On Easter Sunday, three teenagers made their public profession of Christ. **Matthew Chun, Brandon Hayashi,** and **Preston Iha** successfully completed a three-month Faith Formation class in which they learned about the Christian faith within the context of the United Church of Christ and this congregation. They read parts of the Bible, explored where they see God in their lives, and learned about the meaning of God coming to humanity in human form.

During this faith formation class, they didn't "get" faith. On the contrary, they were already claimed by God and already incorporated into the

faith of Christ. In addition, their faith was already being formed through their loving families and through the church family. What they did during the Faith Formation Class was to begin to understand the love and grace that they have already experienced so that at the end of the class, they made the decision to be baptized and to become members of Nu'uanu Congregational Church. It has been an absolute joy to journey with these young men and witness how excited they are about their faith!

One of the exercises that we did in class was to write a creed together – a statement that says what we believe. We each wrote what we believe and we put it all together. Even as we were writing this creed, we talked about how what we believe will change over time because we will experience new things and we will continue to grow. So what follows is a snapshot of what they believe today which I share with you in gratitude:

God is love.

I believe that God created all things. I believe that God loves all of us no matter what. I believe that we are all children of God. I believe that we are gifts from God. I believe that we are equal in God's eyes. I believe that God is in everyone. I believe God loves all of us no matter what or who we are.

Reflections on the Kaua'i Mission Trip

Over Spring Break back in March, three of our youth spent four days on Kaua'i to do some mission work with our fellow UCC churches and go on a quest for God. We focused on the passage of salt and light from Matthew 5, as we found new ways to experience and capture God's presence. Relationships were strengthened and memorable experiences were made. Hear what they have to say!

"As Christians, there are many ways we can be salt. We can add flavor to the world, preserve goodness in the world, and even create a thirst for God. But to be salt, we must be salty—be true to ourselves—because the essence of salt is its saltiness, and the essence of us is made up of all the little things that make us who we are.

We worshipped at Hanapepe Hawaiian Church for only one Sunday, yet I learned what their essence is. They are very welcoming and kind to even strangers like us, letting us witness and participate in their baptism as a congregation. They even invited us for their potluck lunch after the baptisms, after serving us a delicious breakfast. There is less than half of our NCC congregation in their entire congregation at Hanapepe Hawaiian, but they take twice as long to pass the peace of Christ because they have to greet everyone in the sanctuary, and I mean EVERYONE. So I'm challenging this congregation to try and greet somebody new every time we pass the peace of Christ. On this trip I learned that everyone on Kauai is super nice and very welcoming. For me, because it was my first experience on Kauai, this is the essence I get of Kauai, and I thank you all for allowing me to experience that." —Trevor Serna, 13

"There are many sources of light. Electricity, the sun, and fire, but WE can also be light. Light has many characteristics. It dispels darkness, leads people when it is dark, and it warms things. In the same way, we are light in times of darkness. We can illuminate the dark. We warm others by being caring. We lead others to God. As Christians, the light that we shine should come from God. Sometimes, other people shine lights and reveal God to US.

Many people were light to us on Kauai. One morning, we were just going to eat cereal for breakfast, but a few people from the church we were staying at came and brought us food. They woke up early to make us food themselves. Then they stayed and ate with us. They talked with us and shared their stories. They didn't have to do that, but they took time out of their busy lives to make us breakfast. We went to Kauai to do mission work and be lights to others, but the people we met were lights to us as well."
