (ABCMC) and has served as Associate Minister at The First Baptist Church of Chicago since 1994. Joanne received her M Div from McCormick Theological Seminary and her Doctor of Ministry in preaching from the Association of Chicago Theological Schools. Joanne will preach October 7, 14, 21.
The Rev. Dr. Andrea Walker is the Pastor of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Summit, New Jersey. She is an ordained minister in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Andrea graduated from Georgia State University, attended the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, and received her Masters of Divinity degree in 1999 and Doctor of Ministry in 2007 from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. Her discipline is preaching and her doctoral thesis is titled "A Place At the Table: An African American Lutheran Preaching from Margins to Mainstream." Andrea is married to the Rev. Dr. Booker T. Sears, the pastor of Goodwill Baptist Church in the South Bronx, NY. Andrea will preach October 28.
The Rev. Richard Kamanu is the Pastor of Kaumakapili Church. Richard is a 1975 graduate of the Kamehameha Schools, received his Bachelors of Arts Degree from Olivet College, Olivet Michigan and his Master of Divinity Degree from the Chicago Theological Seminary. Richard served as an Associate Minister of Kaumakapili Church from 1982 to 1984. He then served as Kahu of Hauula Congregational Church, from 1984 to 1990. Following his eight year ministry with the people of Hauula Congregational Church, he was called to pastor at the Kapaa First Hawaiian Church, Kapaa, Kauai from 1990 to 2004, before taking his position at Kaumakapili in April of 2004.
